Royal Blind Celebrates National Braille Week 2013

Friday 4th January marked the start of National Braille Week 2013 and Royal Blind is celebrating by releasing our own "Say it With Braille" Messaging App, which transcribes personal messages into Braille code that can be sent to a friend's email inbox. Thanks to modern technology and computer software, Braille is becoming more accessible and portable for the millions of people who use it daily all over the world. Royal Blind is excited to be able to contribute to this relationship with an application that allows sighted individuals to engage with and learn more about Braille while also having fun communicating with friends.

Royal Blind is also celebrating the creation of the Braille system by designing a colourful collection of Brailled postcards that read each of our five services: The Royal Blind School, Braeside House, Scottish Braille Press, Forward Vision, and Kidscene.

National Braille Week (4th - 11th January) celebrates the birth of Louis Braille, who went on to invent the tactile system of reading and writing that is now used by more than 150 million people in 120 different countries. Louis Braille became blind as a little boy after an accident that occurred while he was playing in his father's workshop. As a child, Louis created the Braille system, which is comprised of small rectangular blocks called "cells" that contain tiny raised dots while the number and arrangement of the raised dots distinguish each character. Over 200 years later, Braille continues to provide visually impaired and blind individuals with literacy, opportunity and independence

National Braille Week is about raising knowledge and understanding about its use within the UK. We see it as a great way to raise awareness and inspire both interest and support for Braille, which is the world's only truly universal written code. So why not set yourself a challenge this week and **try saying it with Braille!**
