Highlights during the first quarter

- Adjusted net asset value (NAV) amounted to SEK 437,919m (SEK 572 per share) on March 31, 2020, a decrease of SEK 47,100m, or -10 percent during the quarter. Total shareholder return amounted to -11 percent during the quarter, compared to -18 percent for the SIXRX return index.
- Listed Companies generated a total return of -14 percent. Investor purchased shares in ABB for SEK 1.6bn, in Ericsson for SEK 1.1bn and in Electrolux Professional for SEK 0.2bn.
- Based on estimated market values, the total return for Patricia Industries, excluding cash, amounted to -2 percent (-1 percent including cash) negatively affected by multiple contraction.
- Sales growth for the major subsidiaries amounted to 13 percent, of which 6 percent organic in constant currency.
 Reported EBITA grew by 1 percent. Adjusted EBITA grew by 12 percent. Mölnlycke grew organically by 7 percent in constant currency.
- The value of our EQT investments increased by 11 percent, driven by strong performance in EQT funds (reported with a one-quarter lag) and a total return of 9 percent in EQT AB. Net cash flow to Investor amounted to SEK 0.9bn.
- Leverage (net debt/reported total assets) was 4.7 percent as of March 31, 2020 (2.8 as of December 31, 2019).
 Gross cash amounted to SEK 19,810m and the average maturity of Investor AB's debt portfolio was 10.8 years on March 31, 2020.
- In order to future-proof Investor and our companies, Investor has decided on three focus areas within sustainability:
 Business Ethics & Governance, Climate & Resource Efficiency and Diversity & Inclusion.

CEO statement



Dear fellow shareholders,

The world is currently in the midst of a historic battle to handle the covid-19 pandemic, which is hurting people and societies in many different ways and putting enormous strains on the world economy. The effects of the outbreak are very difficult to predict. Investor and our companies are focusing on

managing the effects on employees, customers, supply chains and production, as well as on securing cash flow and liquidity. At the same time, we are also prioritizing critical investments. Having focused on agility and financial flexibility well before covid-19, I believe that our companies generally entered this crisis well prepared and in good shape. That said, the second quarter will clearly be tough for many of them and the unpredictability may well remain throughout 2020. Furthermore, the outbreak may have structural implications for some industries and companies.

During the first quarter, our adjusted net asset value decreased by 10 percent. Our total shareholder return was -11 percent, while the SIXRX return index lost 18 percent.

Listed Companies

The total return of our listed companies was -14 percent. Except for the newly listed Electrolux Professional and Sobi, all companies generated negative total returns, although Ericsson, Nasdaq and AstraZeneca significantly outperformed the market. We invested a total SEK 2.9bn in ABB, Ericsson and Electrolux Professional, at what we believe are attractive levels.

Patricia Industries

Based on estimated market values, the total return for Patricia Industries, excluding cash, was -2 percent.

The first quarter was strong for our major subsidiaries, with organic sales growth of 6 percent and adjusted EBITA growth of 12 percent. As general business conditions rapidly deteriorated during the latter part of the first quarter, we anticipate a significantly tougher second quarter for some companies: Permobil due to limited customer access, BraunAbility as its retailers are closed, Laborie because of fewer elective procedures, as well as Piab due to low production levels among key customers. At the same time, we expect continued resilience for Mölnlycke, Sarnova and Three Scandinavia.

Mölnlycke reported organic sales growth of 7 percent in constant currency, driven by strong demand for gloves, antiseptics and personal protective equipment within Surgical, as well as large parts of Wound Care. Growth in these areas was to some extent supported by covid-19. Simultaneously, demand for products related to elective procedures, such as procedure trays, was negatively impacted. Despite continued investments, the underlying profitability improved slightly.

Laborie reported organic sales growth of -4 percent in constant currency, negatively impacted by a decline in elective procedures within Urology and Gastrointestinal. The maternal and child health business, added through the recently completed acquisition of Clinical Innovations, grew in the quarter. Excluding this acquisition, profitability was somewhat lower than last year.

Sarnova had a strong development, driven by significant demand for both respiratory products and personal protective equipment.

Investments in EQT

The value change of our investments in EQT was 11 percent, driven by strong performance in EQT funds and a total return of 9 percent in EQT AB. Following last year's IPO of EQT AB, the values of our EQT fund investments are reported with a one-quarter lag. Net cash flow to Investor was strong at SEK 0.9bn.

Balance sheet, cash flow and dividends

After the contribution of USD 445m to Laborie to partly fund its acquisition of Clinical Innovations, and investments of SEK 2.9bn within Listed Companies, our financial position remains strong. At the end of the quarter, leverage was 4.7 percent, allowing us to act on opportunities and support value creation in our companies.

On the back of government measures taken, there is currently a debate regarding dividends. For a number of reasons, I believe dividends are important for the economy, one being to reallocate capital from sound and well-capitalized companies to those with capital needs. Dividends also represent a vital source of funding for private individuals, pension funds and foundations. These are aspects that are often lost in the debate.

Several of our companies have delayed, or even cancelled their dividend proposals because of the current turmoil, a general lack of visibility and the need to ensure financial strength. Others have proceeded as planned and distributed dividends. We support these different decisions. Our view is that each board should, as always, make decisions based on the conditions facing each individual company. What is right for one company is not necessarily right for another.

As previously communicated, our board has decided to postpone our annual general meeting to have more time to assess the current situation. Our goal to pay a steadily rising dividend over time remains intact. However, presently, more factors than usual need to be taken into account before making a well-balanced decision. We will communicate an updated dividend proposal in due course.

Going forward

The world is experiencing exceptional challenges. However, for strong companies difficult times also mean opportunities. From history and experience we know that eventually crises pass and things gradually normalize. In such an environment, it is crucial that our companies balance the need to manage the challenging day-to-day business with continued focus on critical investments in innovation, new technologies, geographic expansion and sustainability, which will strengthen them long-term. Such investments are just as important today as they were a few months ago.

With this in mind, we continue to engage with our companies to ensure that they, as well as Investor, emerge from this crisis stronger, thereby creating attractive value for you, dear fellow shareholders.

Net asset value

During the first quarter 2020, adjusted net asset value decreased from SEK 485.0bn to SEK 437.9bn. The change in adjusted net asset value, with dividend added back, was -10 percent (9).

Reported net asset value decreased from SEK 420.7bn to SEK 378.0bn. The change in reported net asset value, with dividend added back, was -10 percent (9).

Net debt and cash flow

Net debt totaled SEK 18,800m on March 31, 2020 (11,962), corresponding to leverage of 4.7 percent (2.8).

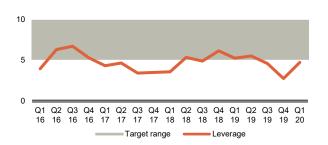
Our target leverage range is 5-10 percent (net debt/total reported assets) over a business cycle. While leverage can fluctuate above and below the target level, it should not exceed 25 percent for a longer period of time.

Gross cash amounted to SEK 19,810m and gross debt to SEK 38,610m as of March 31, 2020.

The average maturity of Investor AB's debt portfolio was 10.8 years on March 31, 2020 (11.1).

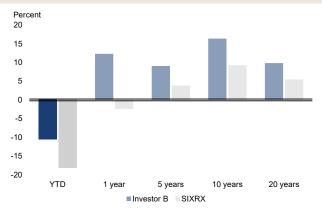

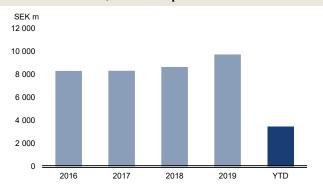

Dividends received

On February 21, 2020, Electrolux EGM decided to distribute all shares in Electrolux Professional to Electrolux shareholders. The first day of trading of Electrolux Professional on Nasdaq Stockholm was March 23, 2020. SEK 805m has been transferred from the value of Electrolux to the value of Electrolux Professional on the date of distribution.

Patricia Industries

Patricia Industries includes Mölnlycke, Permobil, Laborie, Piab, Sarnova, BraunAbility, Vectura, Grand Group, Three Scandinavia and Financial Investments. Patricia Industries' focus is to invest in and develop wholly-owned companies in the Nordics and in North America.

Highlights during the quarter

- Based on estimated market values, the total return for Patricia Industries, excluding cash, amounted to -2 percent (-1 percent including cash), mainly impacted by multiple contraction.
- Operating performance was strong for the major subsidiaries, with 6 percent organic sales growth and adjusted EBITA growth of 12 percent.
- Laborie's acquisition of Clinical Innovations was completed. Patricia Industries contributed USD 445m to partly fund the acquisition.

Operating performance

During the first quarter 2020, sales growth for the major subsidiaries (excluding Aleris during the first quarter 2019) amounted to 13 percent. Organic growth was 6 percent in constant currency. EBITA amounted to SEK 1,537m, an increase of 1 percent. Adjusting for integration costs related to Laborie's acquisition of Clinical Innovations, Piab's acquisition of TAWI Group and CEO transition costs in Mölnlycke, EBITA grew by 12 percent.

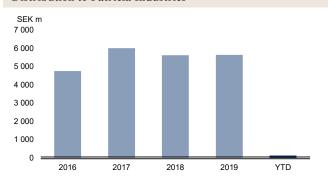

Activities during the quarter

Group

- Organic sales growth amounted to 7 percent in constant currency. All regions contributed positively, with the U.S. and Emerging Markets growing faster than the group.
- Growth was driven by strong demand for gloves, antiseptics and personal protective equipment within Surgical, as well as large parts of Wound Care. Growth in these areas was to some extent supported by covid-19. Simultaneously, demand for some products related to elective procedures was negatively impacted by covid-19.

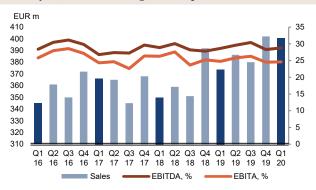

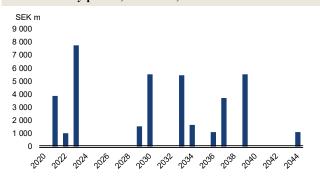

Annual General Meeting postponed

On March 27, 2020, Investor announced that due to the current situation with high uncertainty and several changes in a short period of time due to the rapid spread of covid-19, Investor's Board of Directors has decided to postpone the Annual General Meeting (AGM) in order to further evaluate the situation and its potential effects on the Board's proposal to the AGM, such as the proposal of dividend.

The AGM was scheduled for May 5, 2020 at City Conference Center in Stockholm.

Investor will publish a new notice to the AGM no later than four weeks prior to the new date. The AGM will at the latest be held on June 30, in accordance with existing legislation.

Acquisitions (business combinations)

Laborie's acquisition of Clinical Innovations

In February, 2020, Laborie completed the acquisition of Clinical Innovations, a leading provider of single-use, products for hospital labor & delivery and neonatal intensive care unit departments. The consideration amounted to SEK 5,355m.

In the preliminary purchase price allocation, goodwill amounted to SEK 2,964m. The goodwill recognized for the acquisition corresponds to the complementary strengths of the companies. The goodwill recognized is not expected to be deductible for income tax purposes.

Transaction related costs amounted to SEK 57m and derive from external legal fees and due diligence expenses. These costs have been included in the line item Administrative, research and development and other operating cost in the Group's consolidated income statement.

For the period from the acquisition date until March 31, 2020, Clinical Innovations contributed net sales of SEK 100m and profit/loss of SEK -97m to the Group's result. If the acquisition had occurred on January 1, 2020, management estimates that consolidated net sales for the Group would have increased by SEK 120m and consolidated profit/loss for the period would have decreased by SEK 6m.

Piab's acquisition of TAWI

In January, 2020, Piab completed the acquisition of TAWI Group, a leading manufacturer of ergonomic handling solutions. The consideration amounted to SEK 1,009m.

In the preliminary purchase price allocation, goodwill amounted to SEK 527m. The goodwill recognized for the acquisition corresponds to the complementary strengths of the companies. The goodwill recognized is not expected to be deductible for income tax purposes.

Transaction related costs amounted to SEK 7m and derive from external legal fees and due diligence expenses. These costs have been included in the line item Administrative, research and development and other operating cost in the Group's consolidated income statement.

For the period from the acquisition date until March 31, 2020, TAWI Group contributed net sales of SEK 79m and profit/loss of SEK 7m to the Group's result.

Other acquisitions

During the quarter, BraunAbility and Permobil made a total of two acquisitions. The aggregate purchase price amounts to SEK 90m and goodwill amounts to SEK 80m. For the period from the acquisition dates until March 31, 2020, the acquired entities contributed net sales of SEK 13m and profit of SEK 0m to the Group's result.

Total pledged assets amount to SEK 19.4bn (14.4), of which SEK 15.8bn (10.7) refers to pledged assets in the subsidiaries BraunAbility, Laborie and Sarnova, related to outstanding loans corresponding to SEK 2.2bn, SEK 4.0bn and SEK 3.4bn. The increase in pledged assets mainly relates to increased assets in Laborie.

While leverage can fluctuate above and below the target level, it should not exceed 25 percent for any longer period of time. Our leverage policy allows us to capture investment opportunities and to support our companies.
