Project background* and main questions to be answered in the project

INTRODUCTION TO PROJECT 1/3



Project background

Husqvarna wants to understand the general knowledge about biodiversity and how it affects the purchase of garden equipment.



Main questions to be answered in the project

- Do people feel that their garden has an impact on biodiversity?
- Do people have a good knowledge of the importance of biodiversity?
- Do people mow their lawn with biodiversity in mind?
- Do people design their garden with biodiversity in mind?

Project specification



Research methodology:

- Online interviews (quantitative)
- Field period: 2022-05-16 – 2022-05-23



Markets: Sweden, Denmark, Germany, France, UK, Poland, Belgium, Netherlands.



Sample: National representative samples in the ages 30-65 years, only people who have a garden participates in survey. Incidence rate ~40% of full population.

- Definition of biodiversity presented to the respondents in survey:

Biodiversity, also called biological diversity, is the variety of life found in a place on Earth or, often, the total variety of life on Earth. A common measure of this variety, called species richness, is the count of species in an area. Biodiversity also encompasses the genetic variety within each species and the variety of ecosystems that species create.

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Summary and recommendations

- There seems to be a correlation between familiarity of the term biodiversity, concern about the decreasing biodiversity and actions taken in the own garden to boost and prevent biodiversity. Two clear examples are Germany and Denmark, which are the two extremes in this study. People in Germany are the most educated in the subject and they are also the ones that have taken most action so far. On the other hand, people in Denmark are less aware of and concerned about biodiversity. They are also less interested in learning more about the subject and take less actions.
 - A better understanding of biodiversity and relevant actions to take would both reduce barriers and facilitate increased focus on biodiversity.
- > Nepa recommends Husqvarna to focus on spreading awareness and knowledge about biodiversity. Due to different (biodiversity) maturity levels in each market, Nepa believe Husqvarna would benefit from adopting their communication slightly. Not by creating different campaigns in each markets, but rather by tweaking messages and/or other elements that can fine tune the communication on each market to make it more effective.
- E.g.
- People in Sweden and Netherlands have relatively high awareness but tend to not think about biodiversity. Here, Husqvarna should focus on communication that *reminds* the consumer of the subject.
 - People in UK, France and Belgium don't know how to make their gardens more biodiverse. Here, Husqvarna should focus on *educating* the target audience.
 - People in Denmark and Poland don't prioritize biodiversity. Here the communication should focus on *why* biodiversity is important.

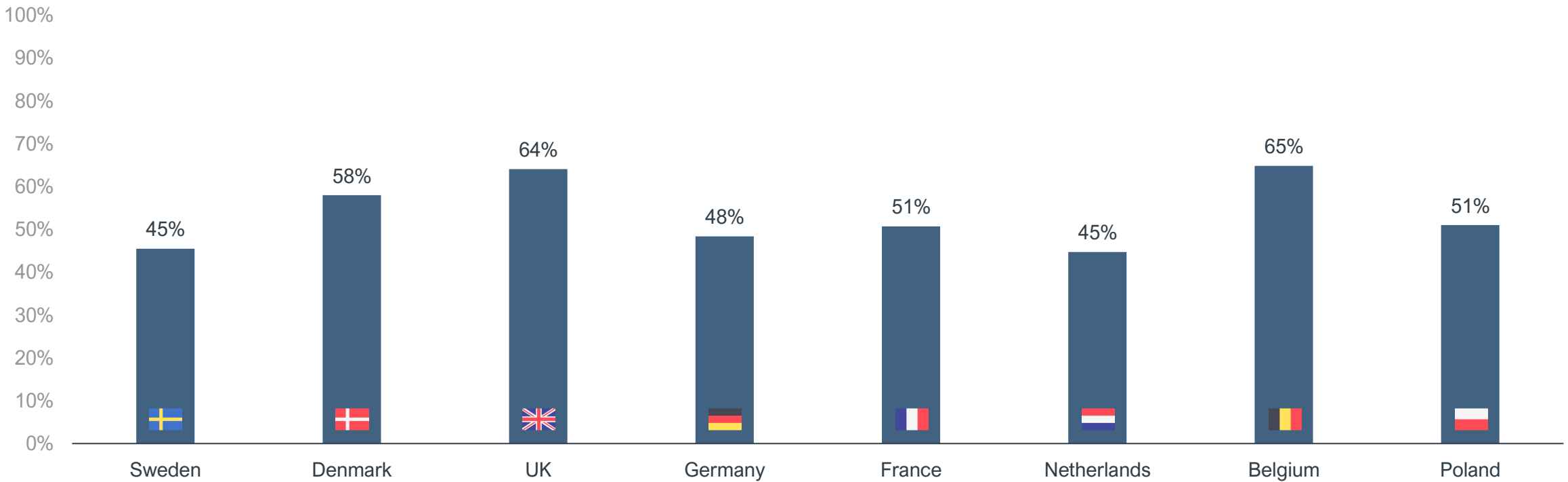
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Belgium and UK have the highest share of people who own a garden with a lawn

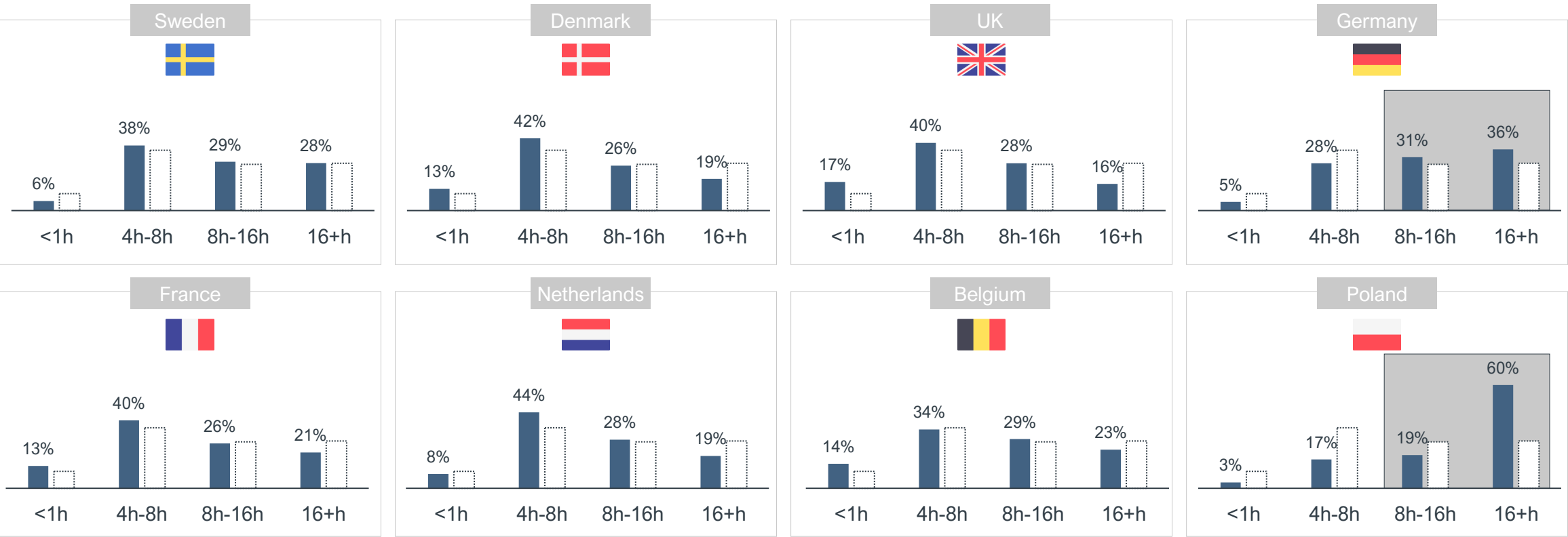

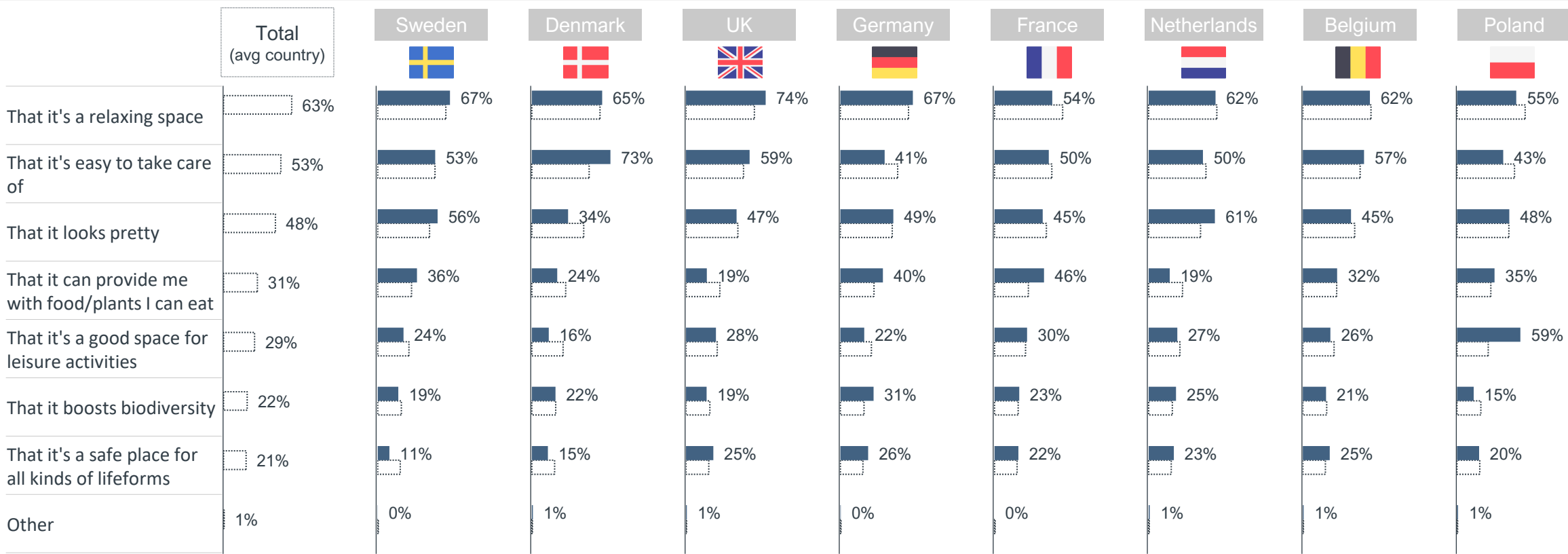

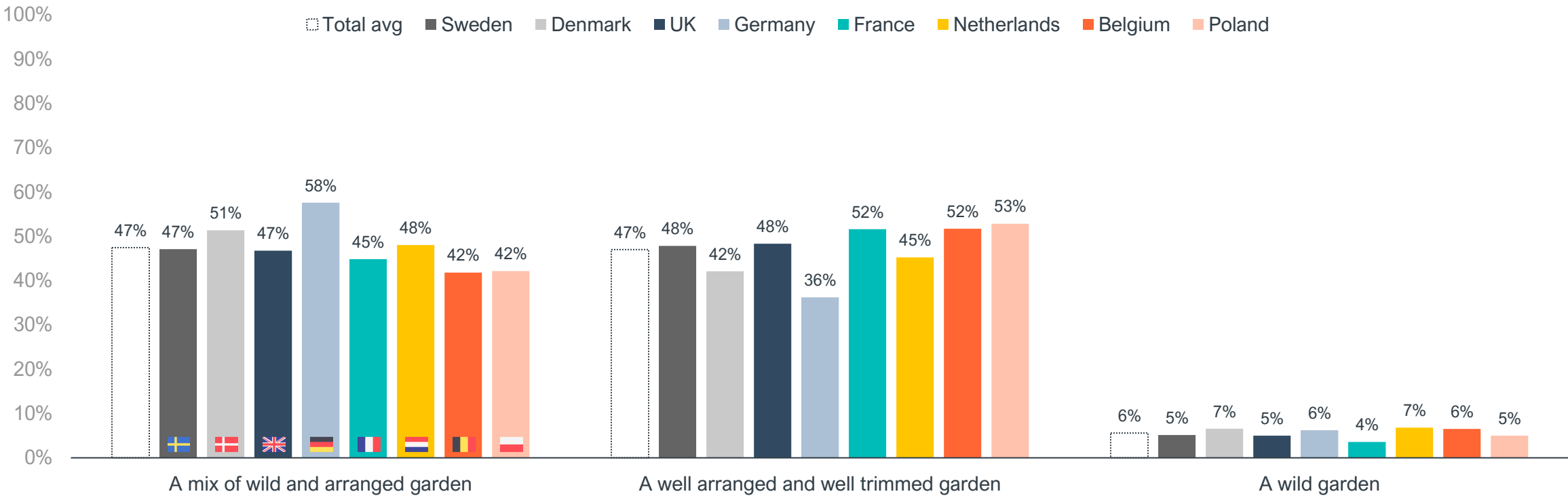

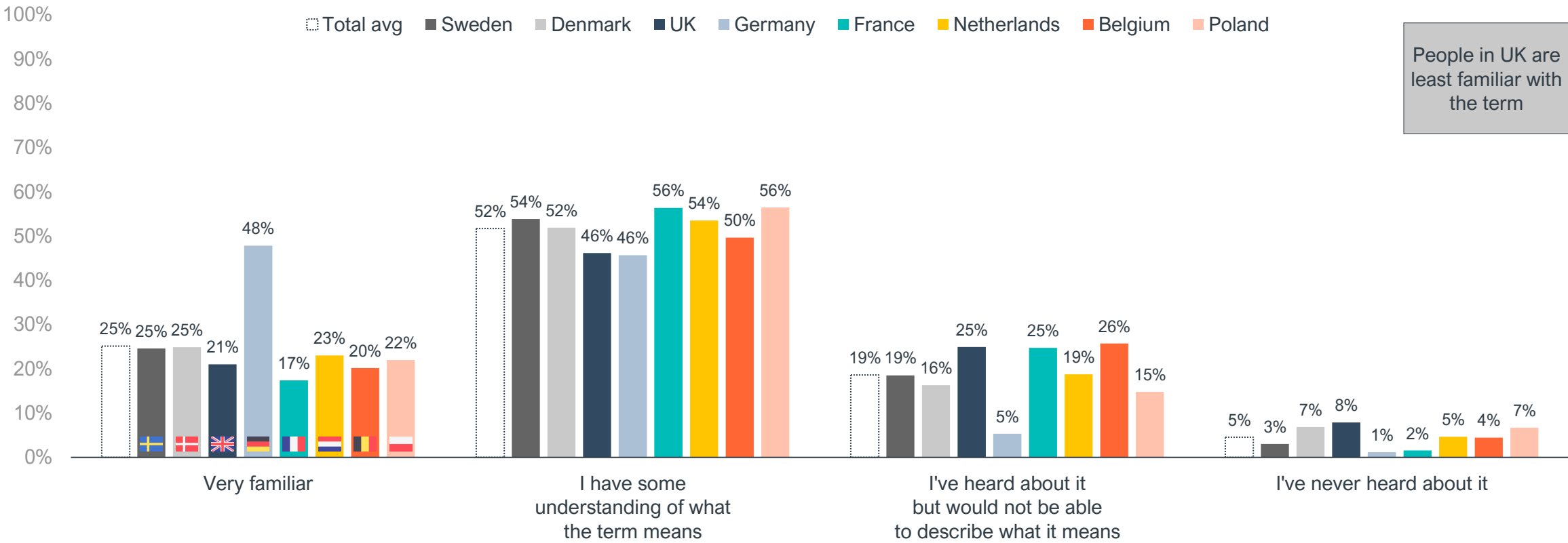

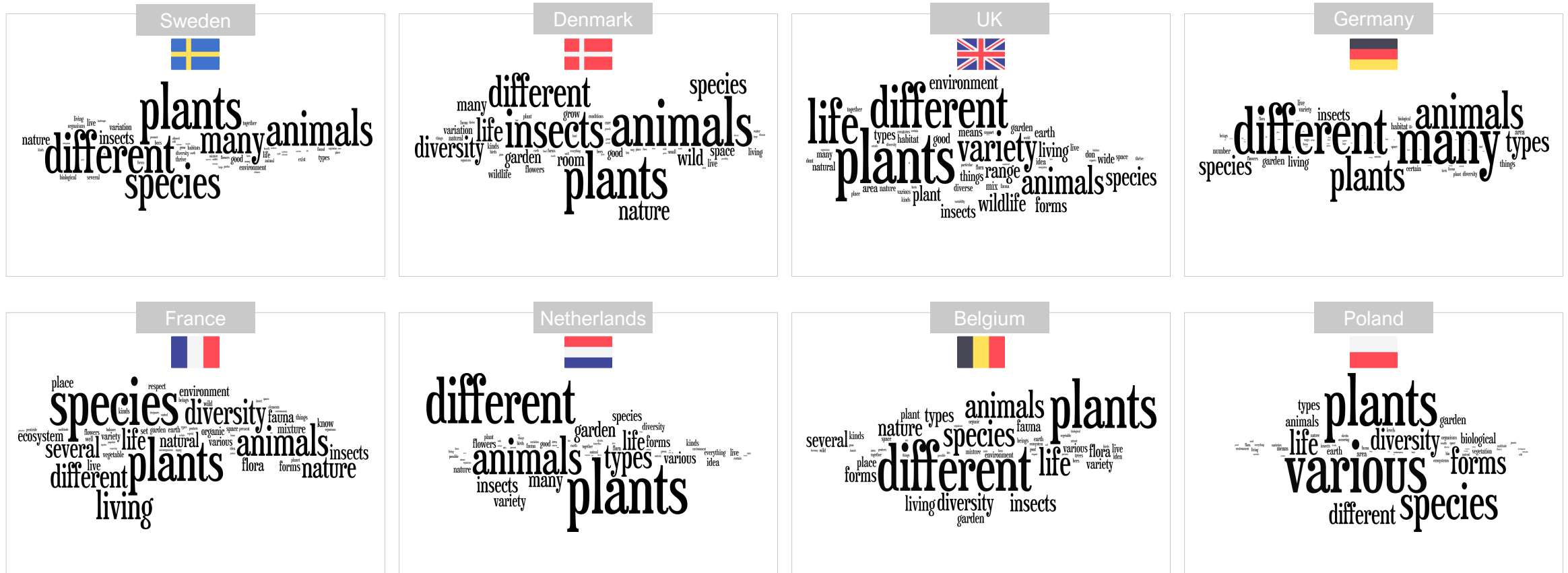

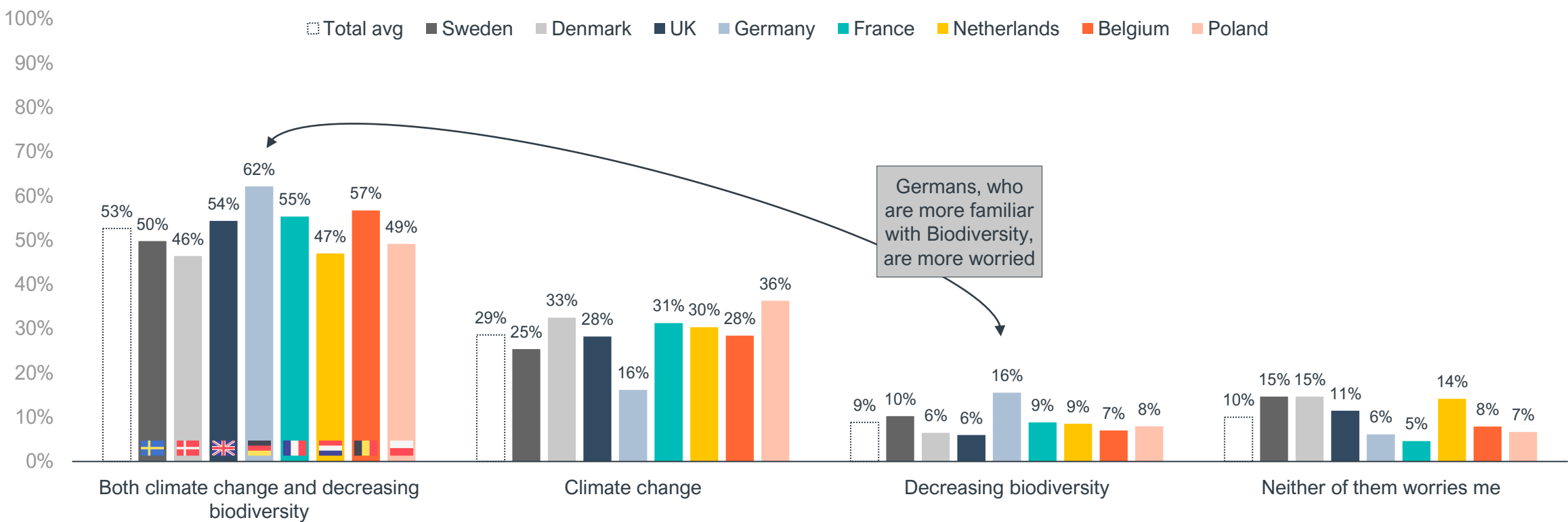

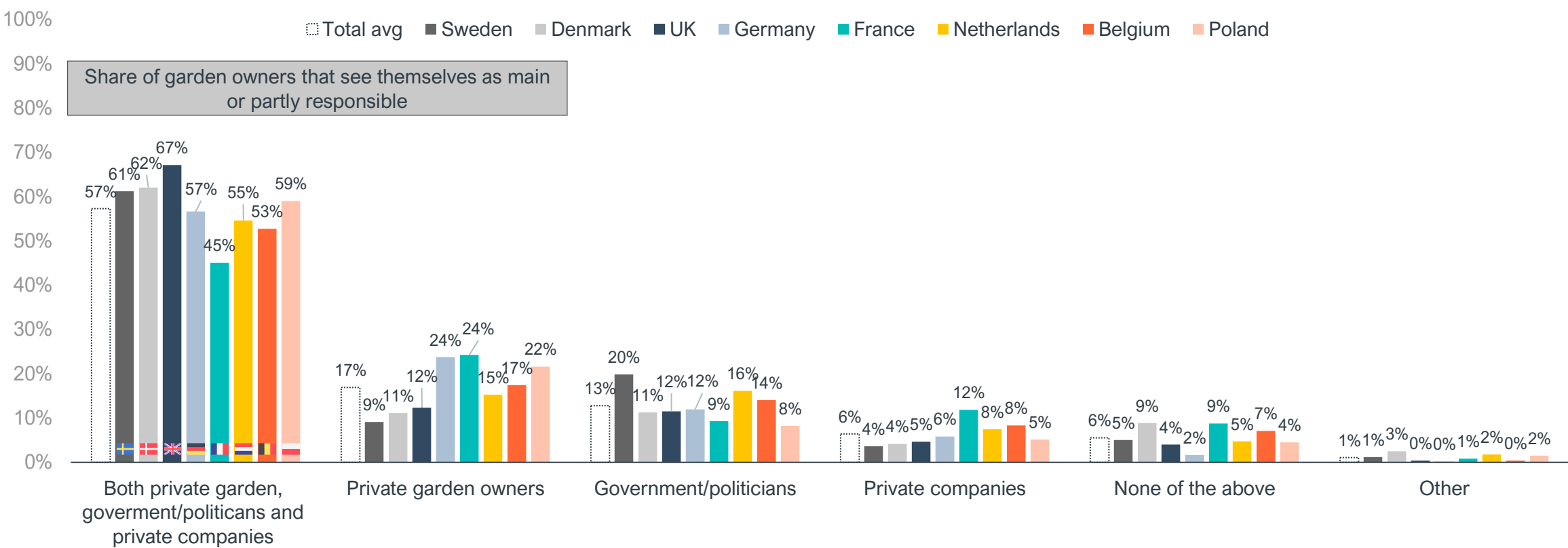

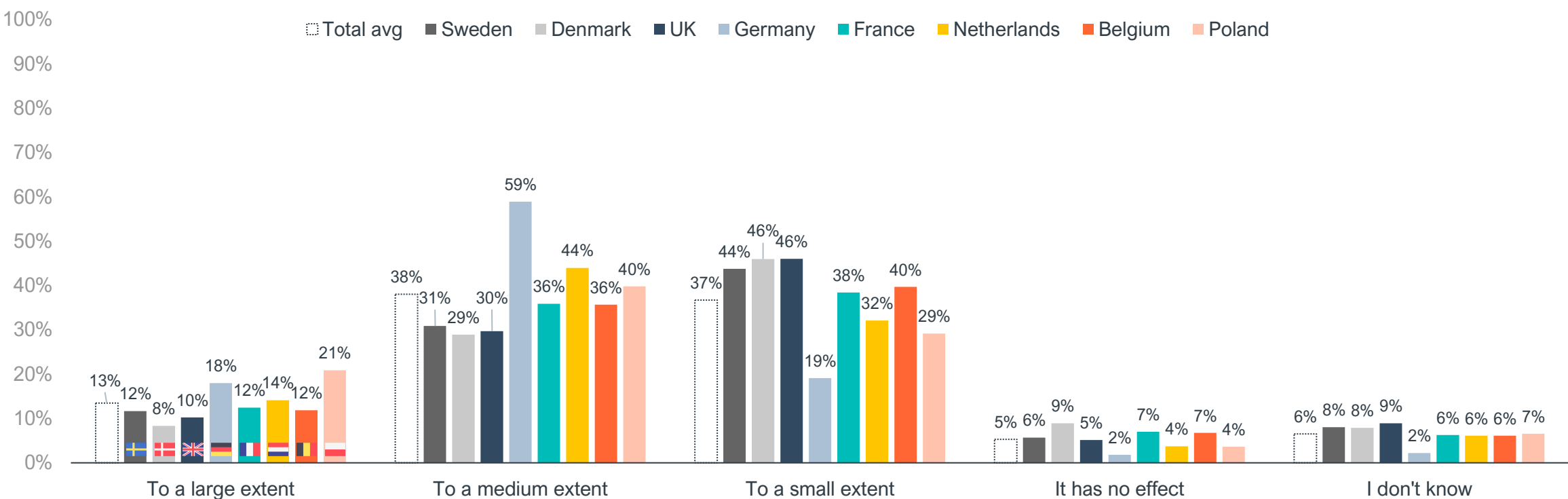

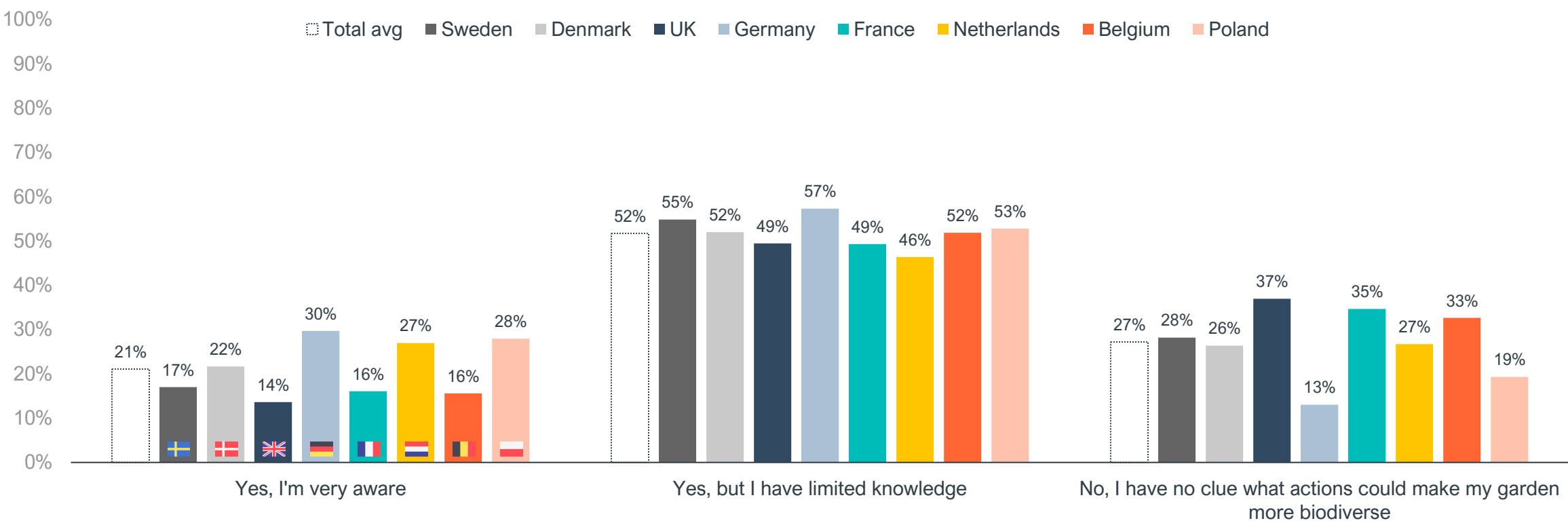

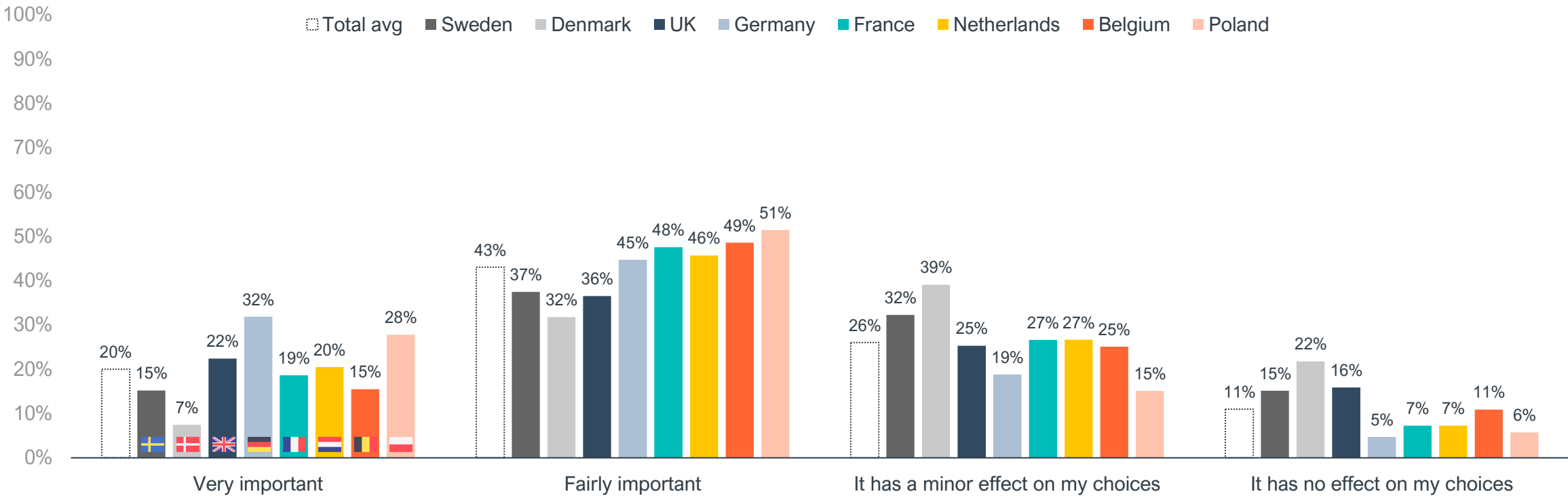

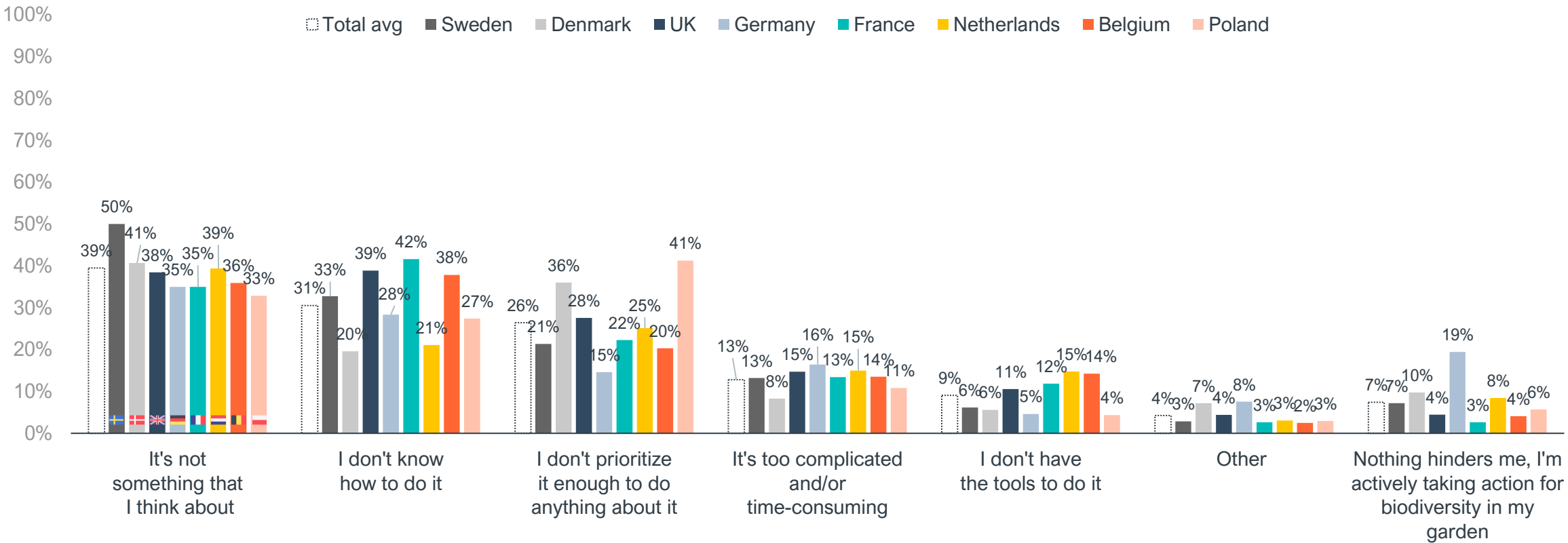

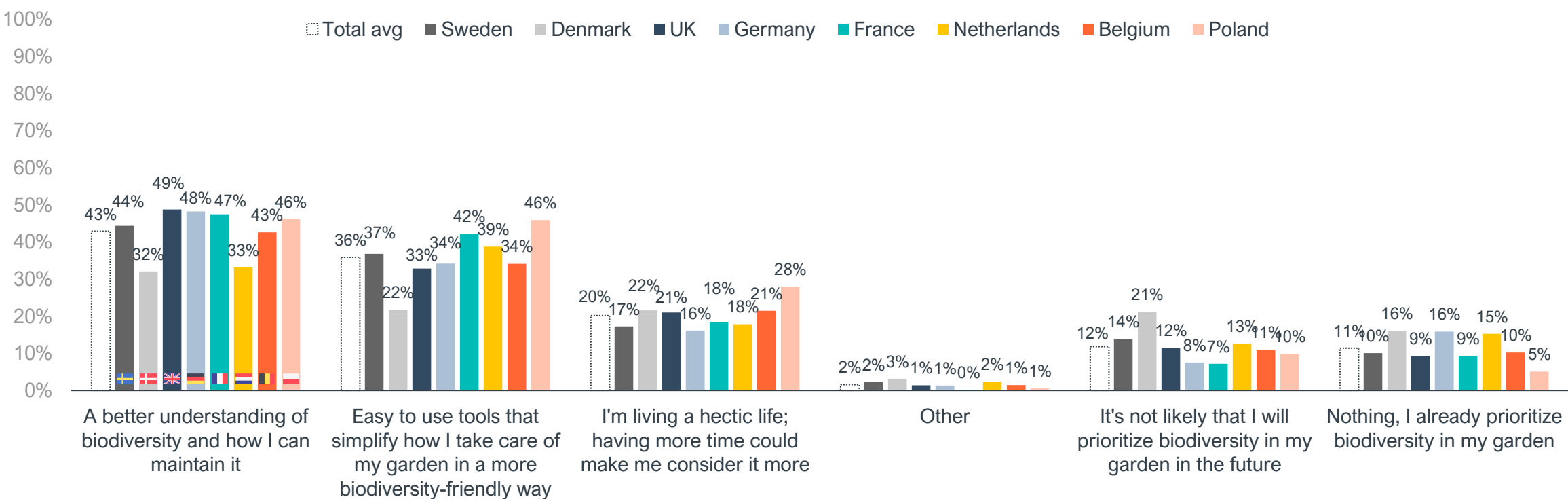

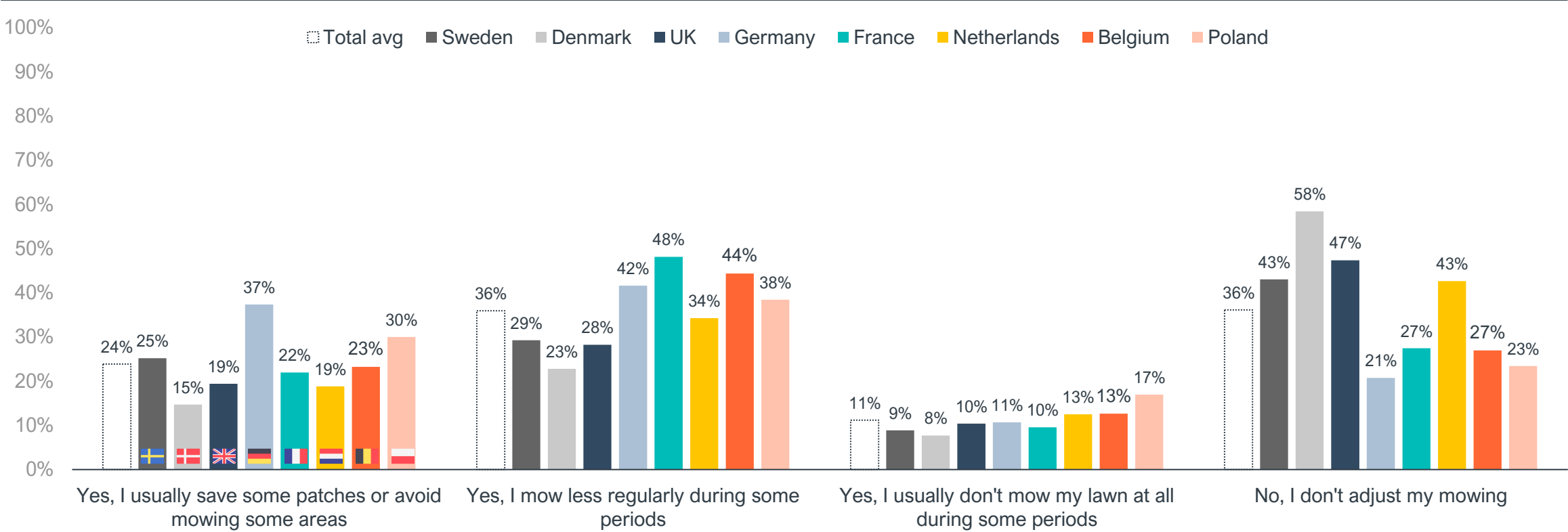

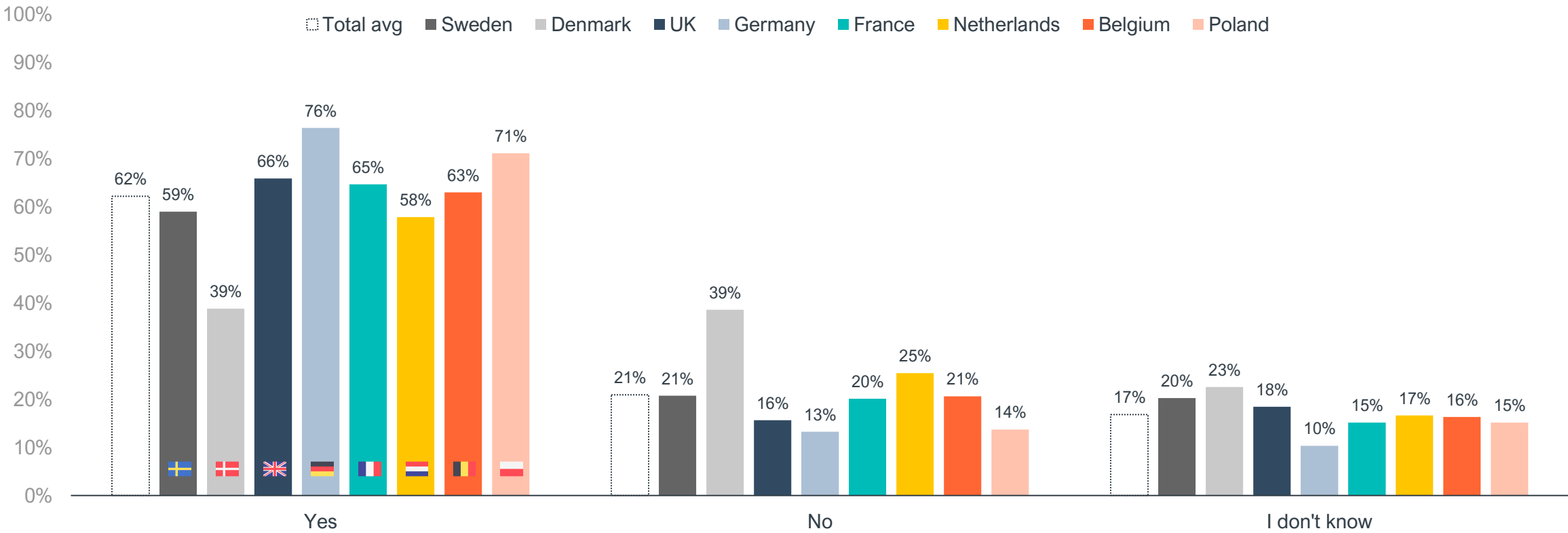

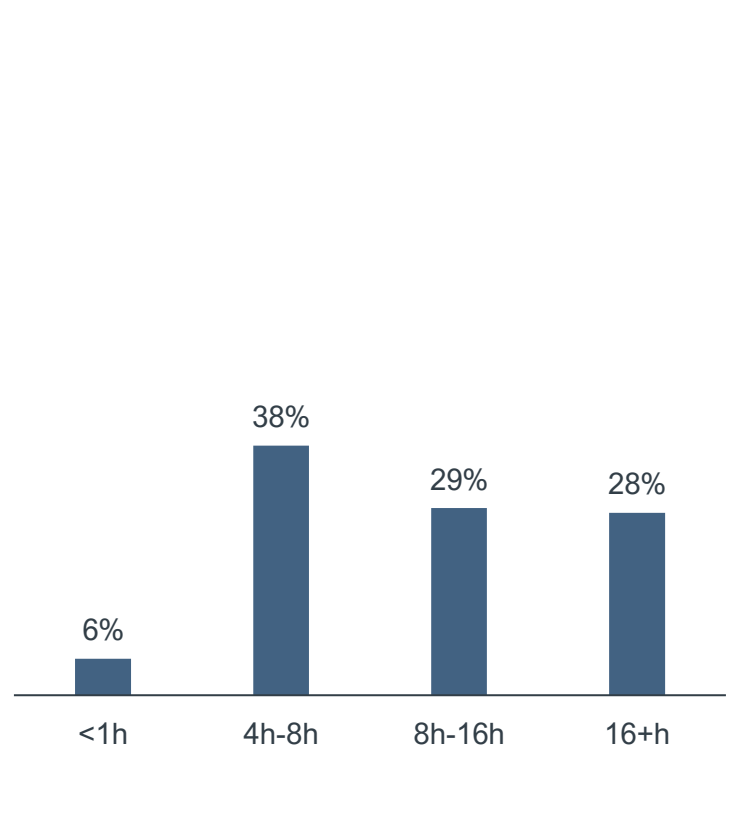

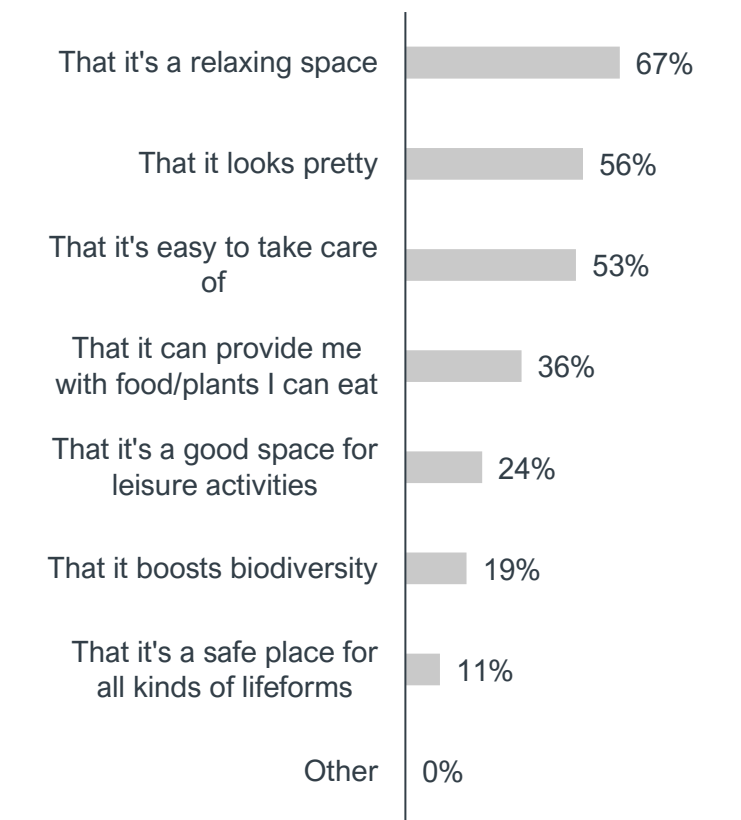

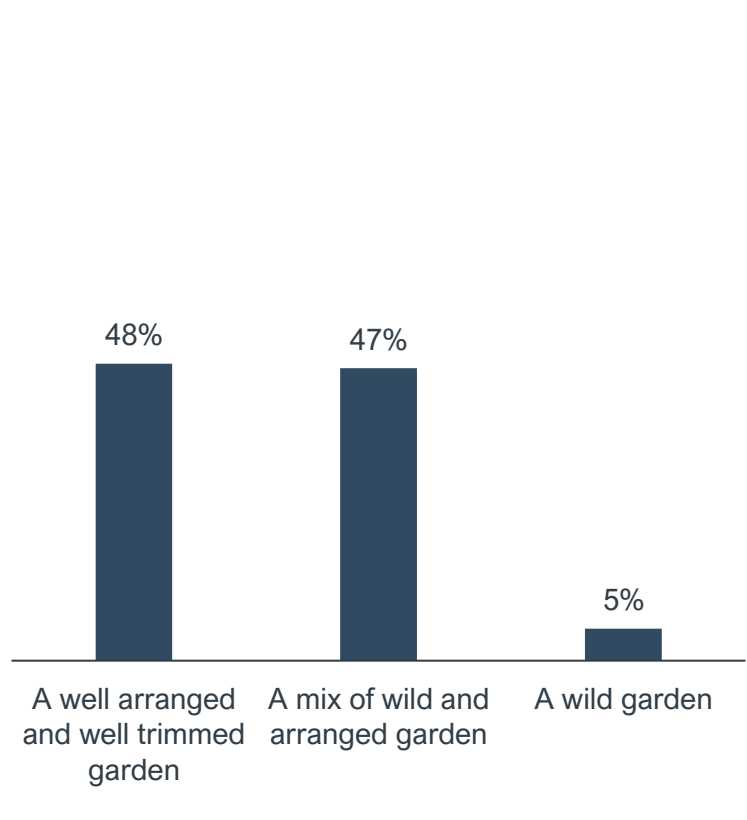
Time spend gardening during season

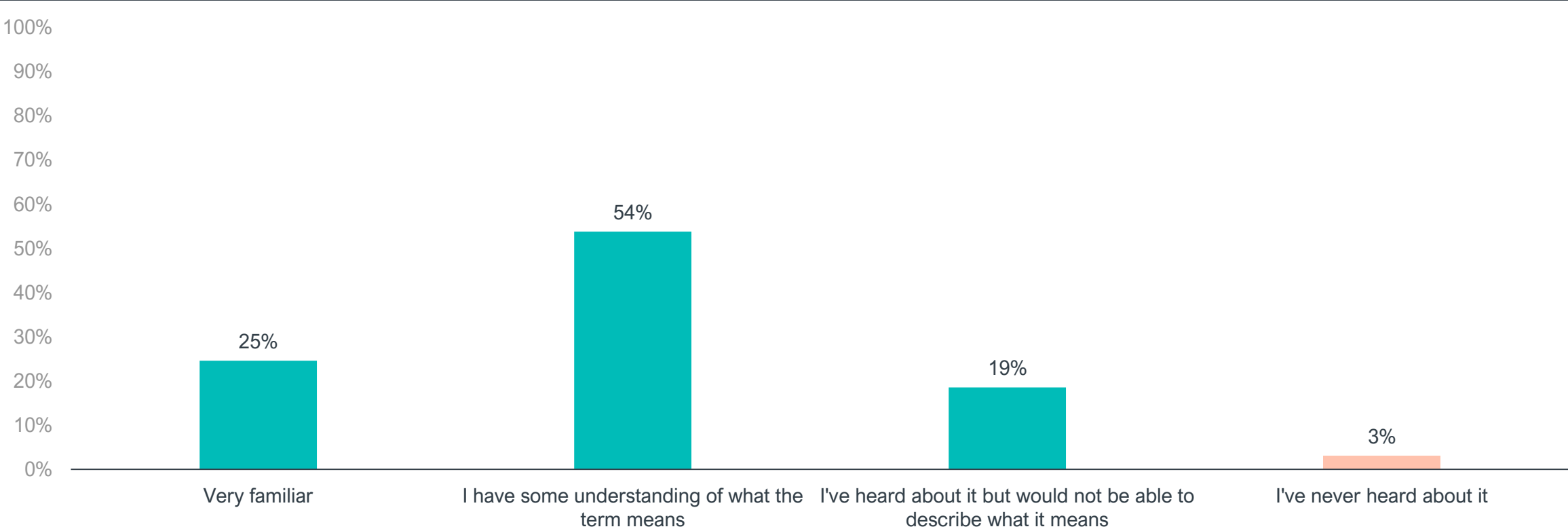

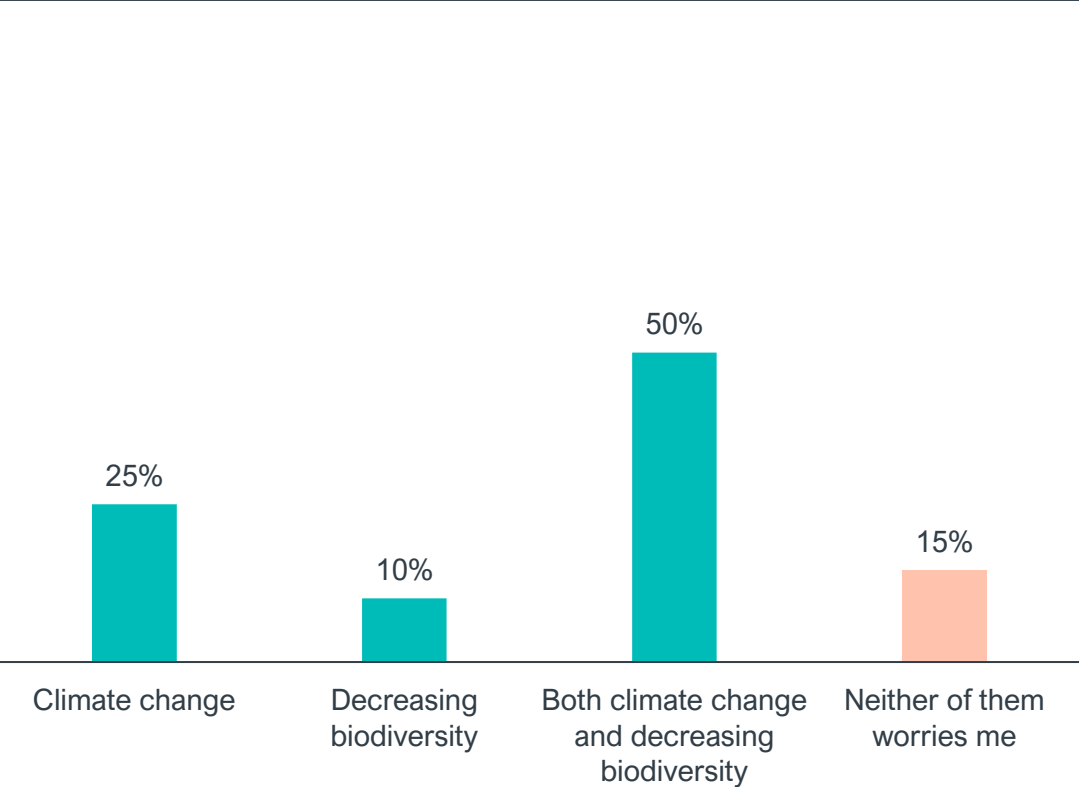

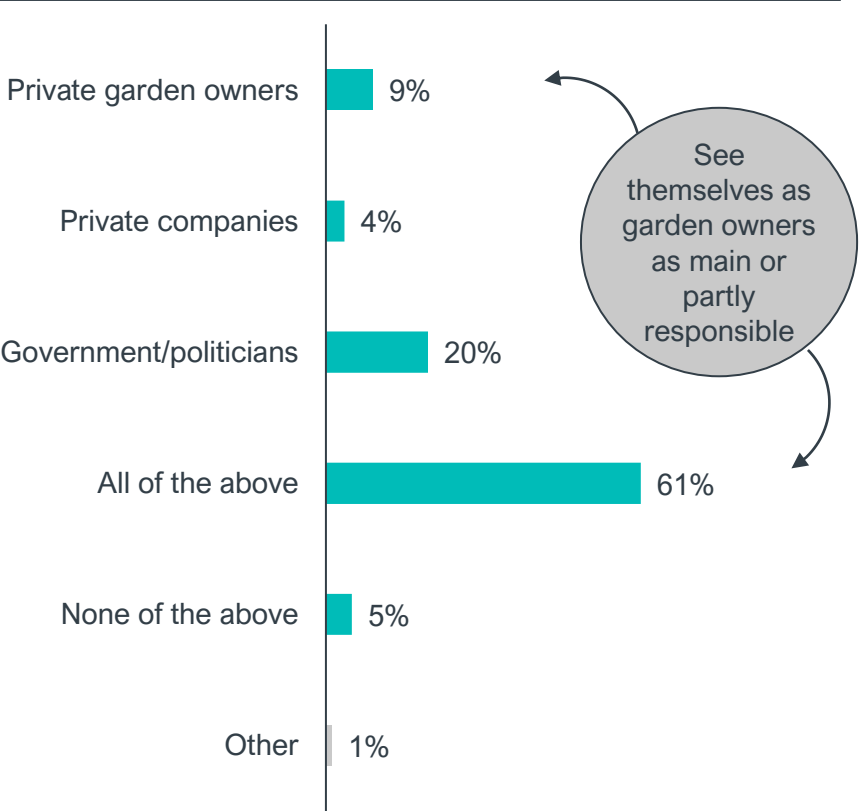

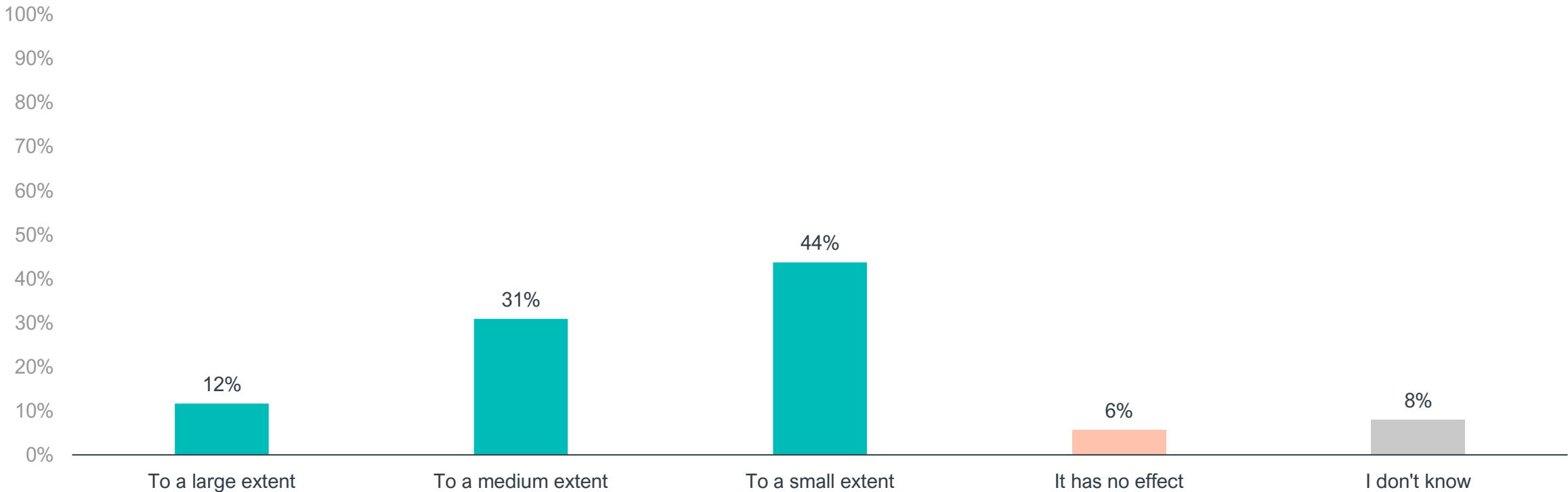

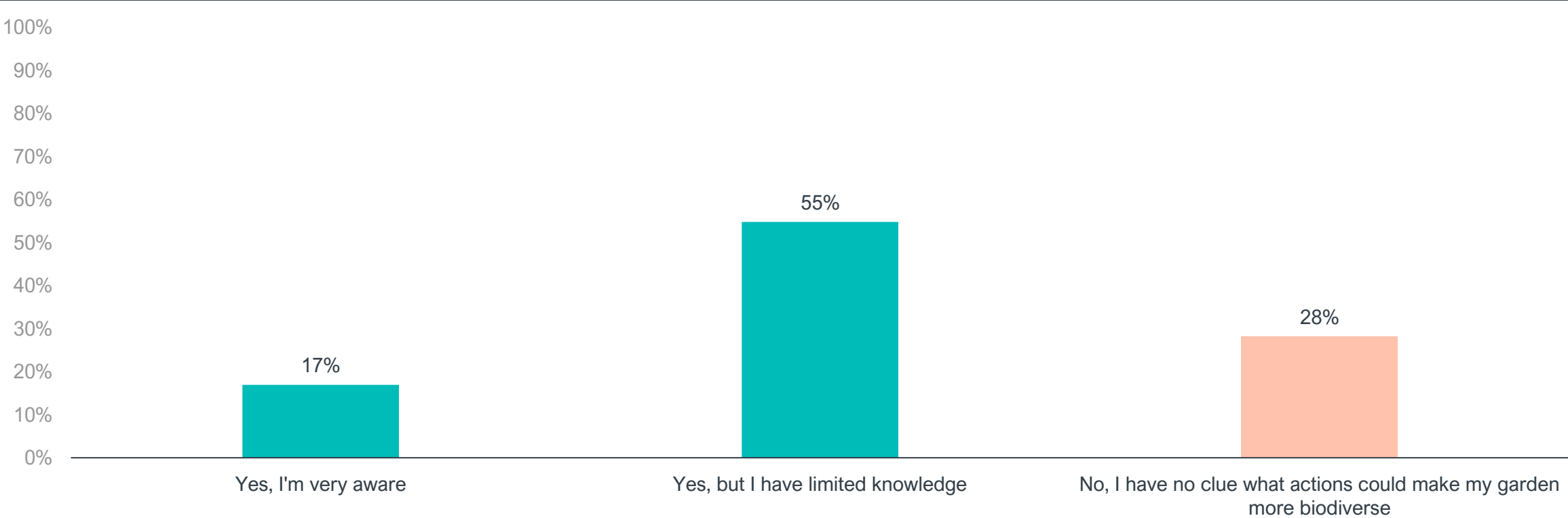

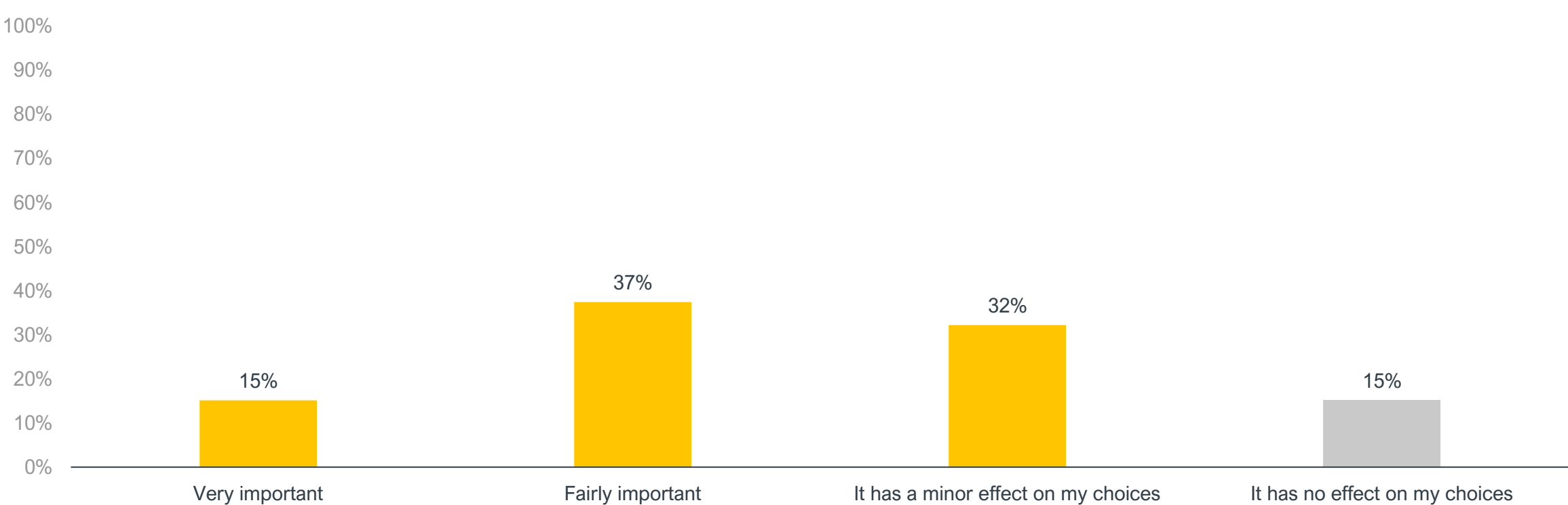

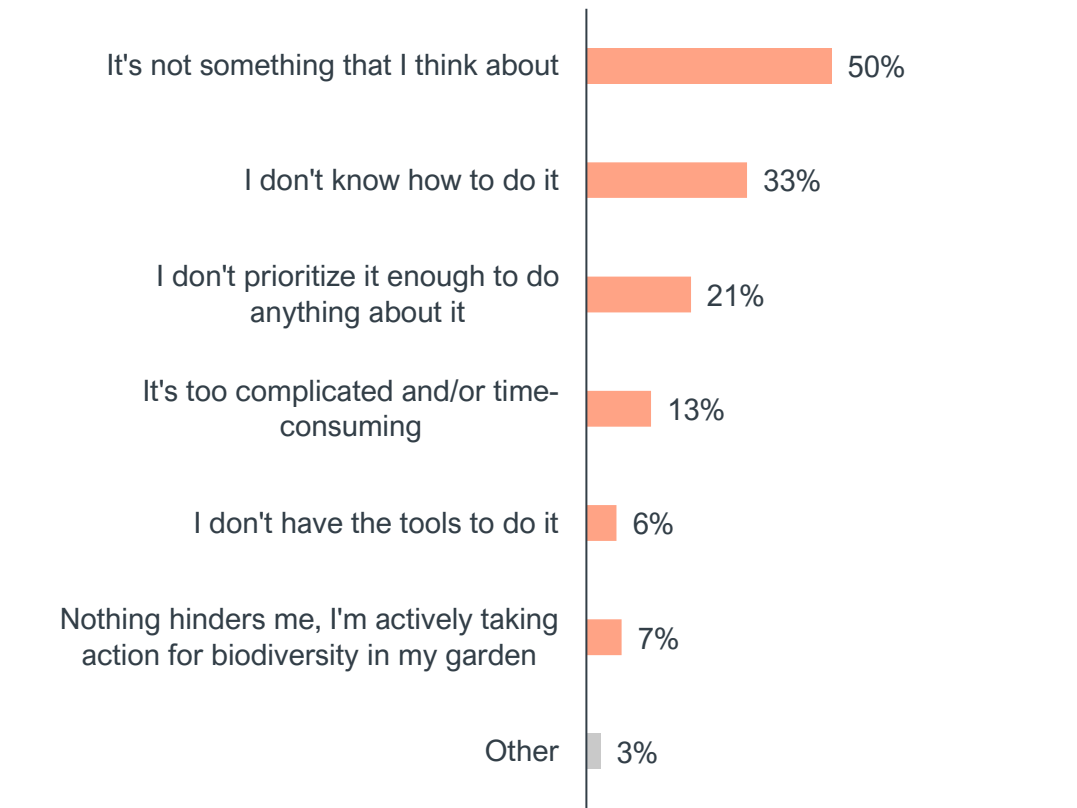

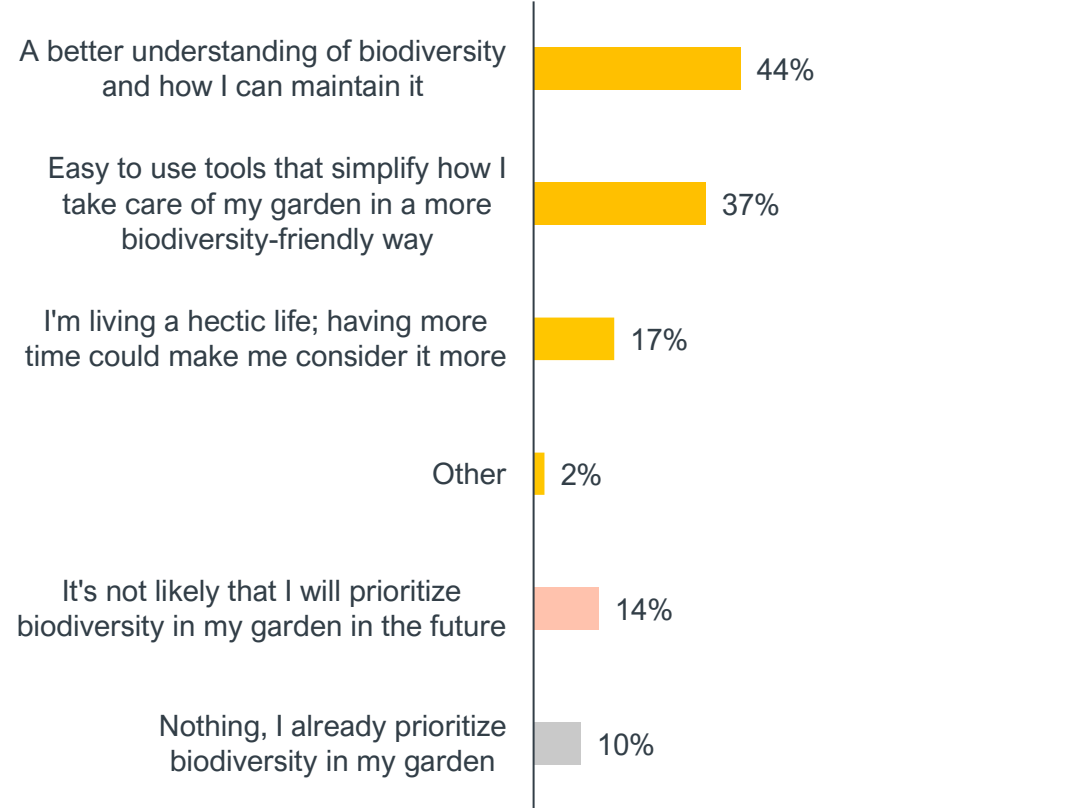

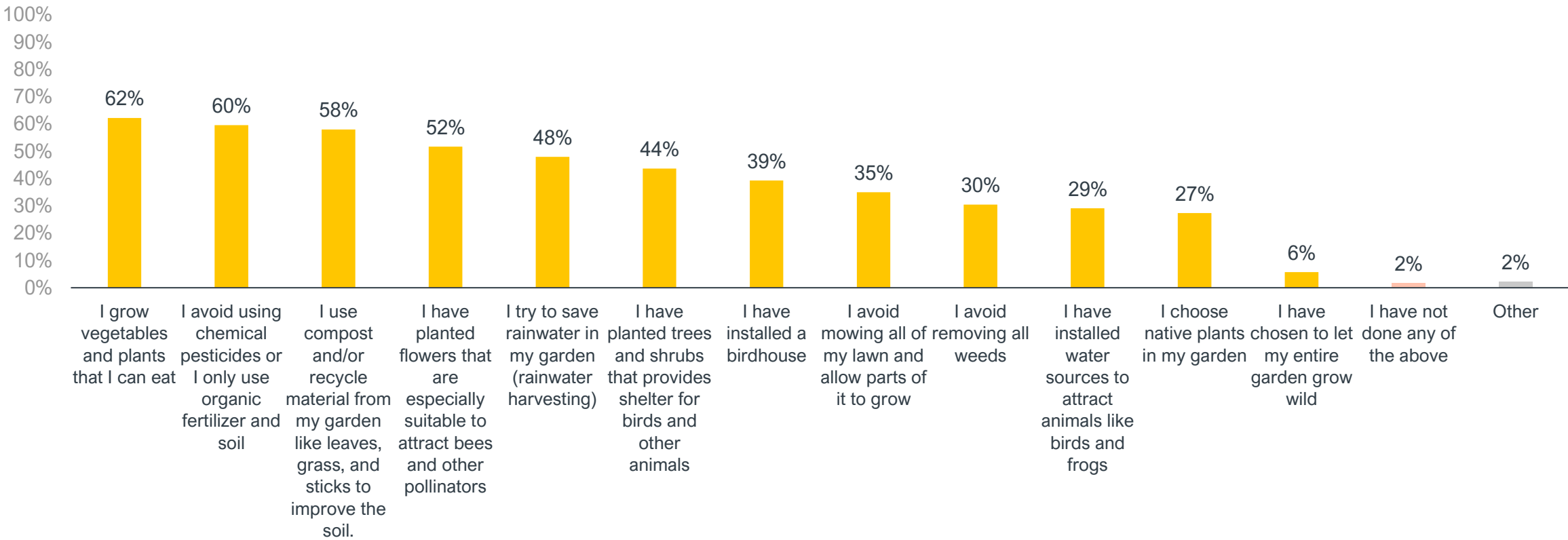

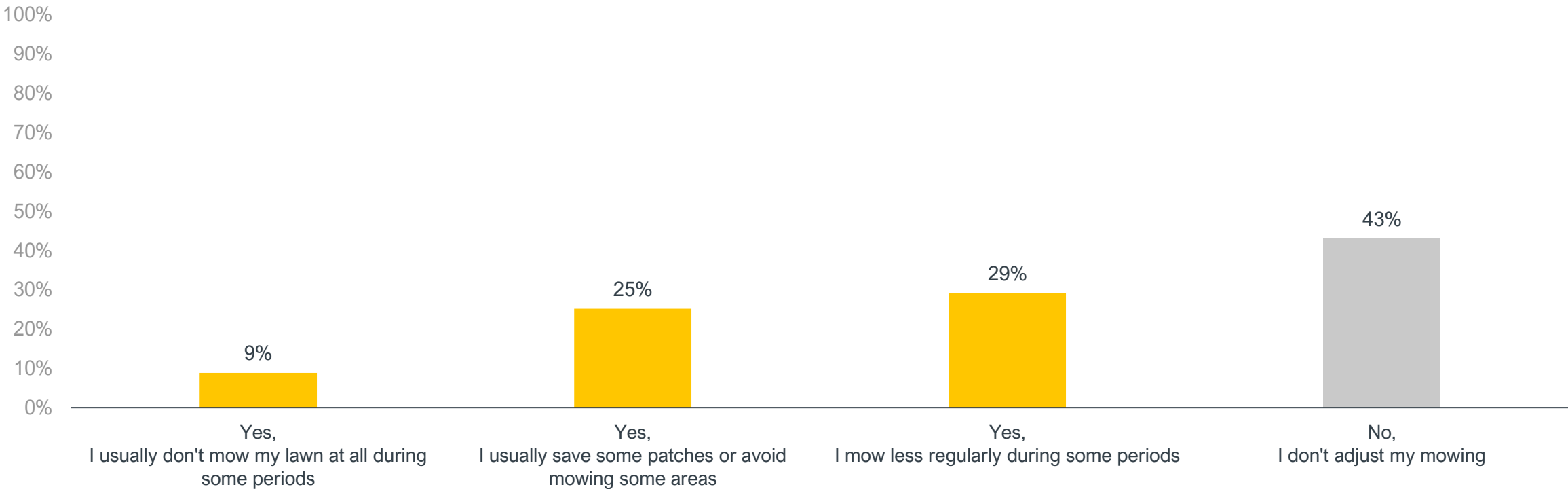

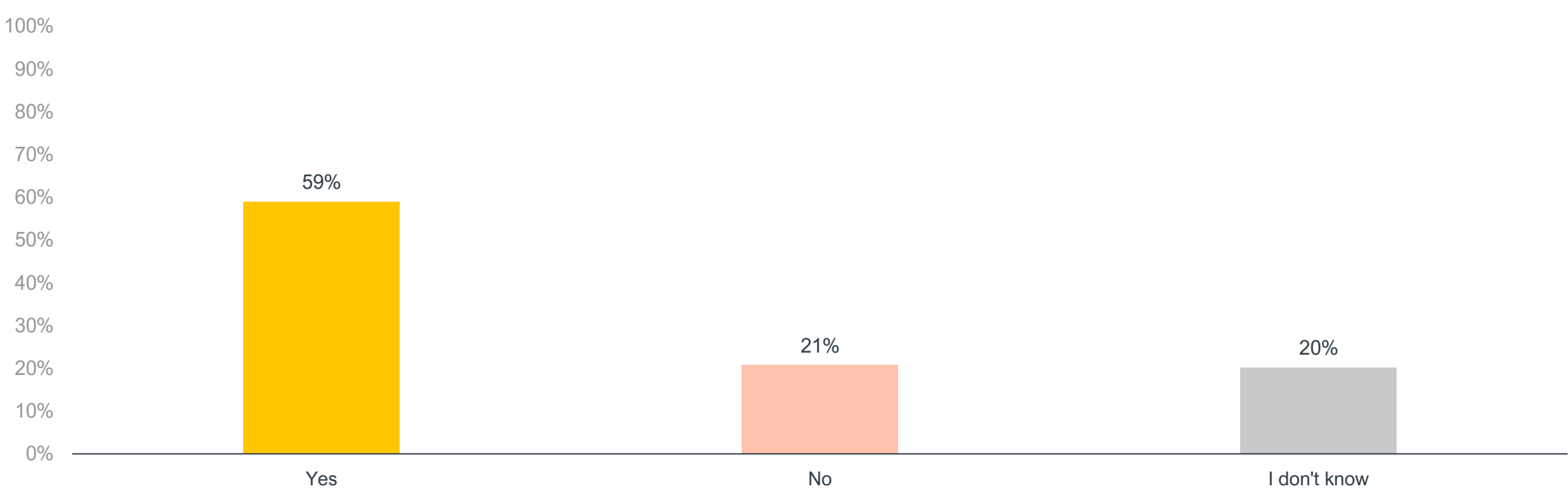

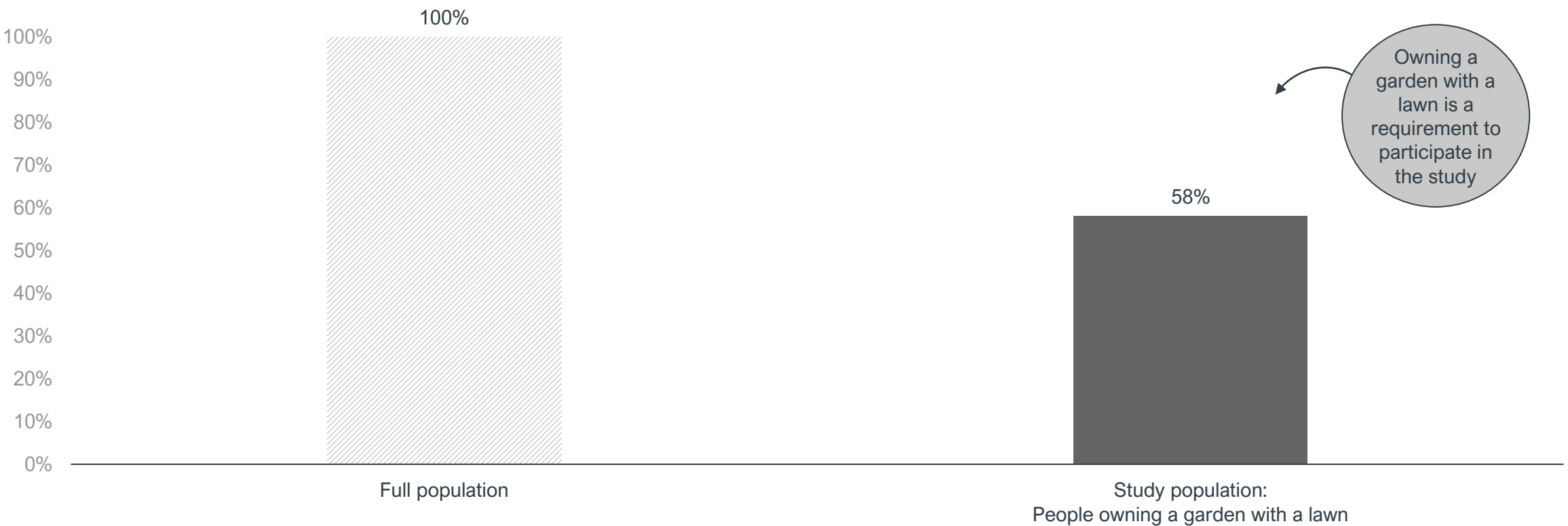

Share of population owning a garden with a lawn



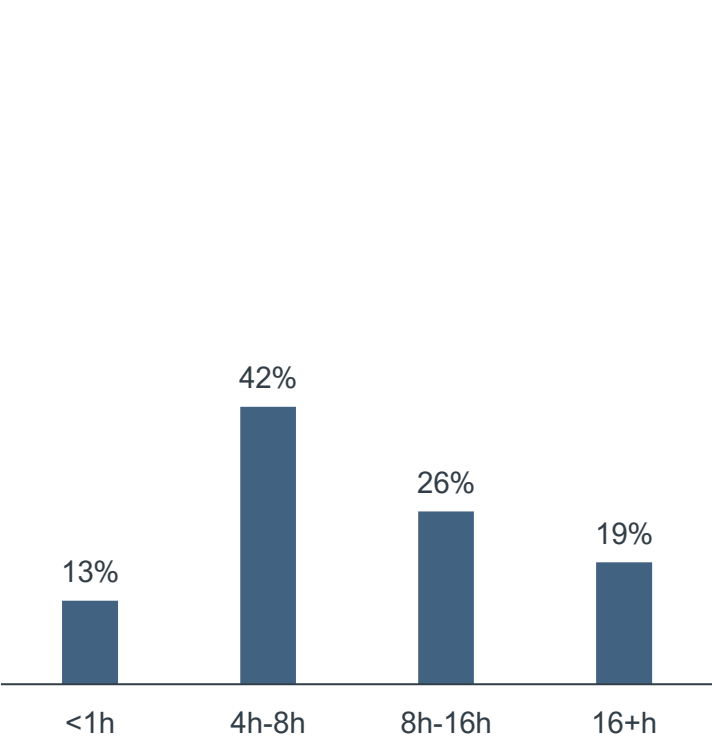

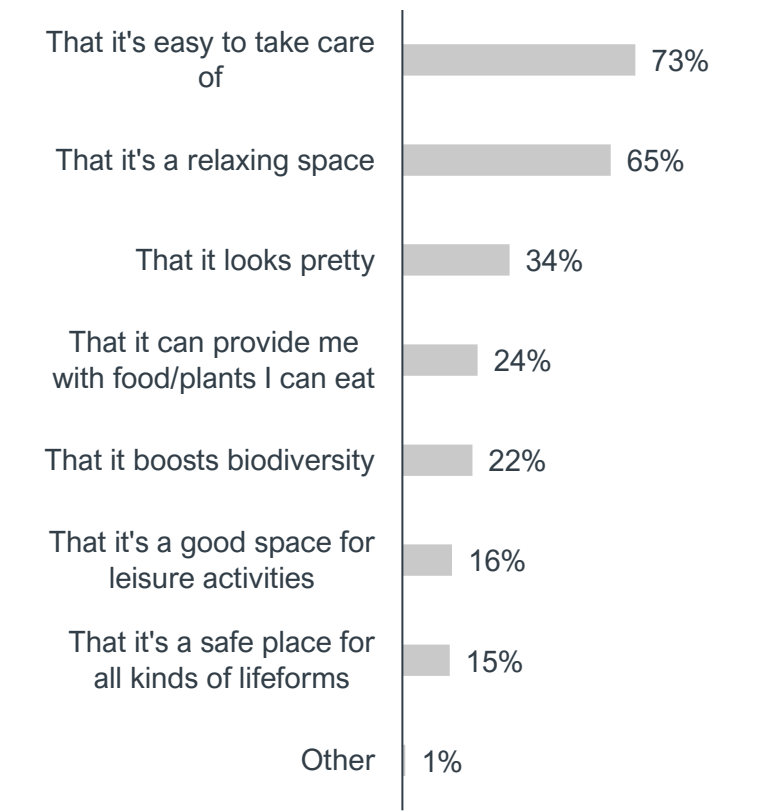

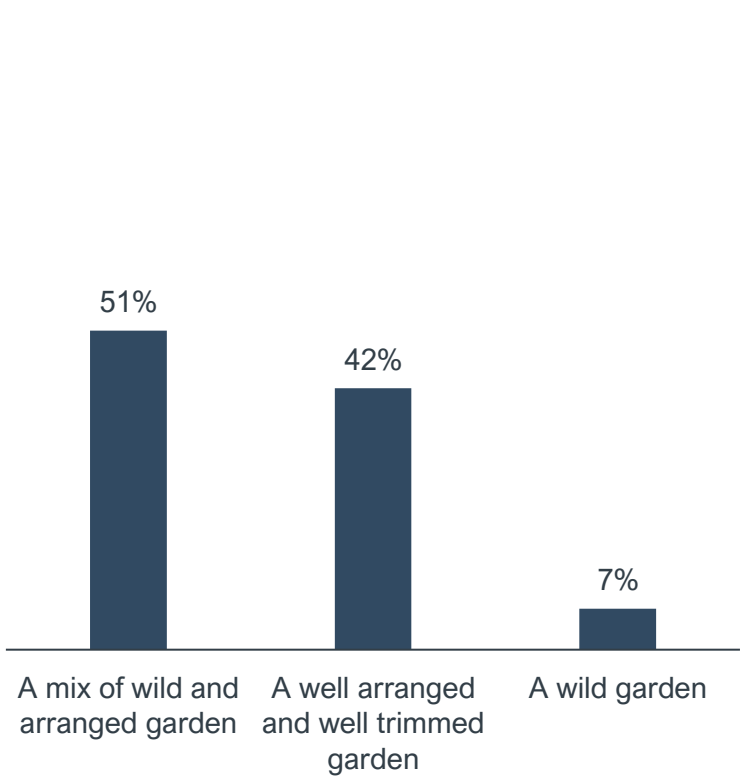
Time spend gardening during season

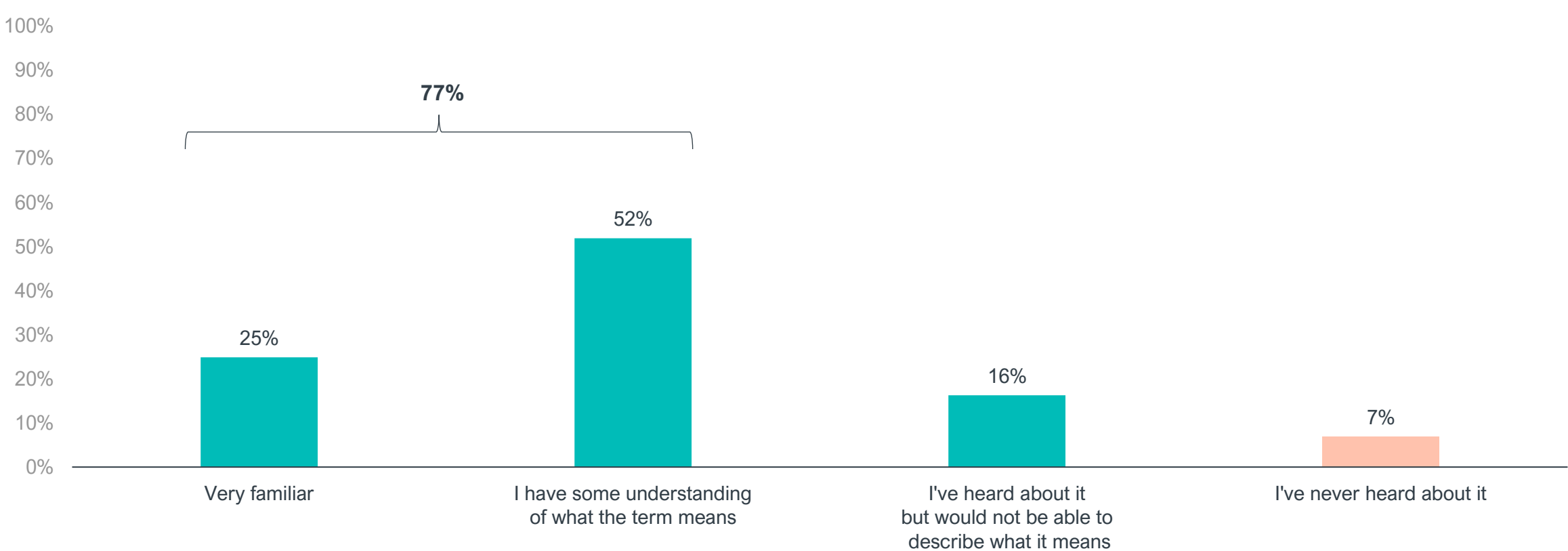

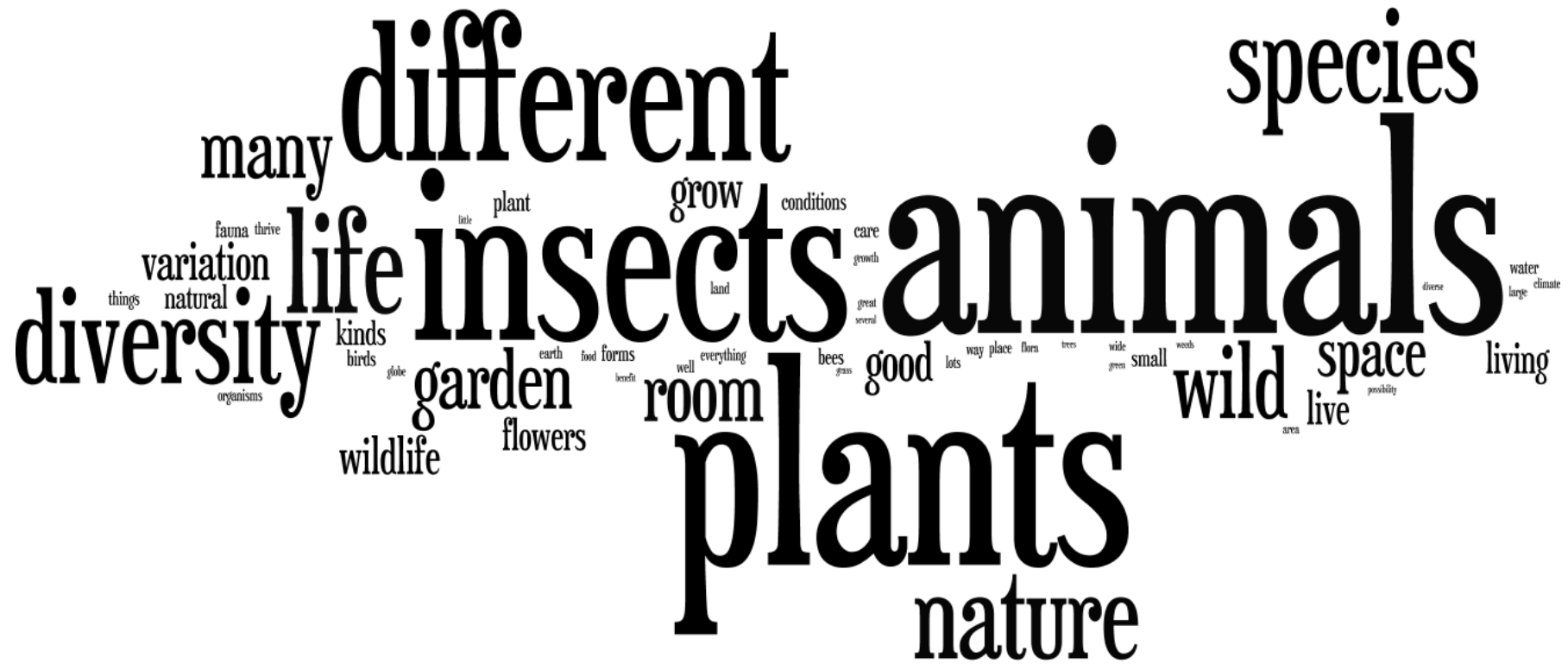

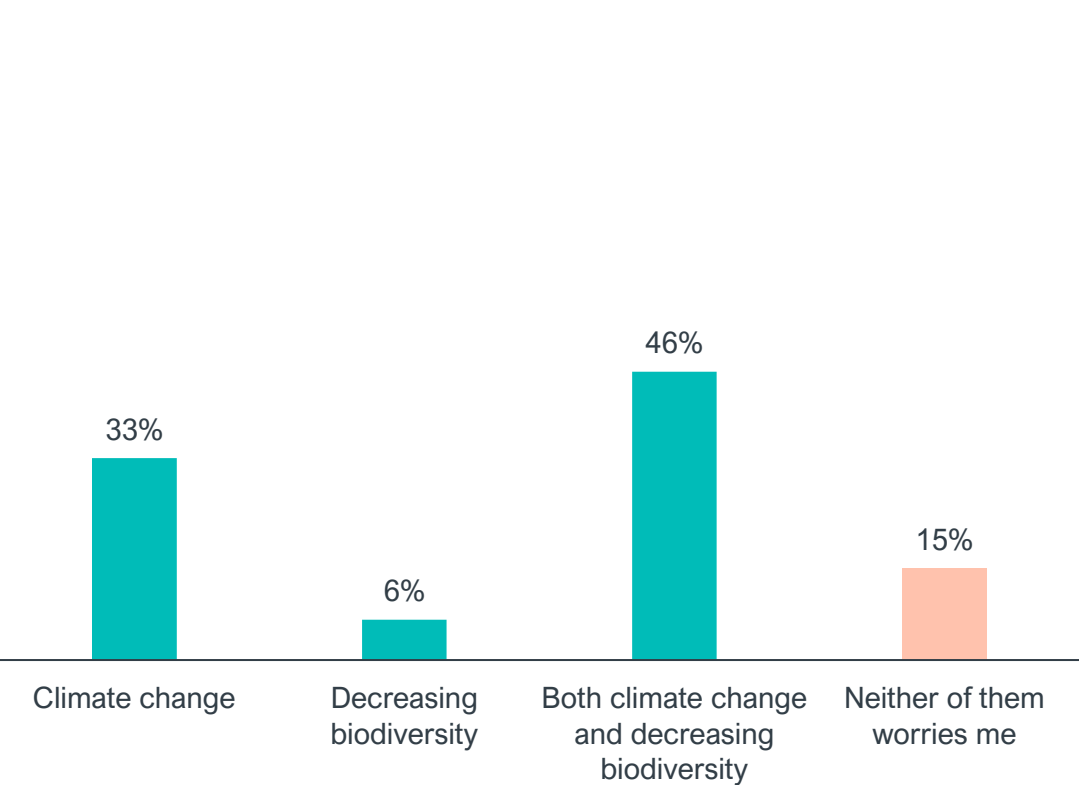

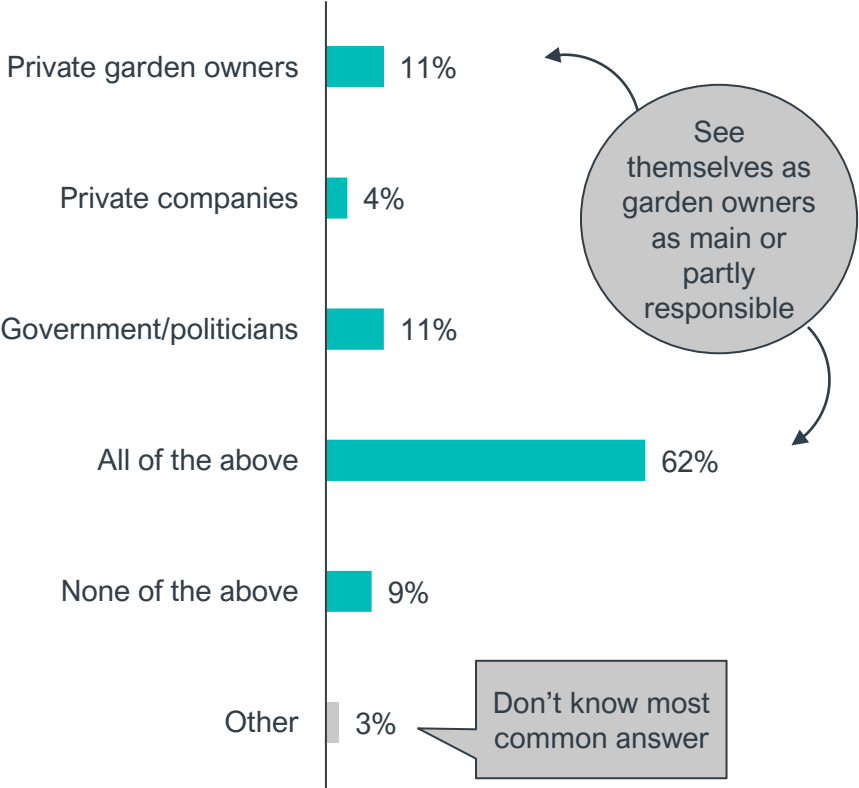

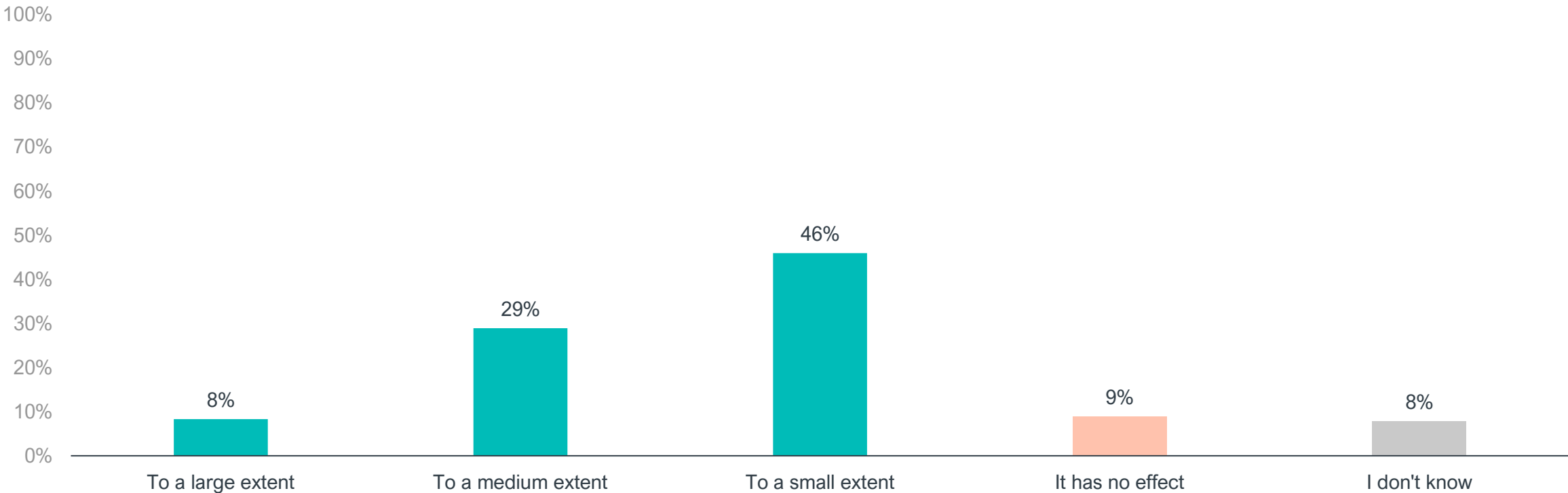

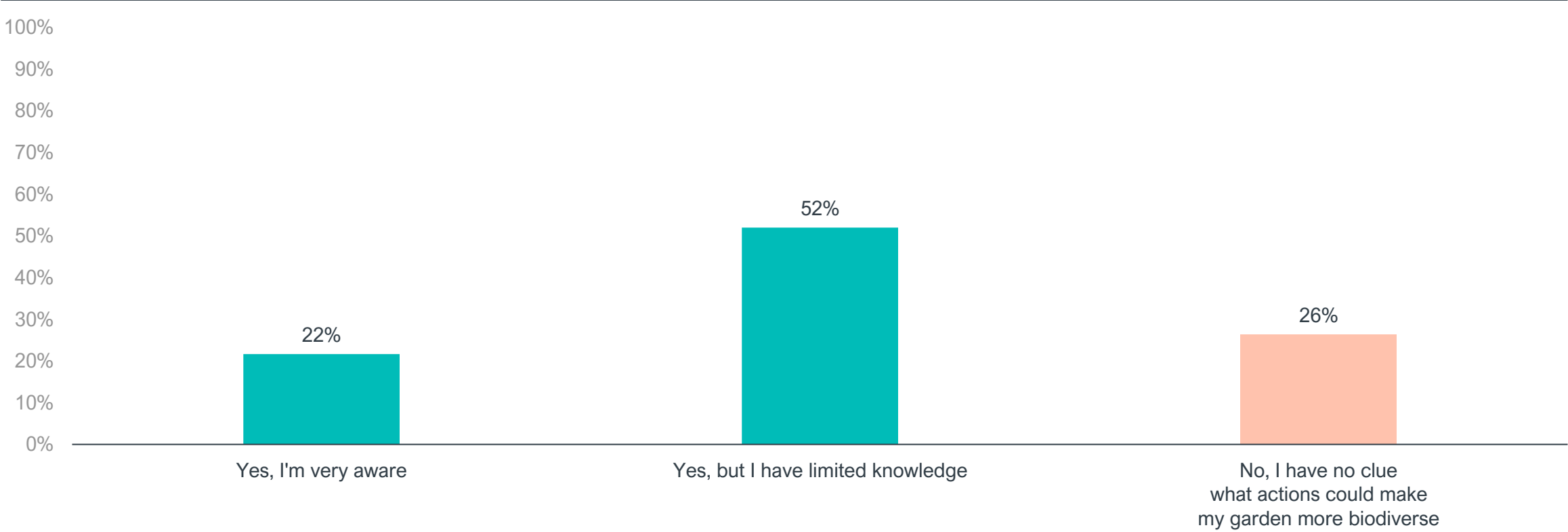

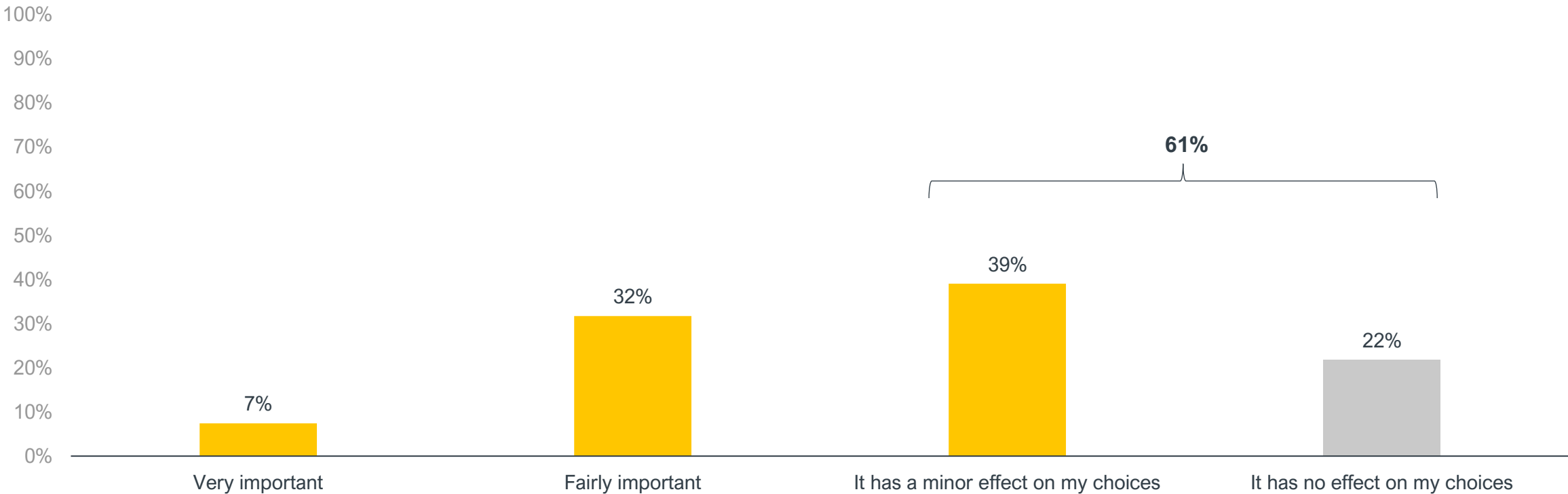

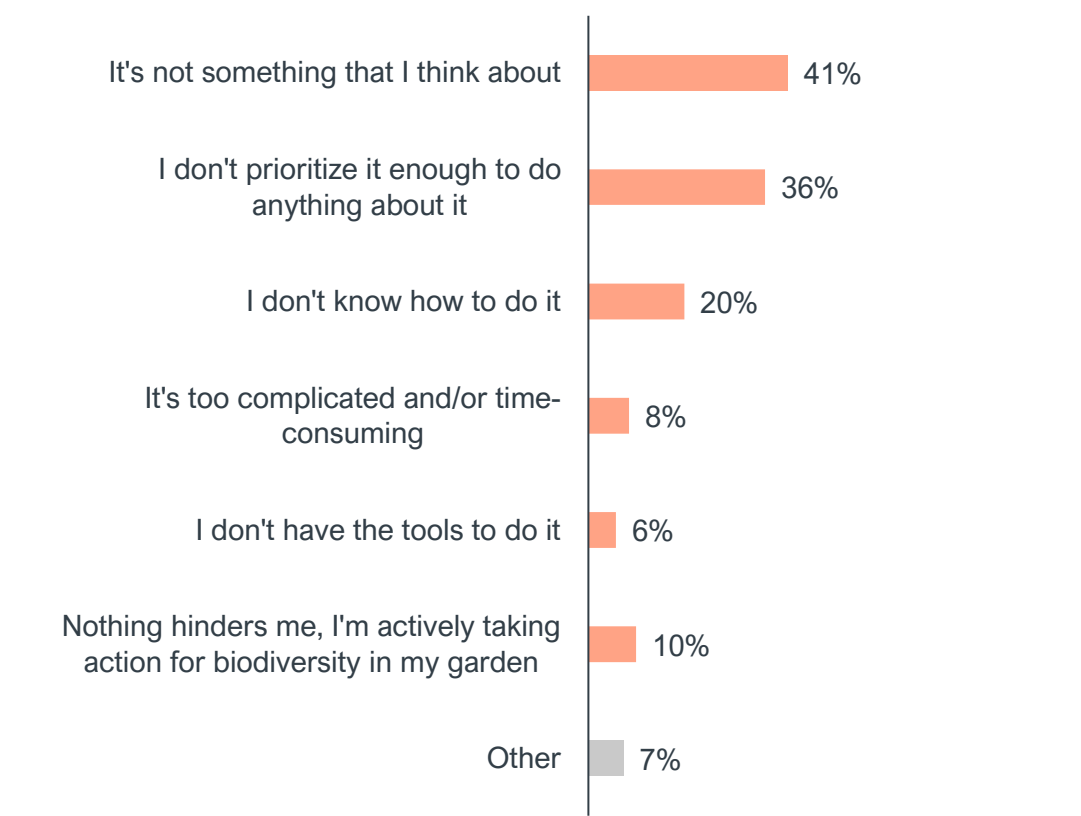

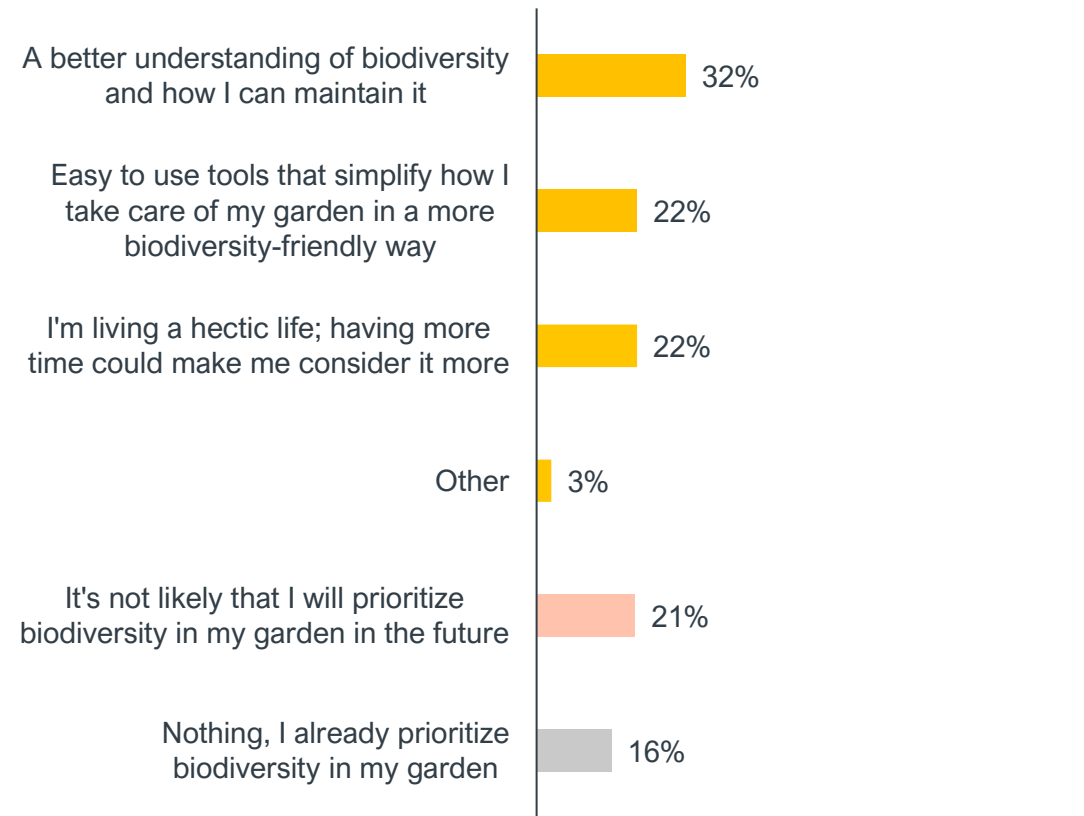

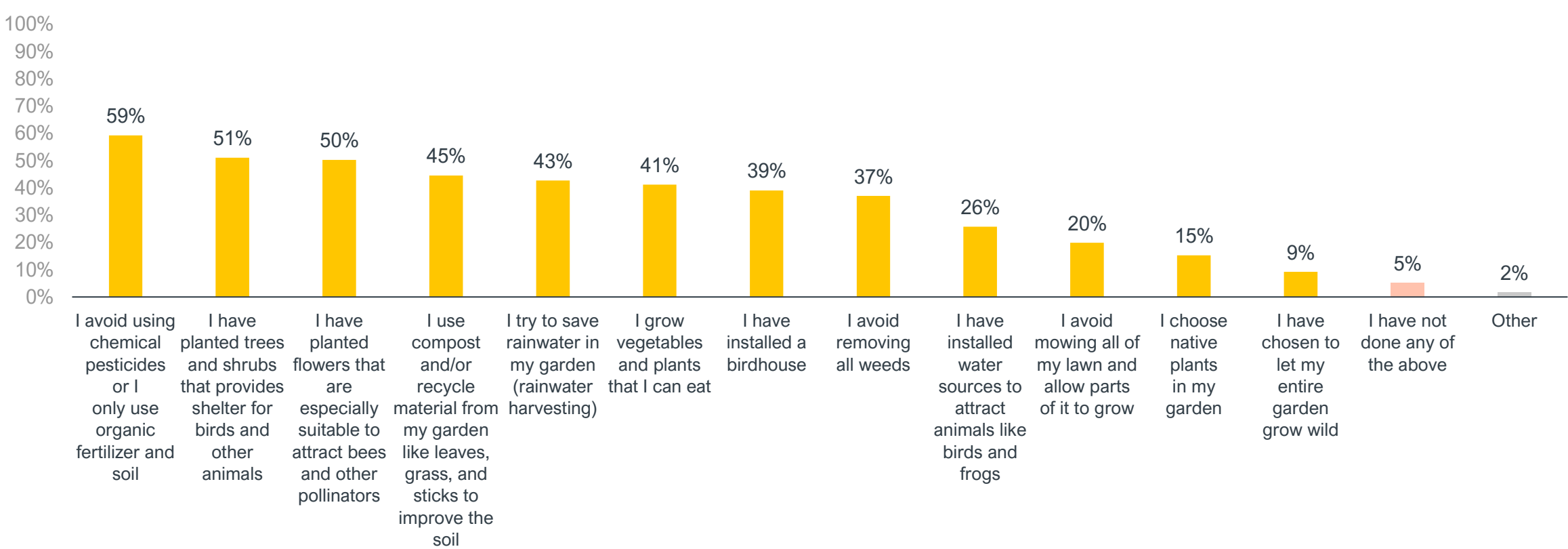

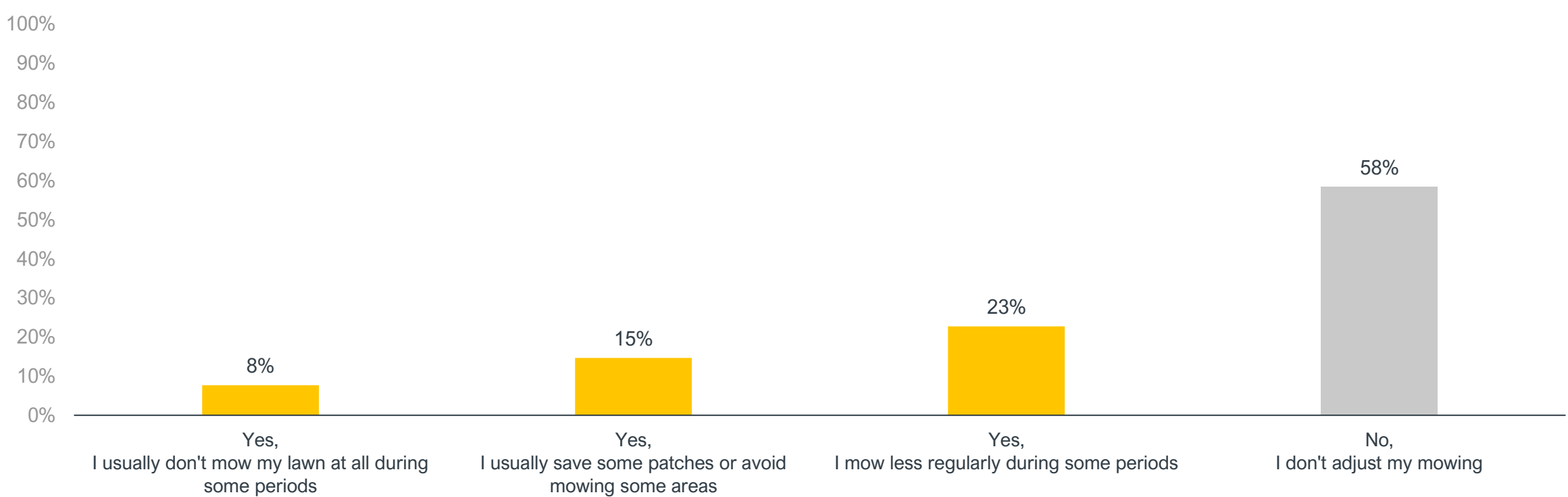

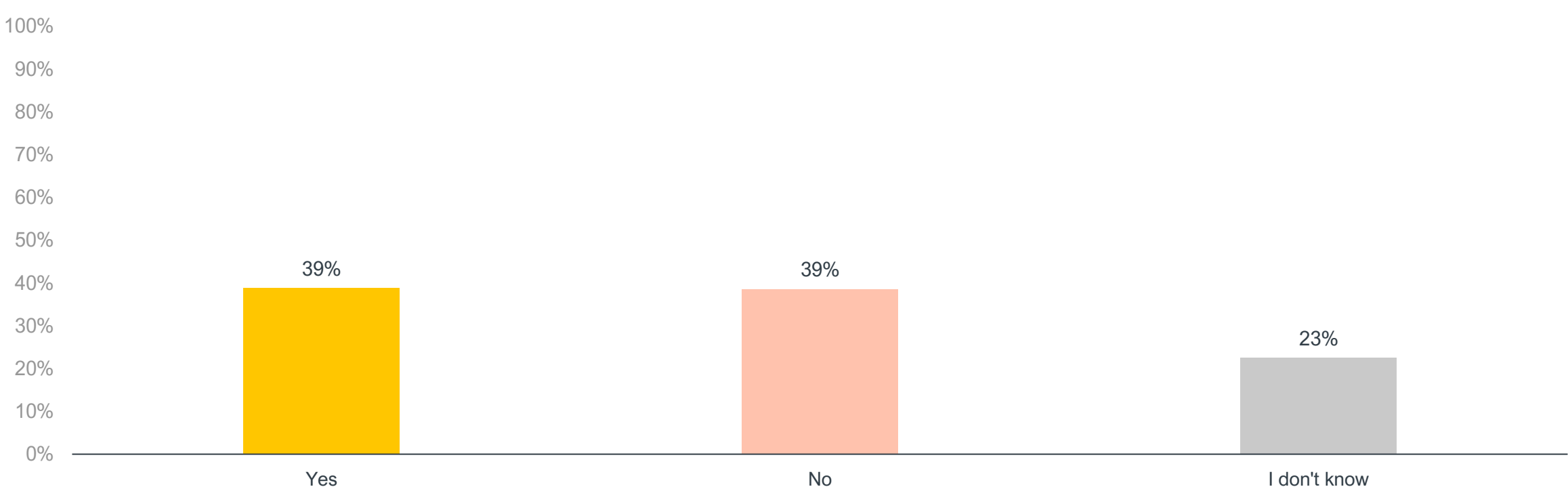

Share of population owning a garden with a lawn



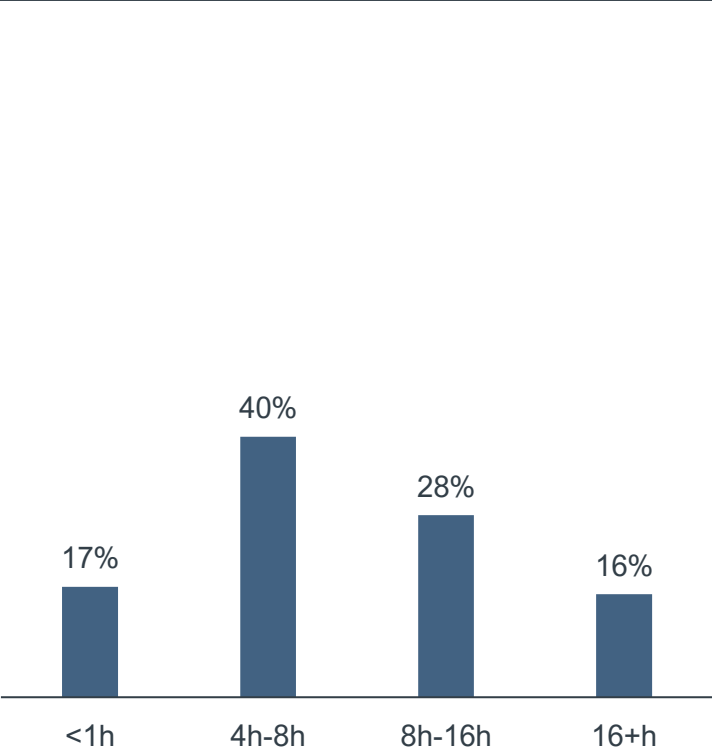

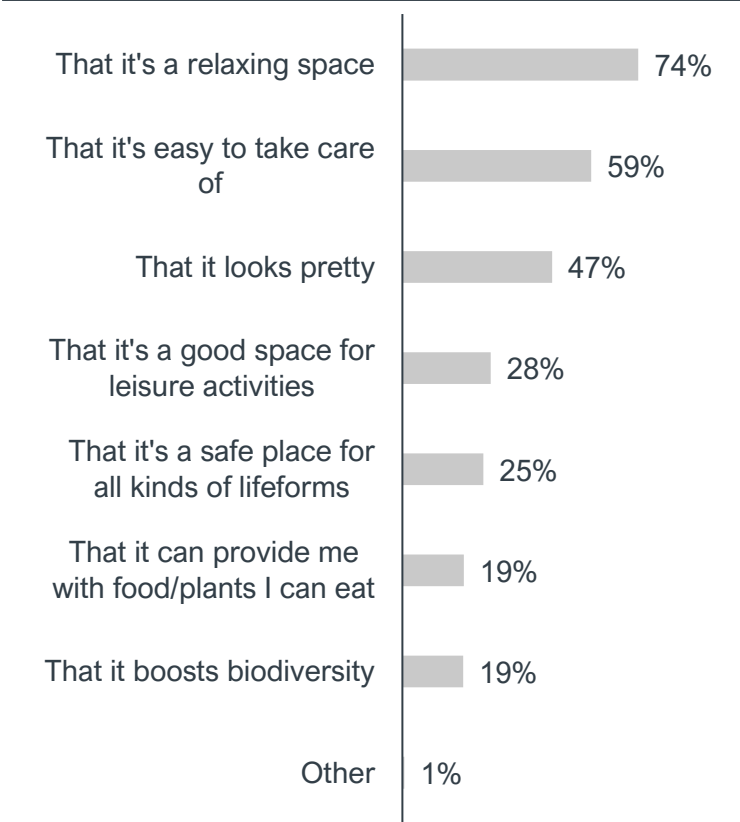

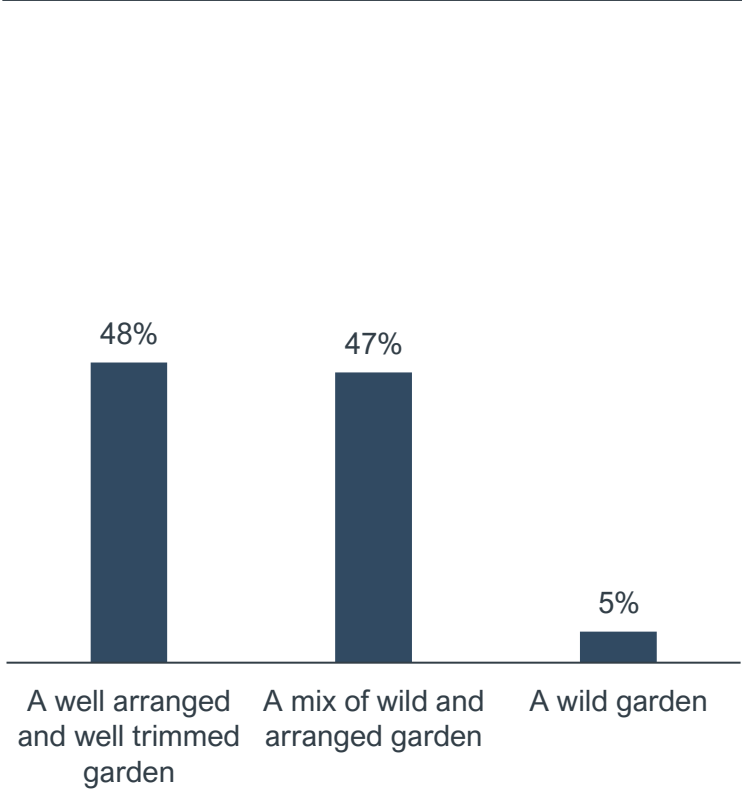
Time spend gardening during season

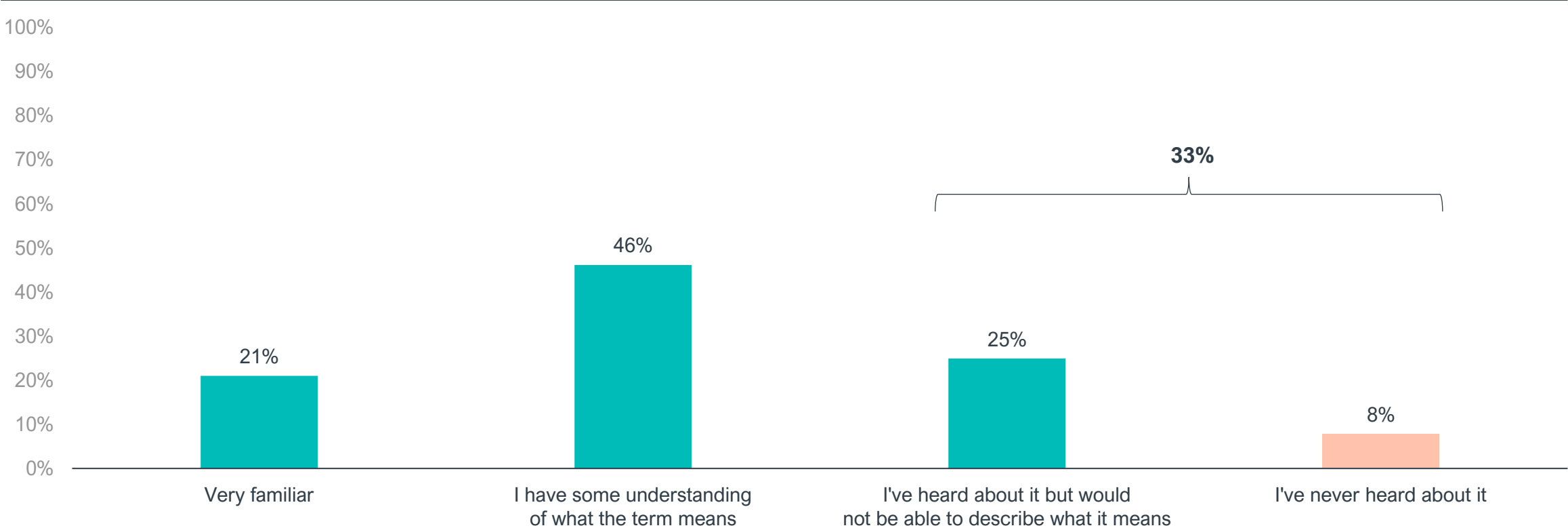

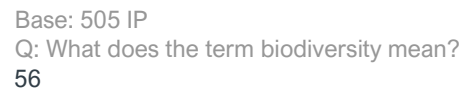


Awareness/familiarity with the term Biodiversity, % of lawn owners

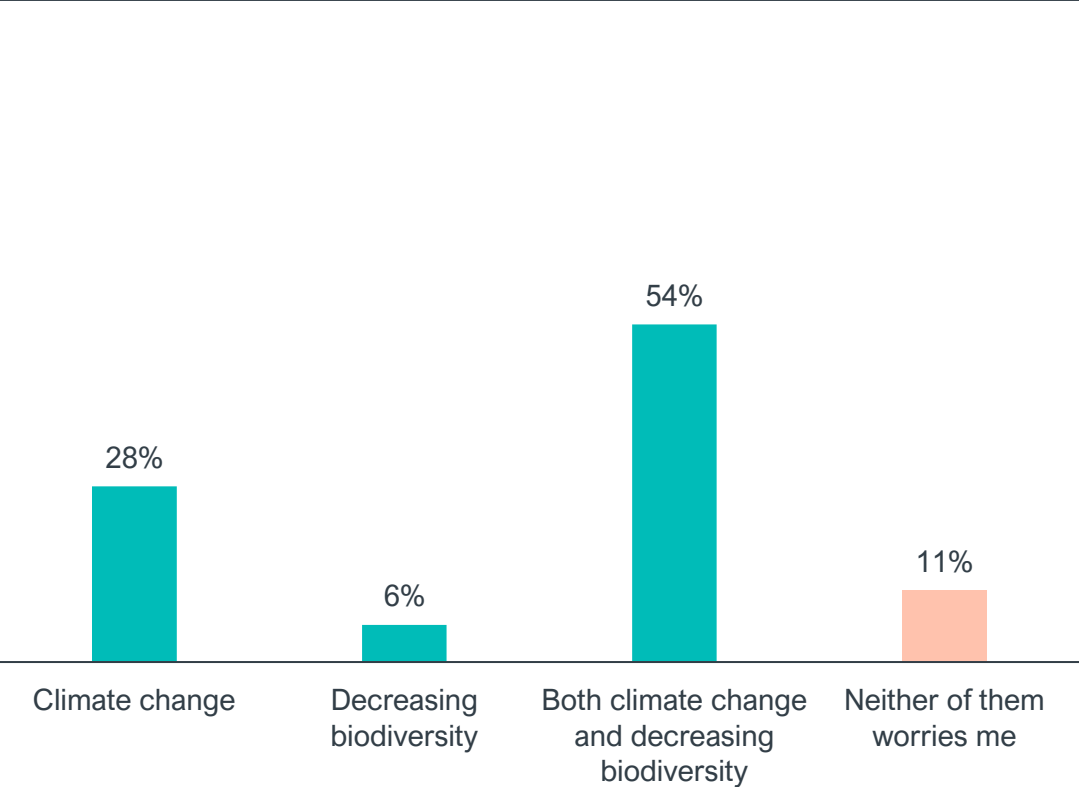

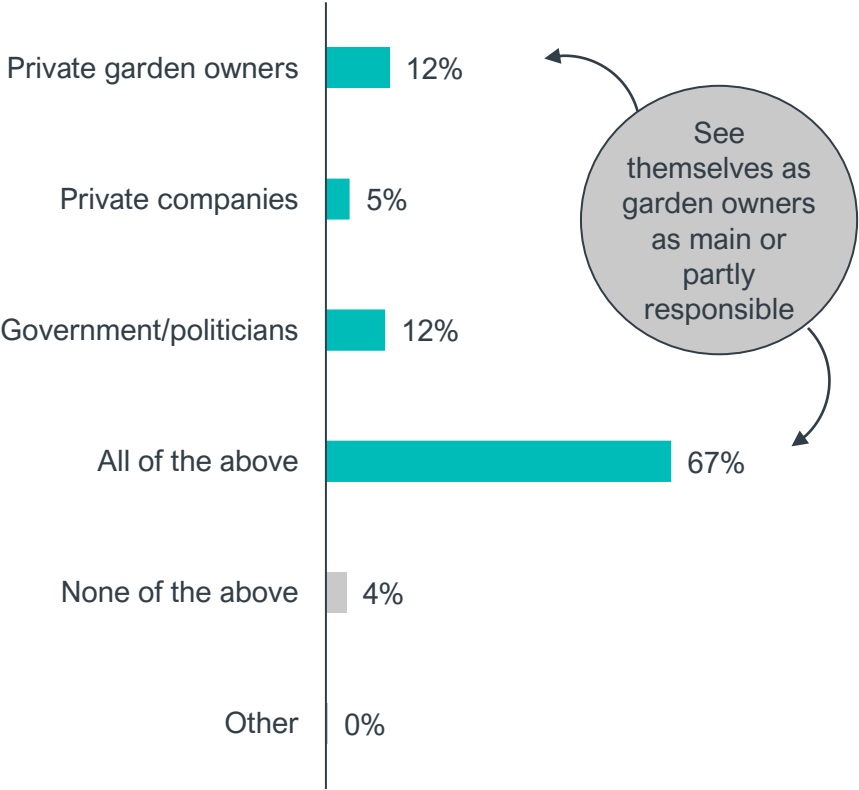

Greatest responsibility in maintaining biodiversity



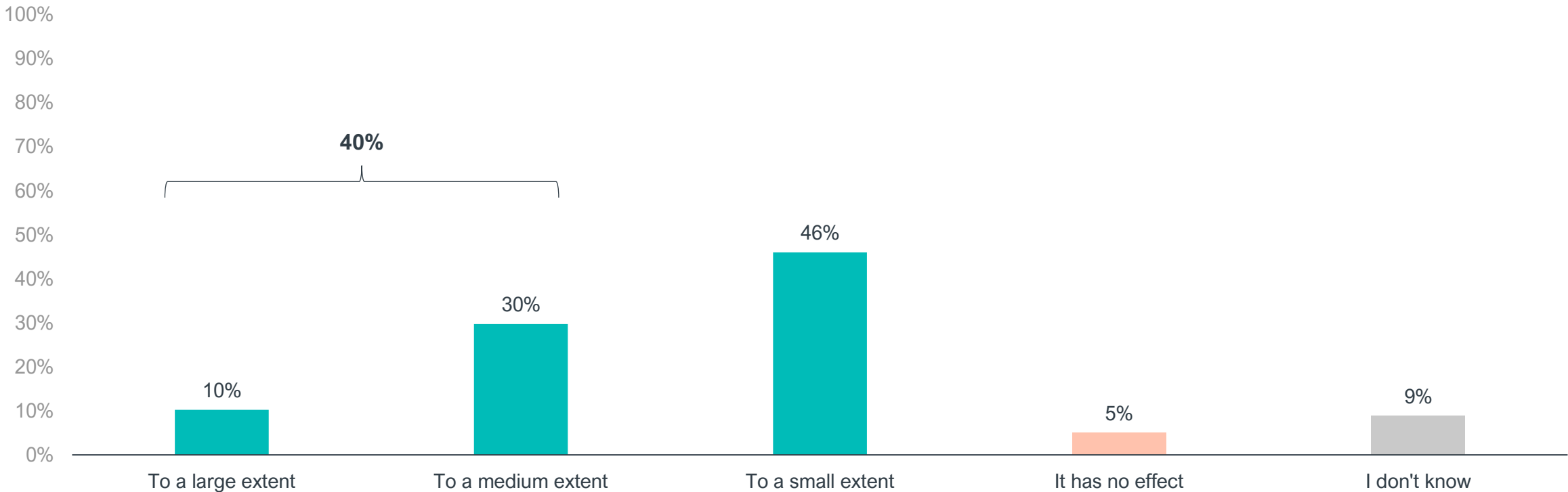

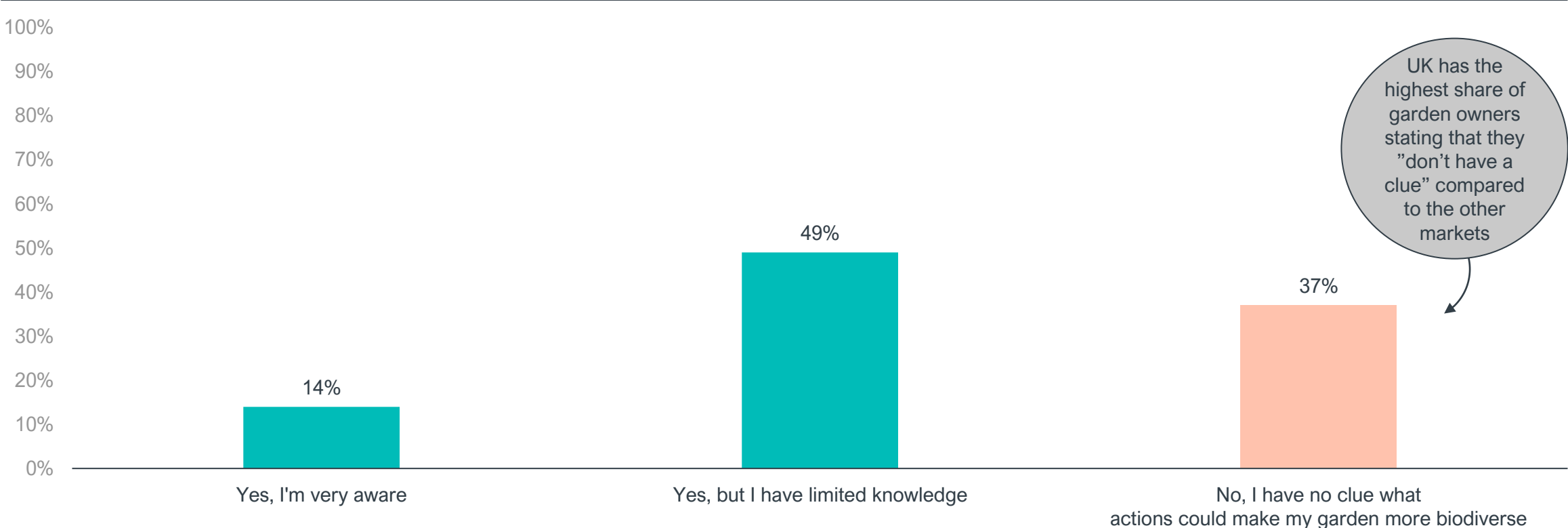

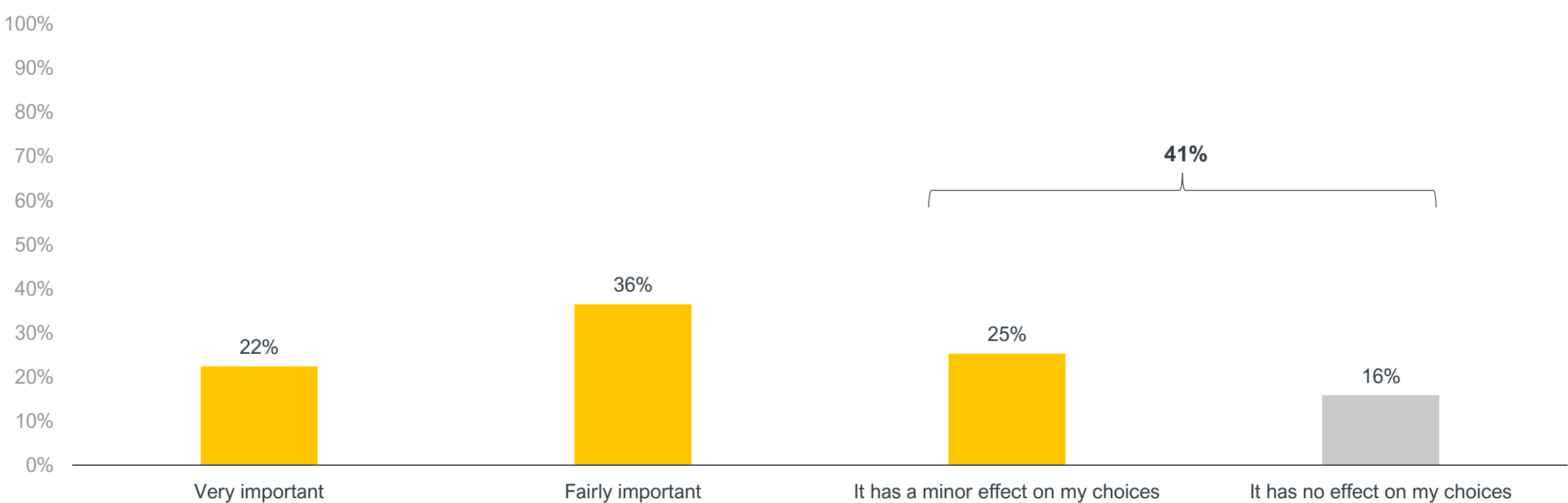

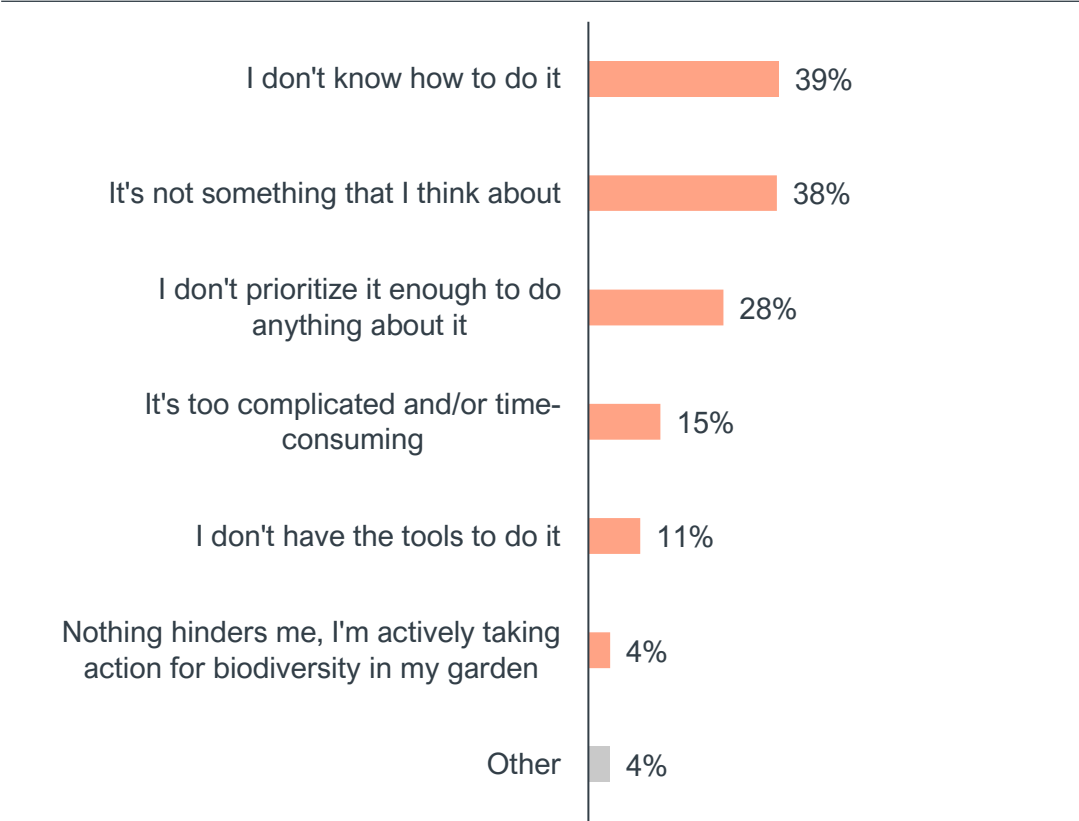

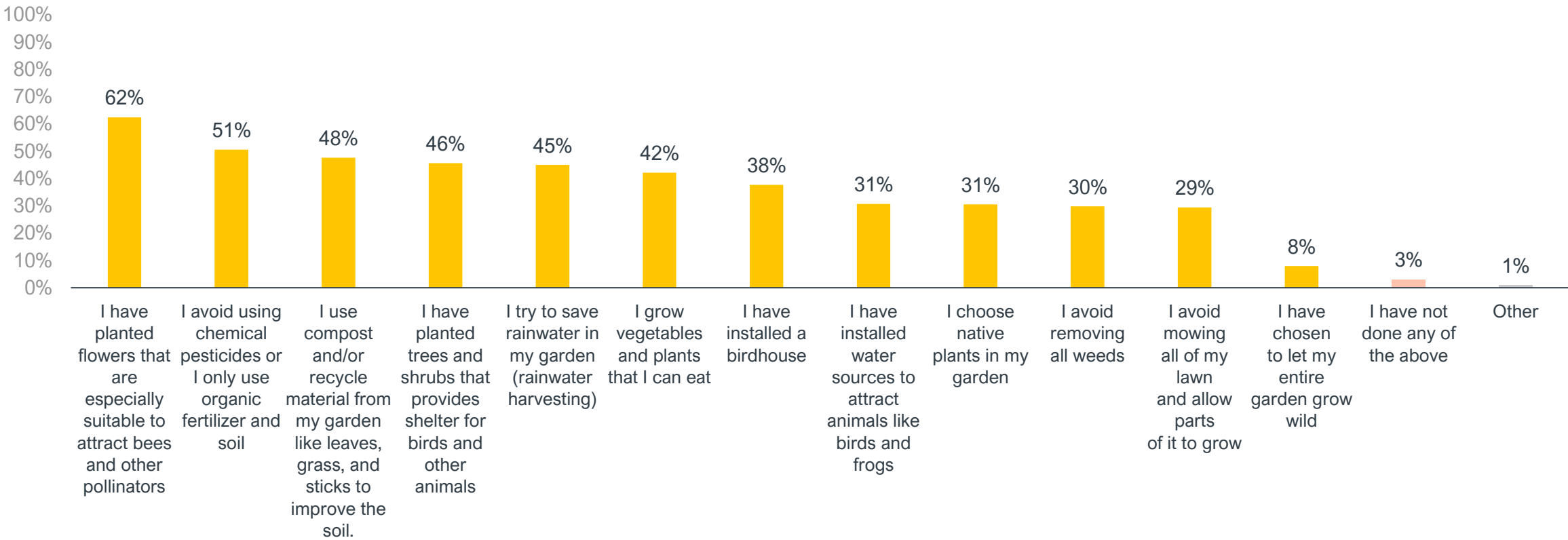

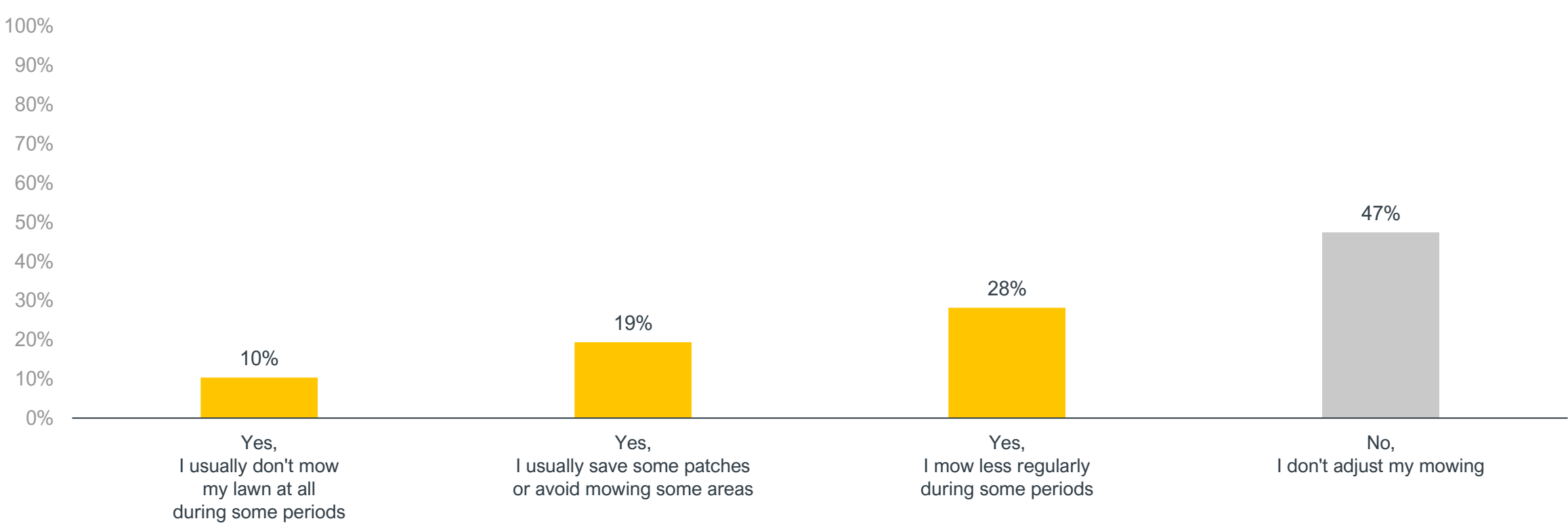

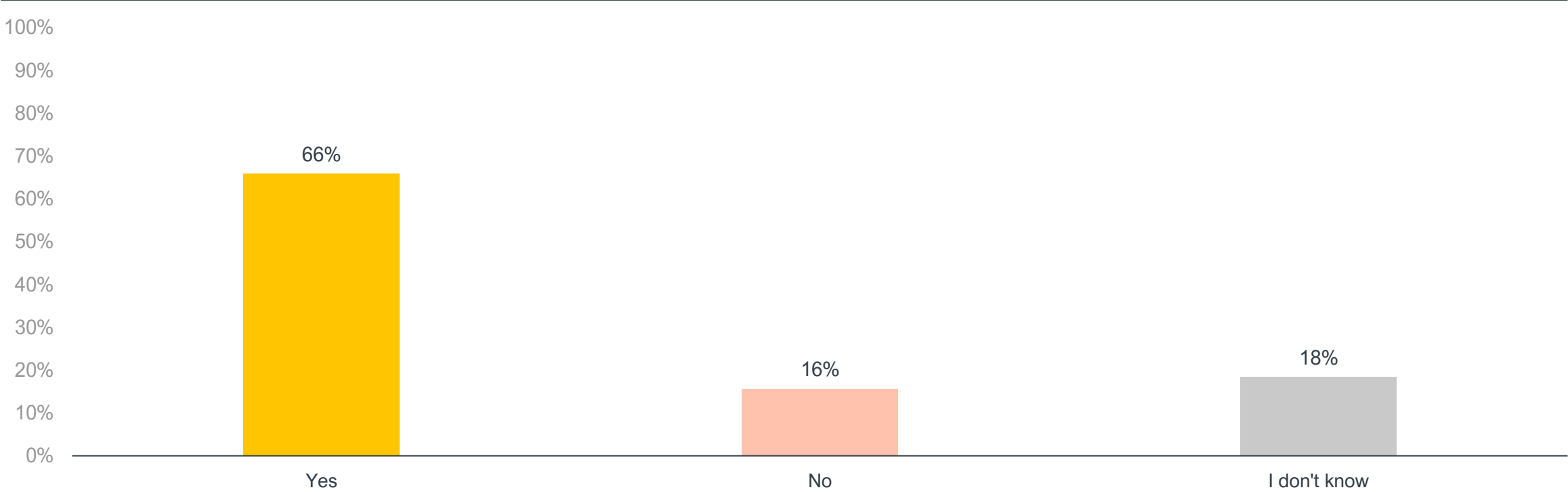

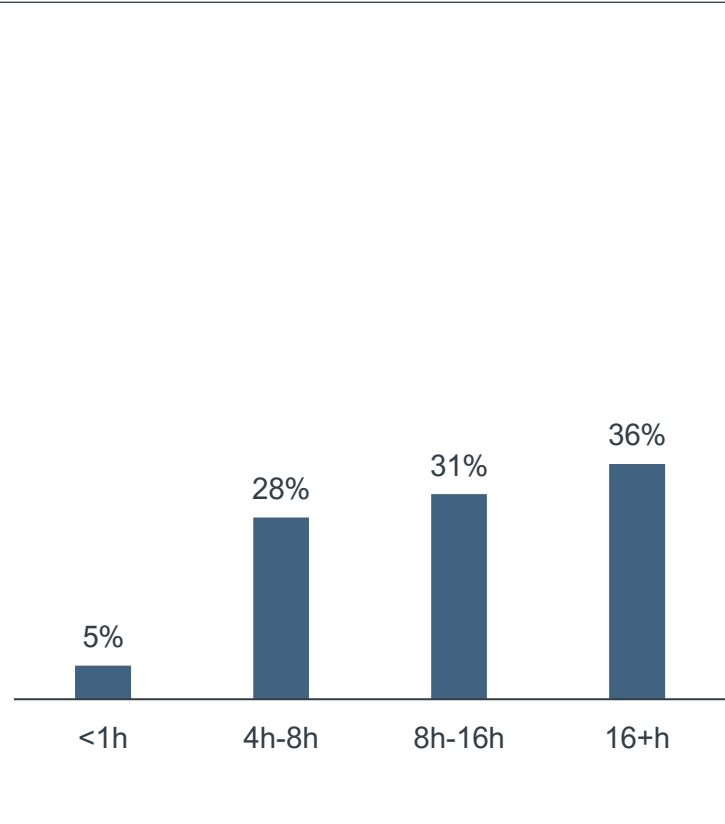

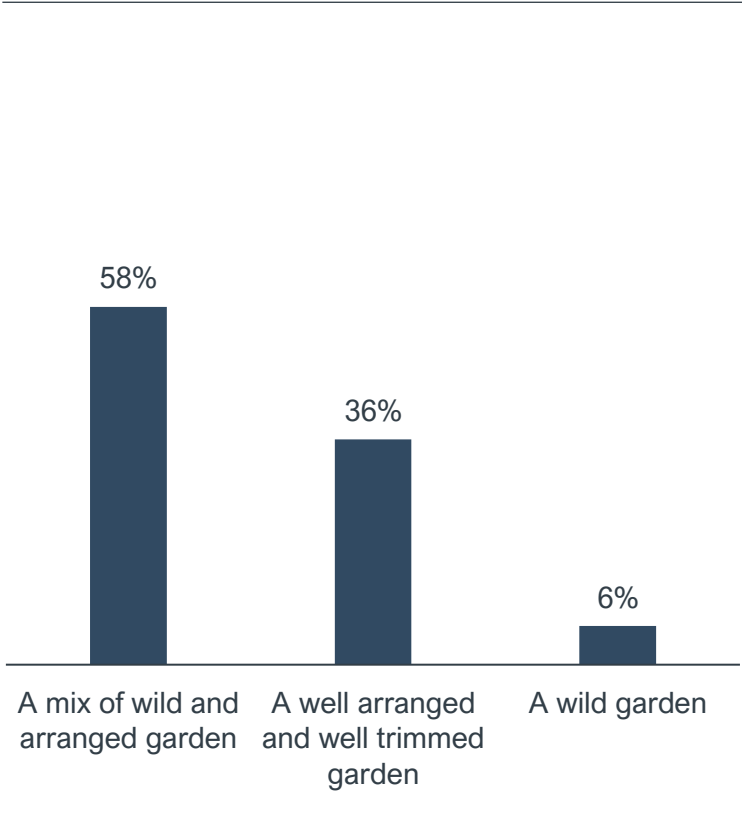

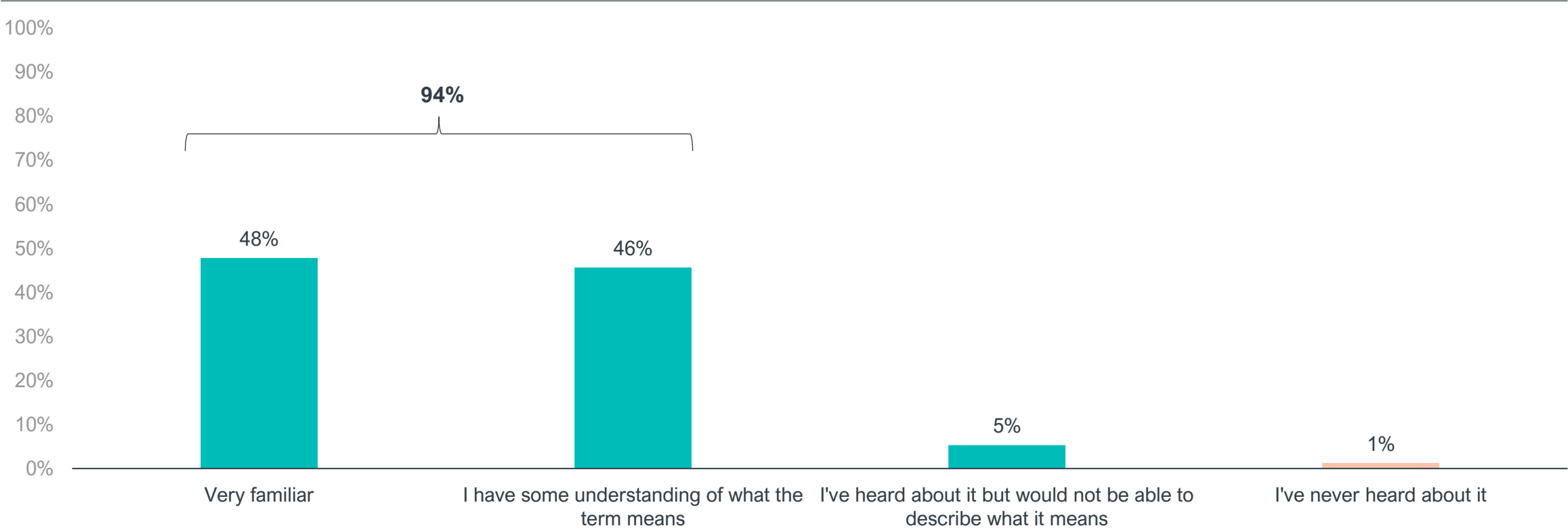

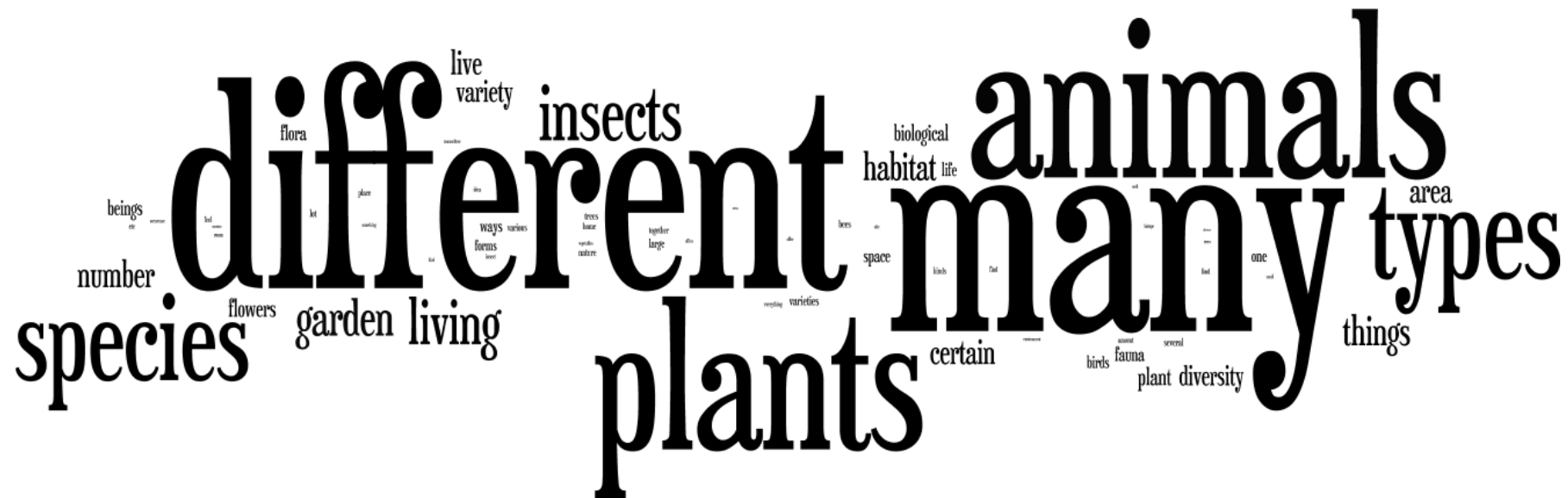

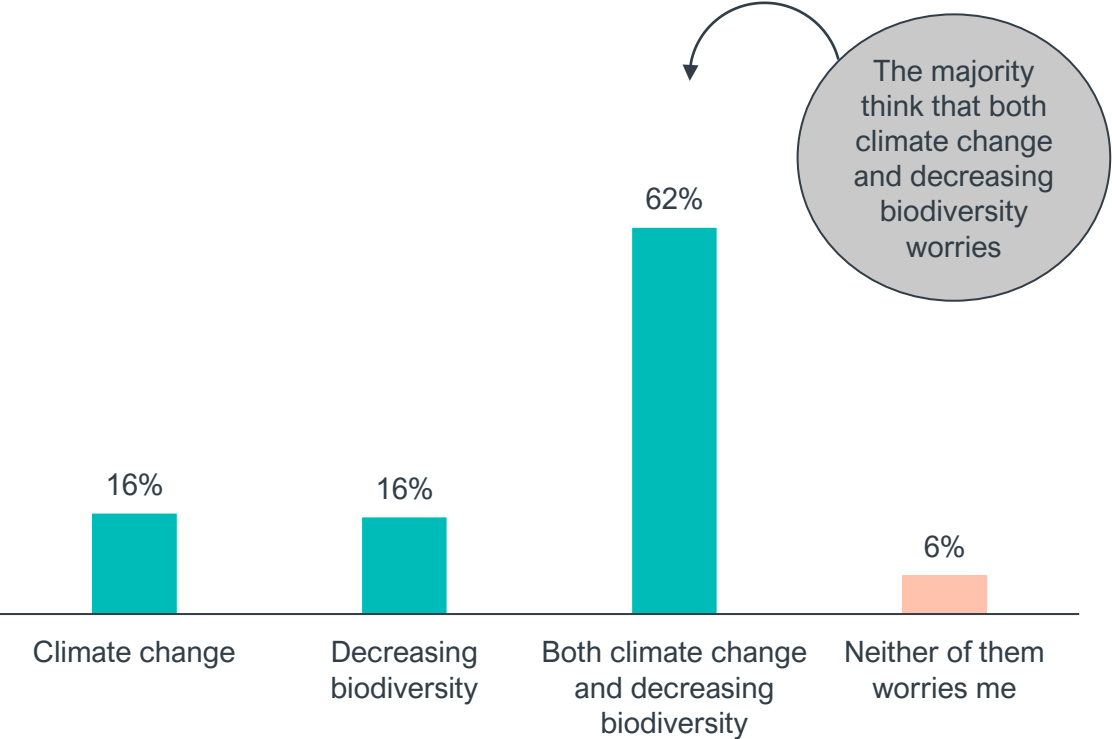

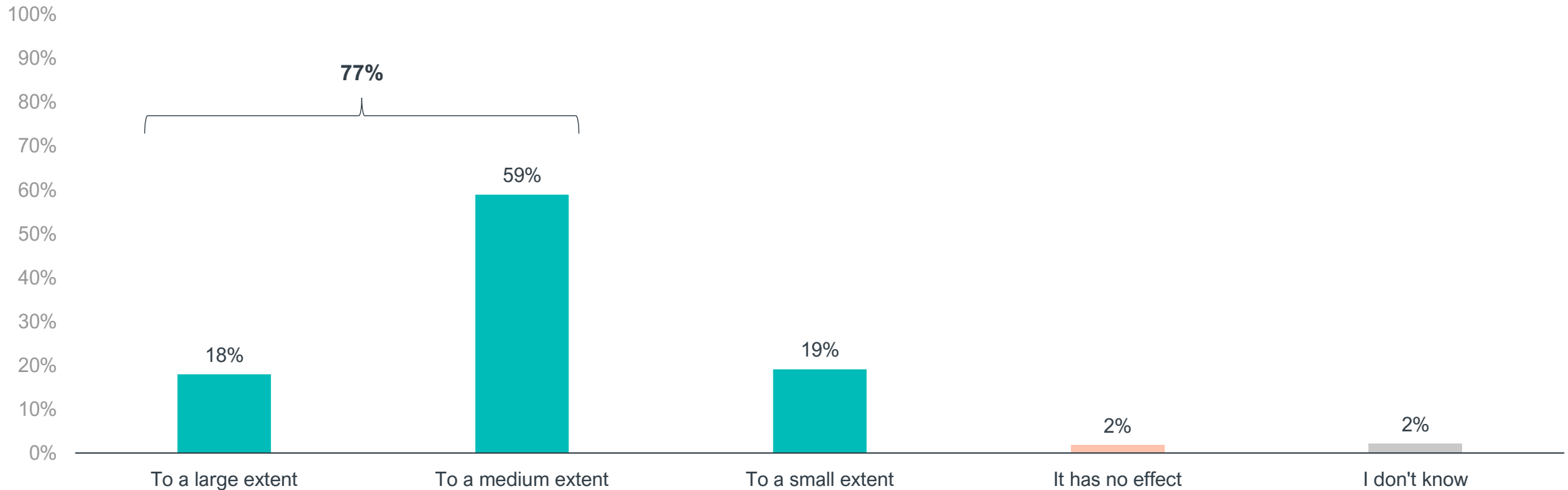

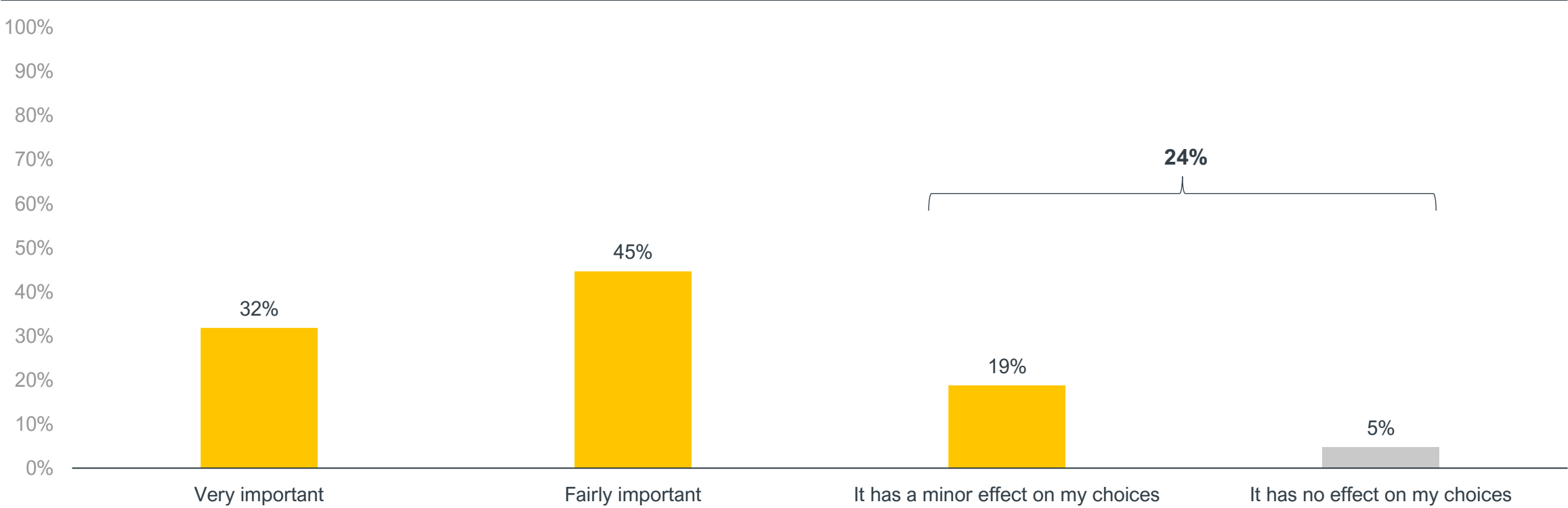

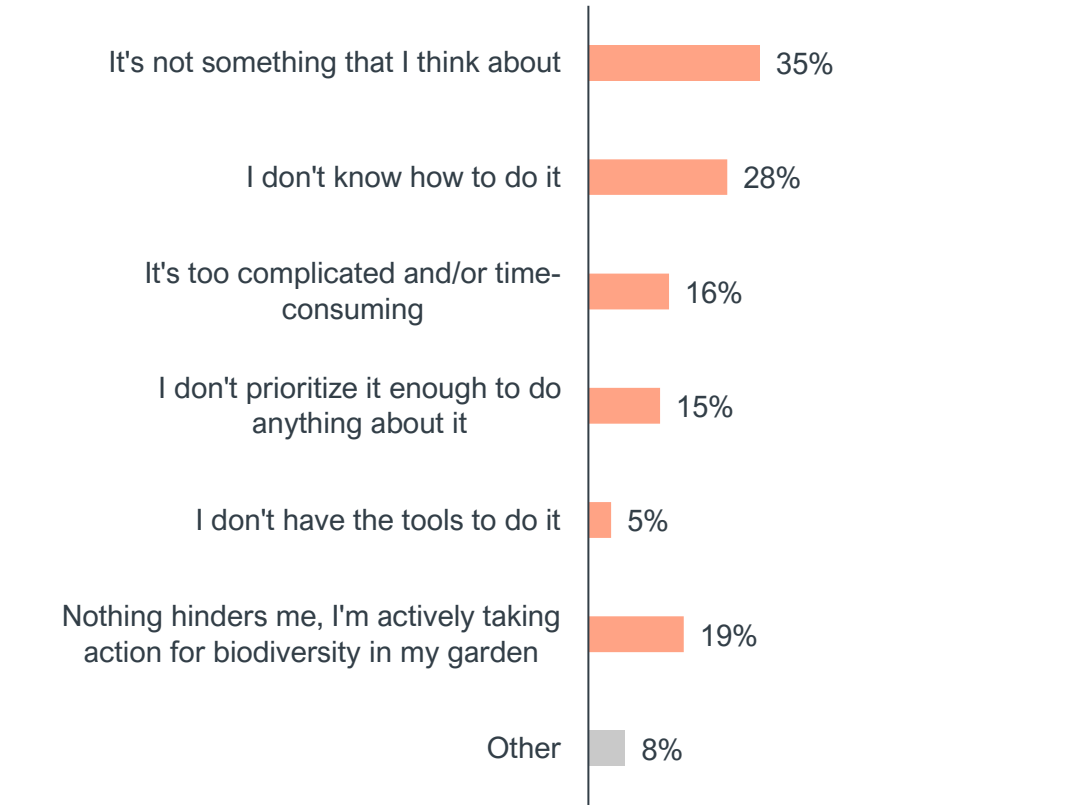

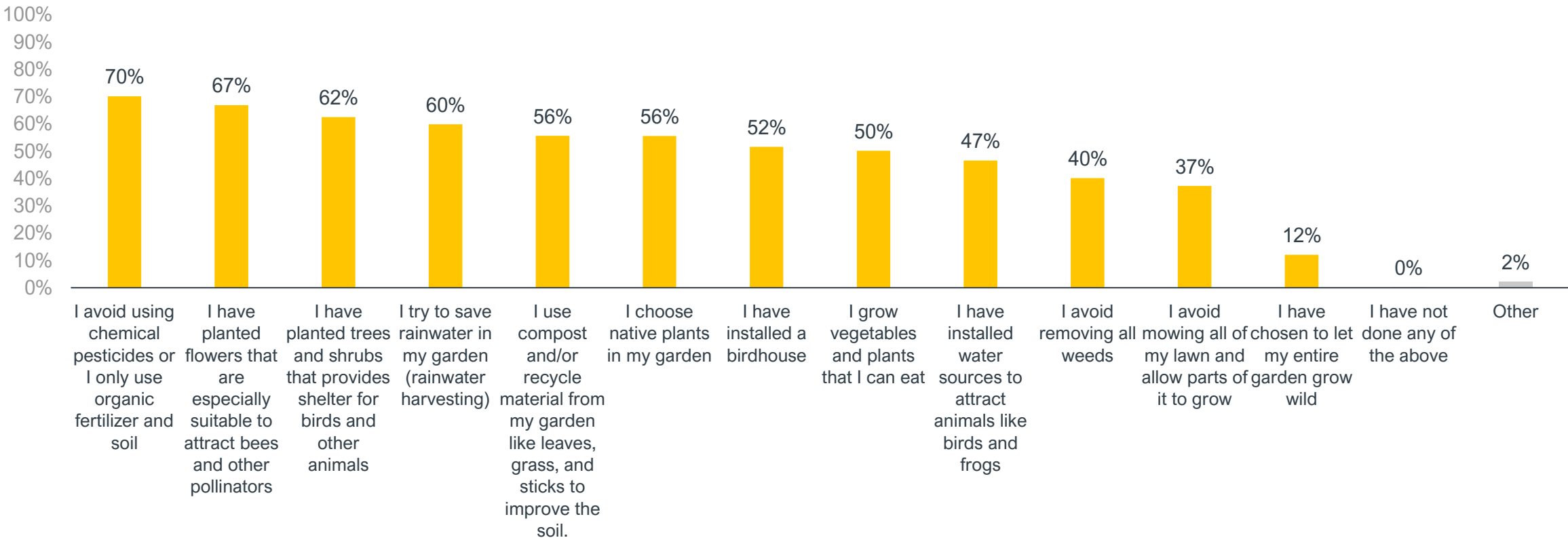

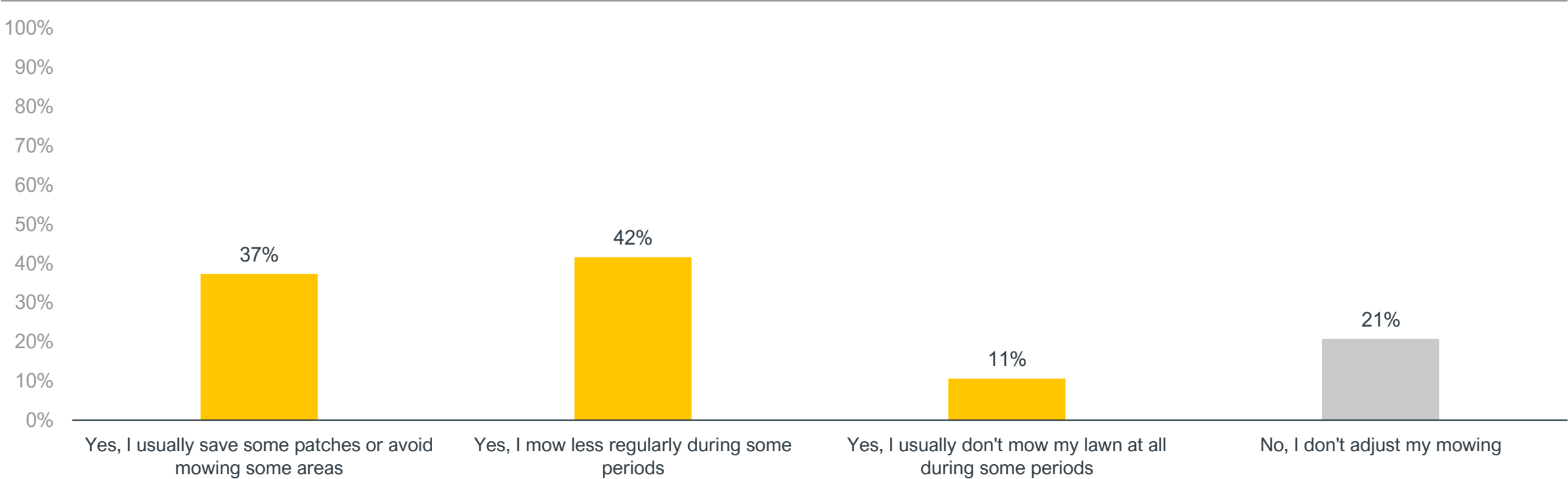

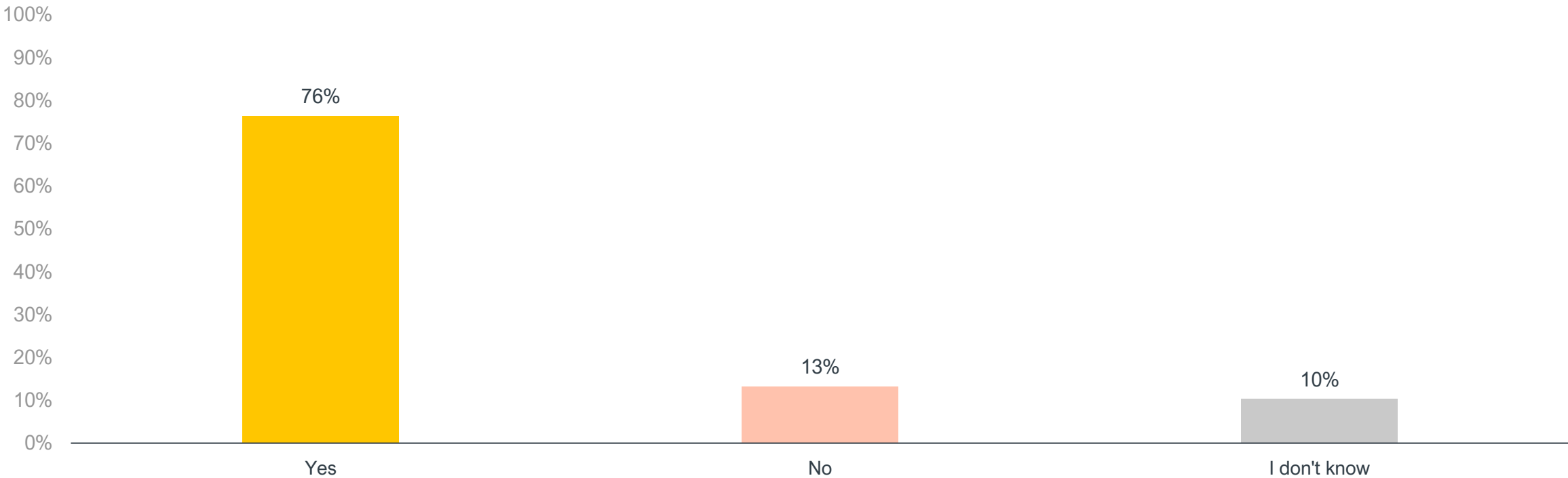

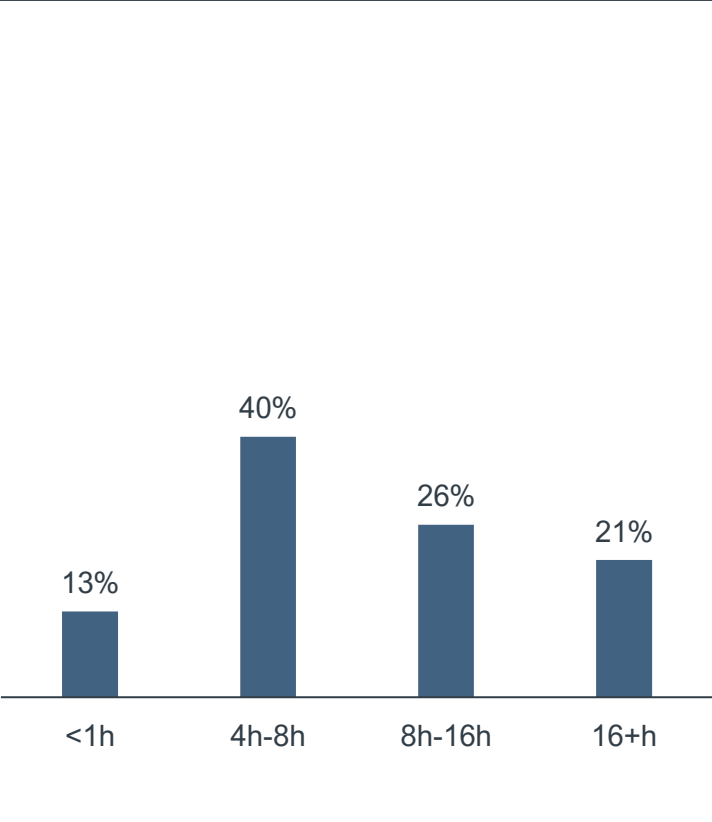

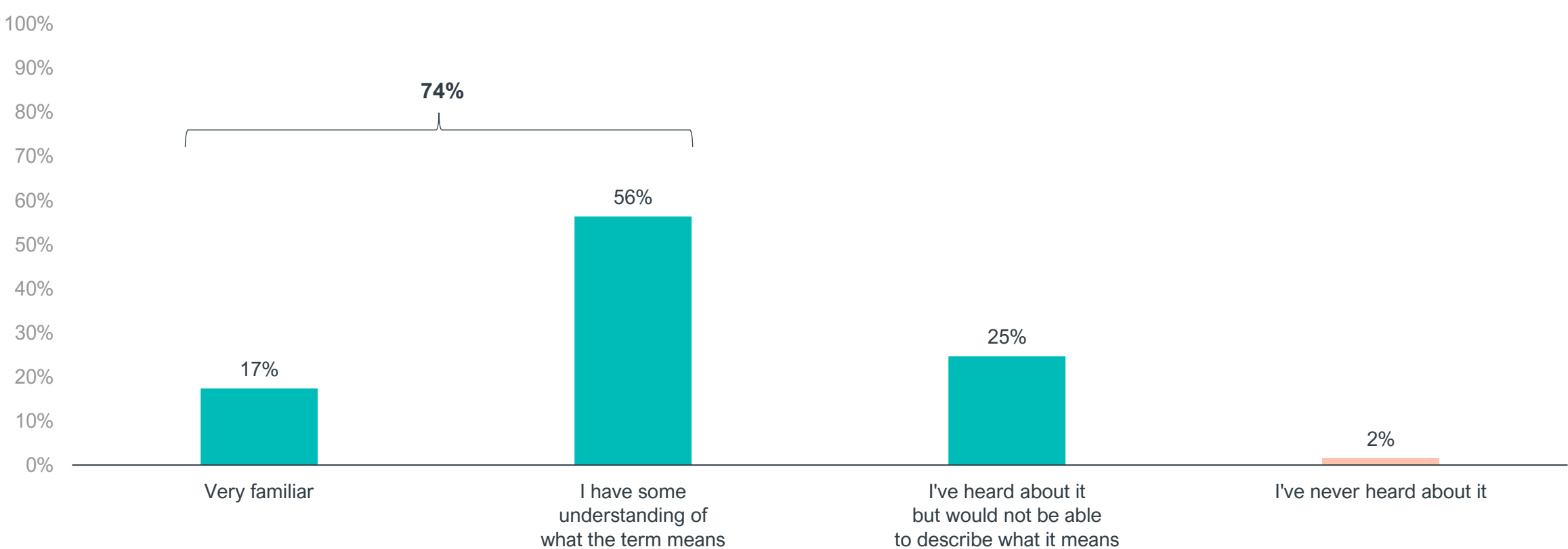

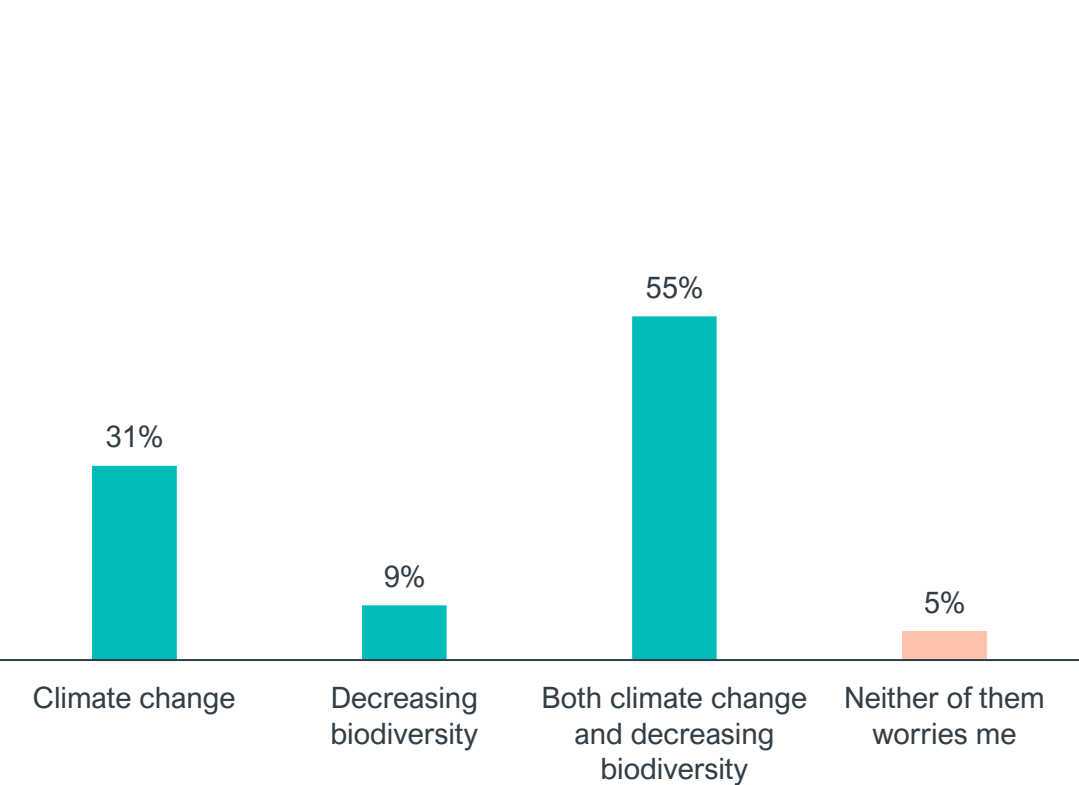

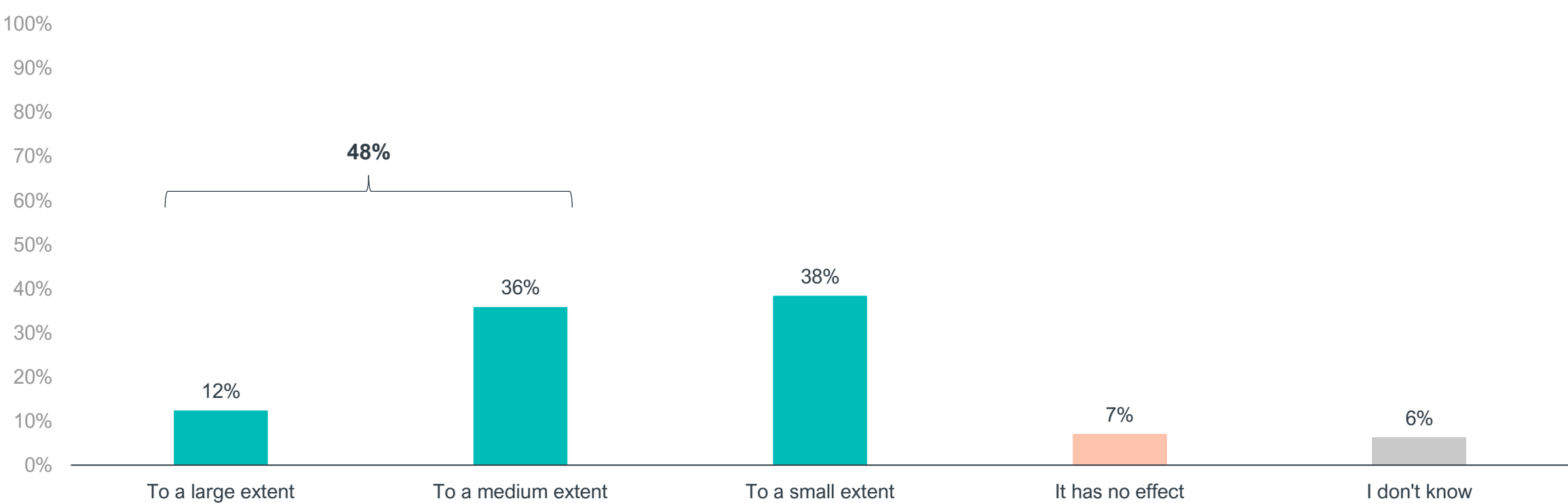

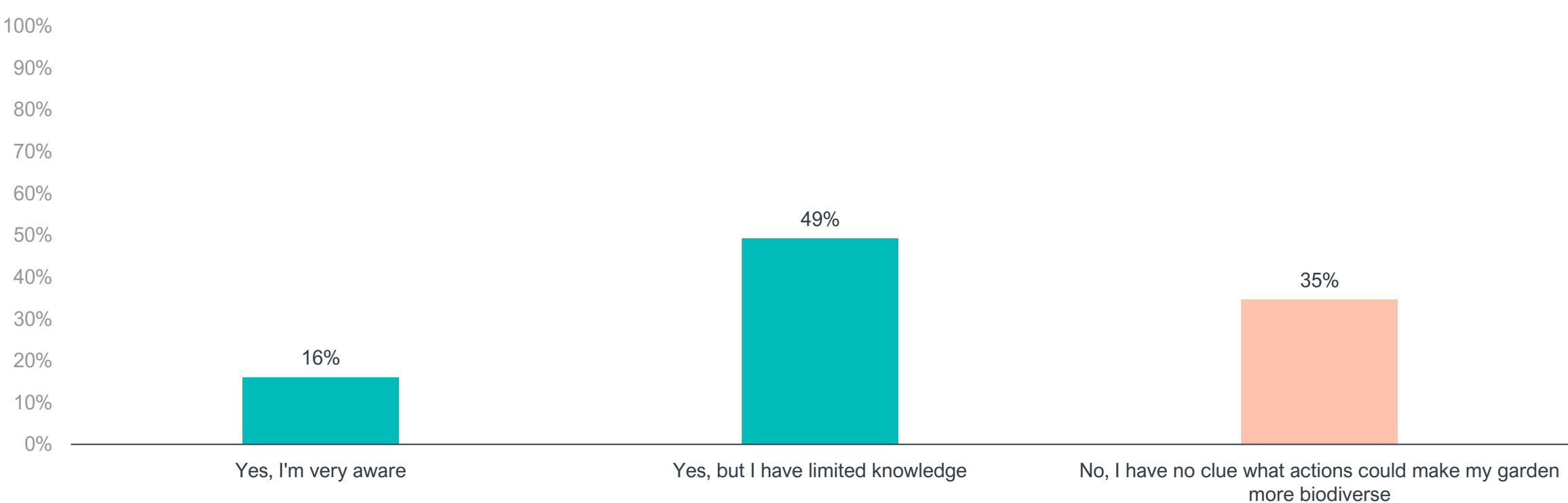

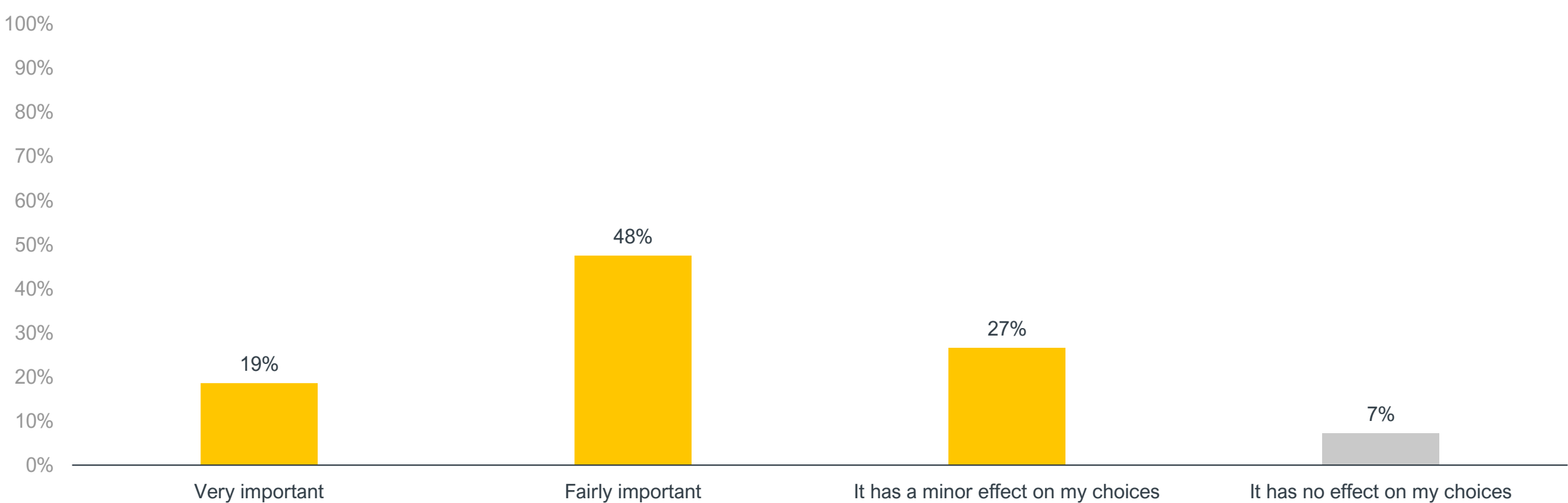

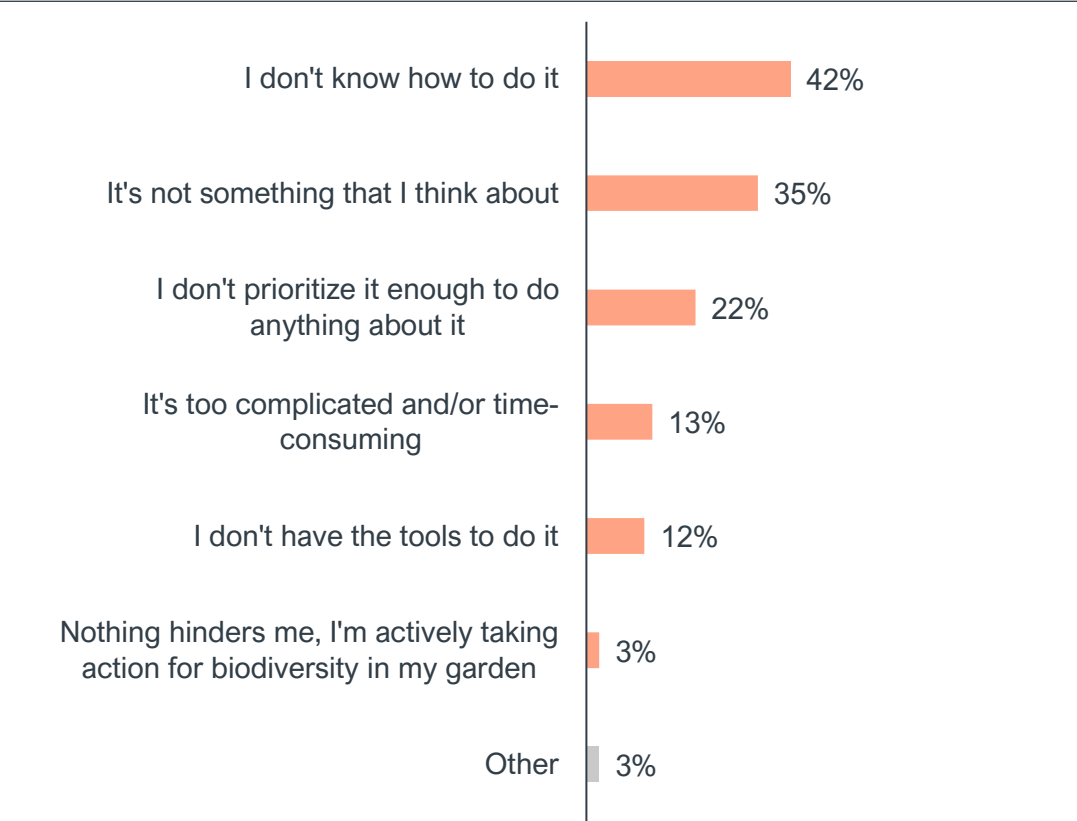

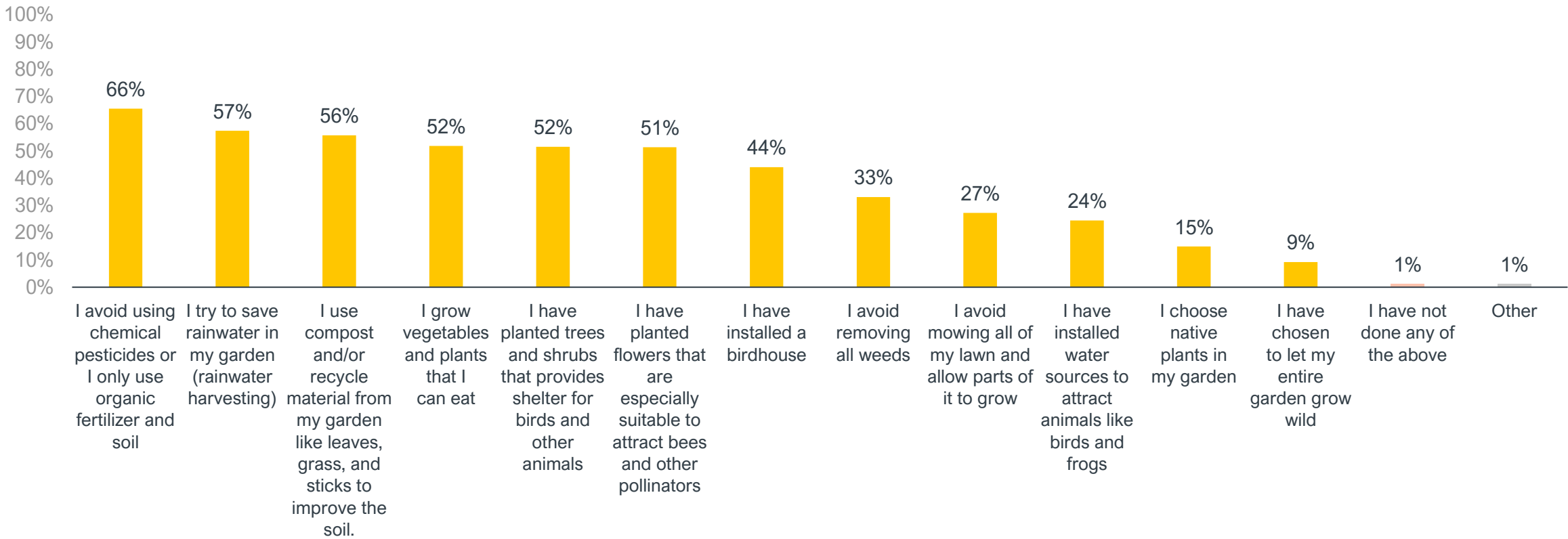

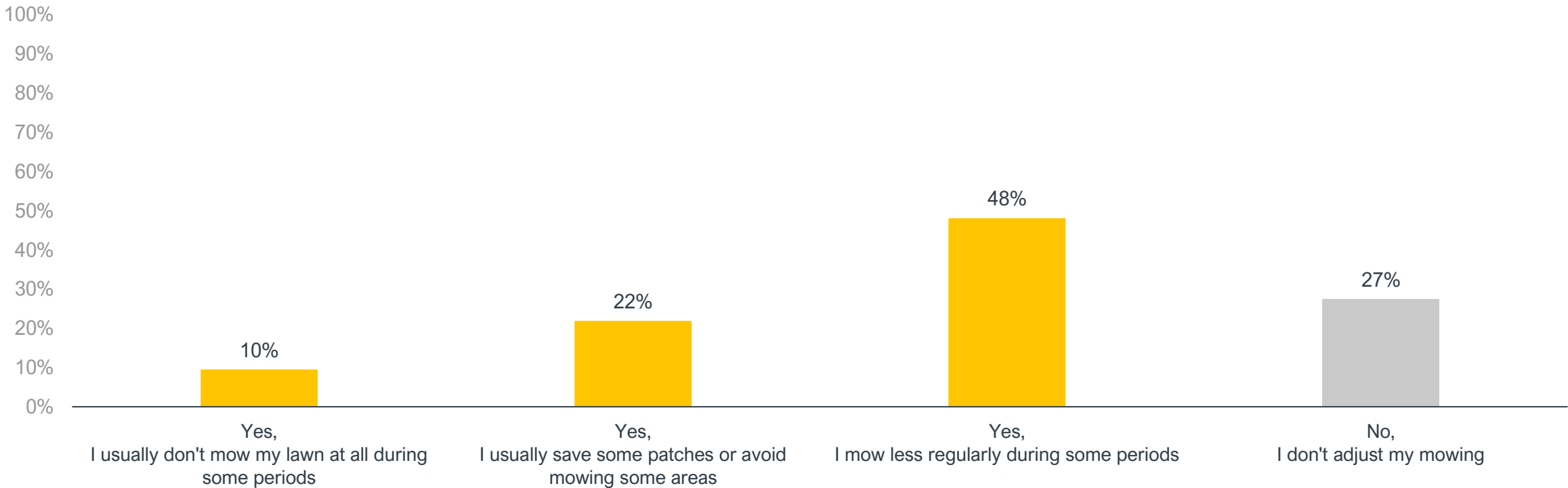

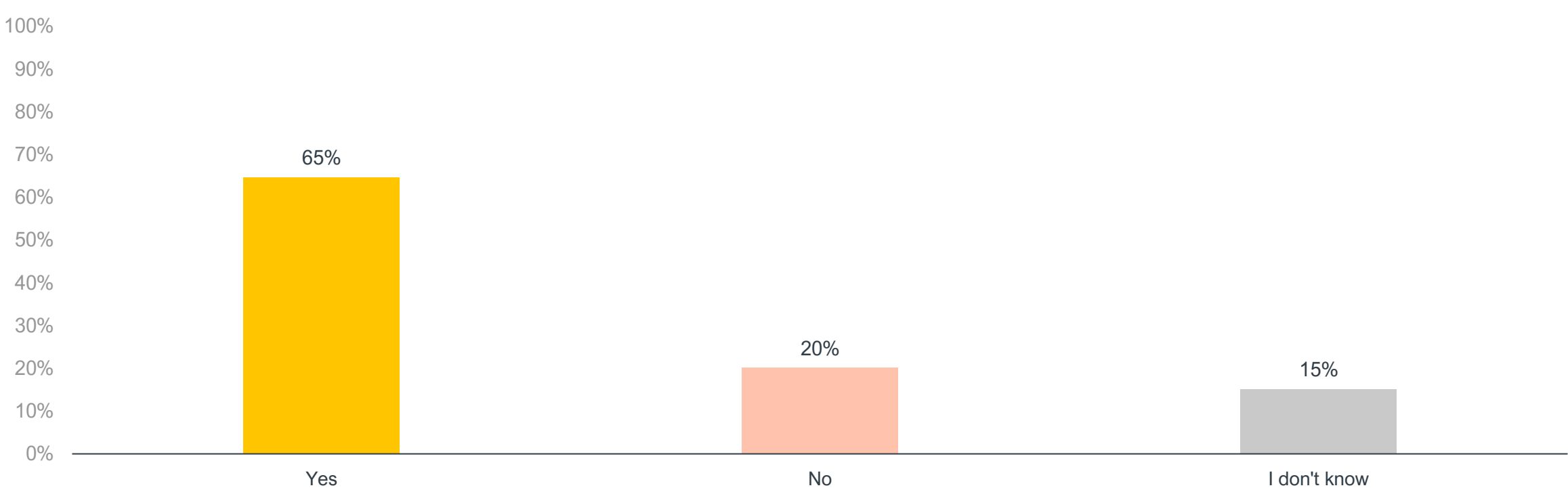

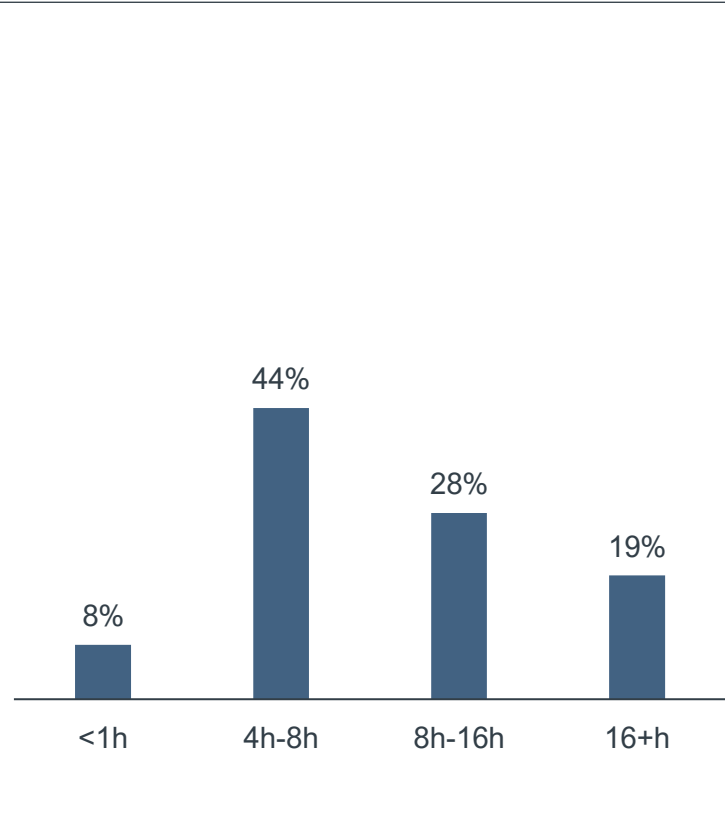

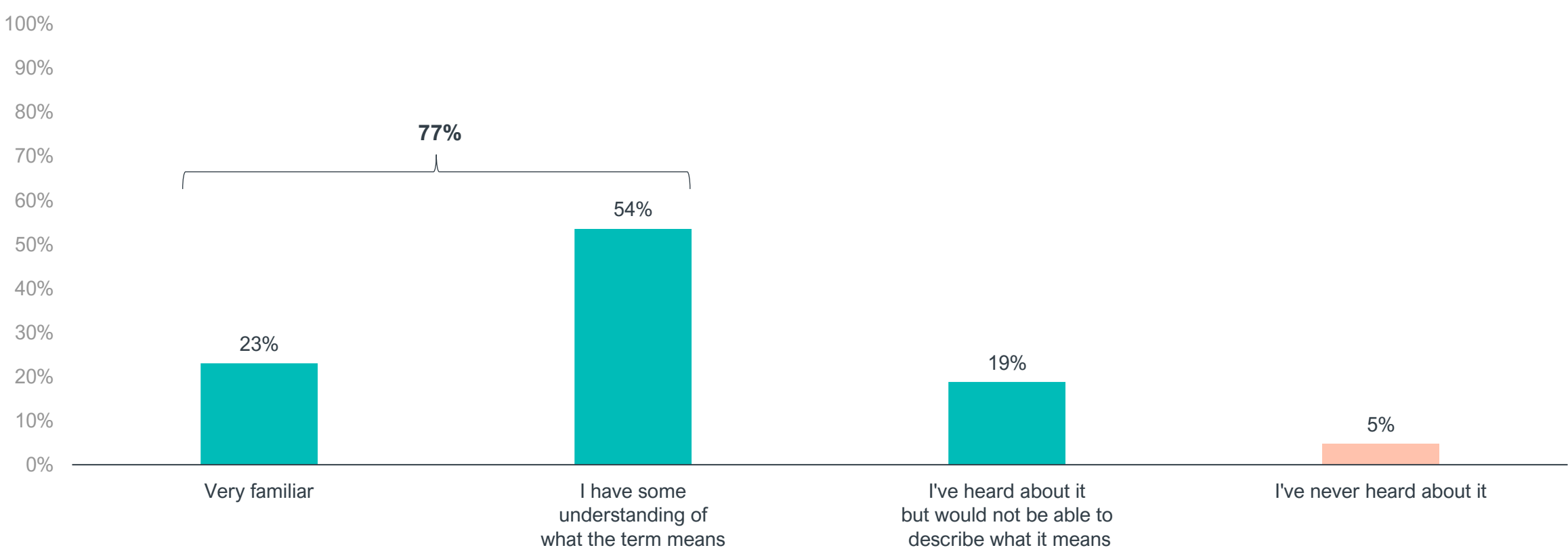

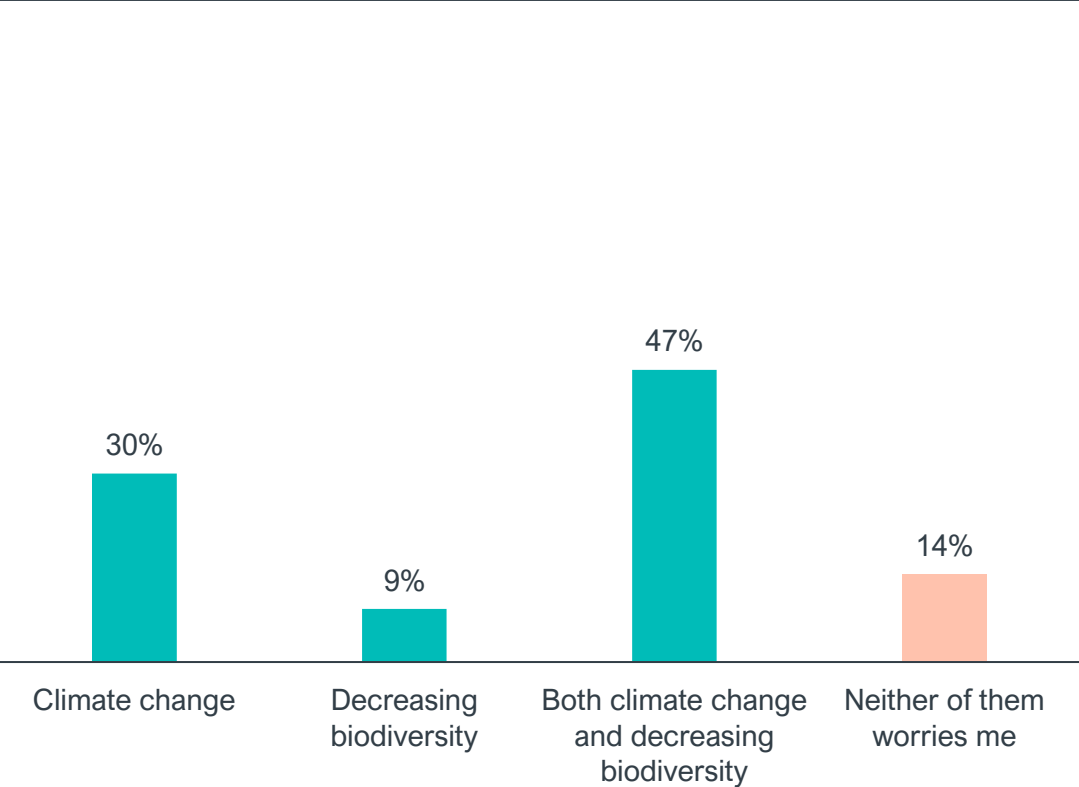

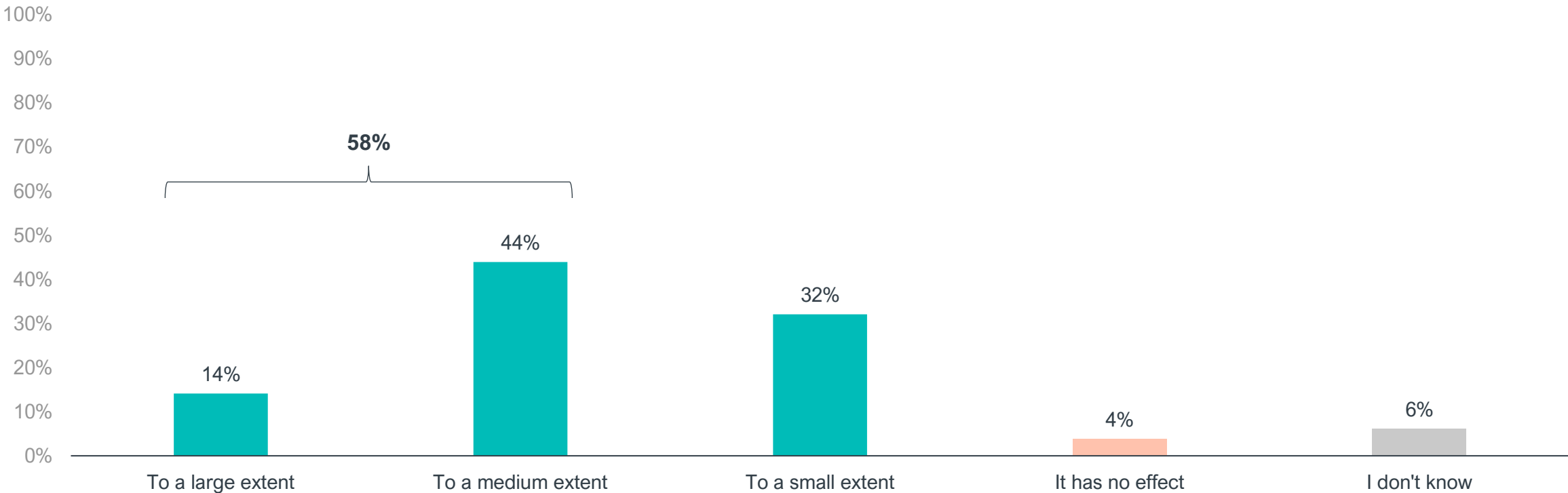

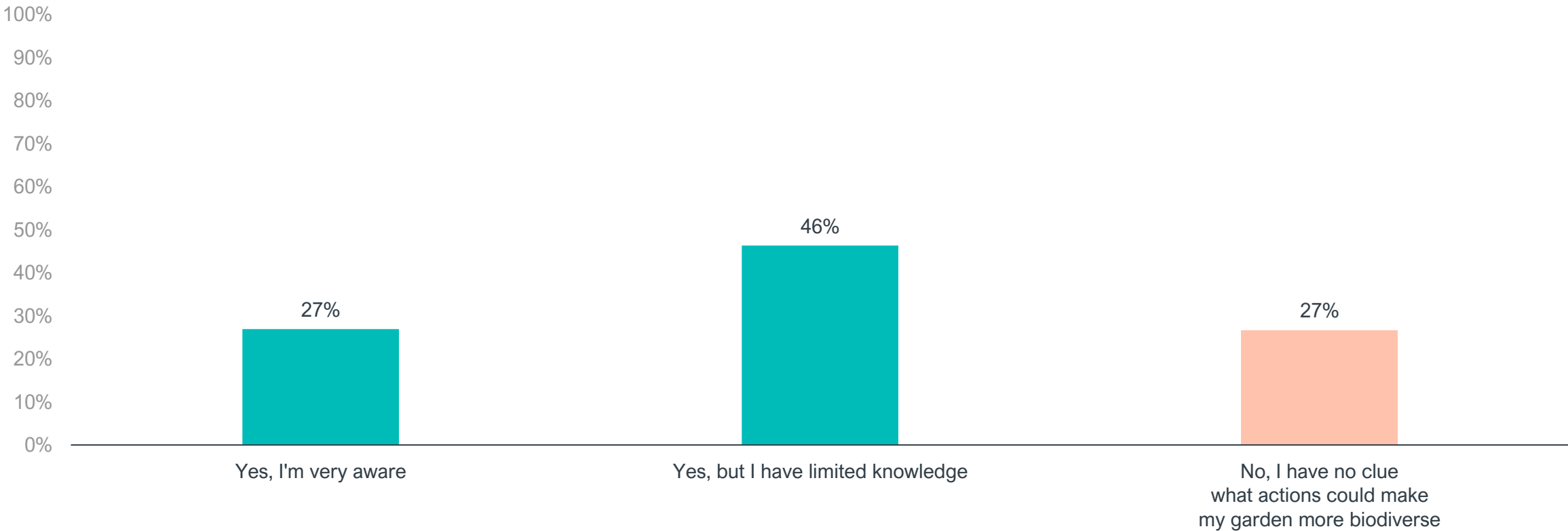

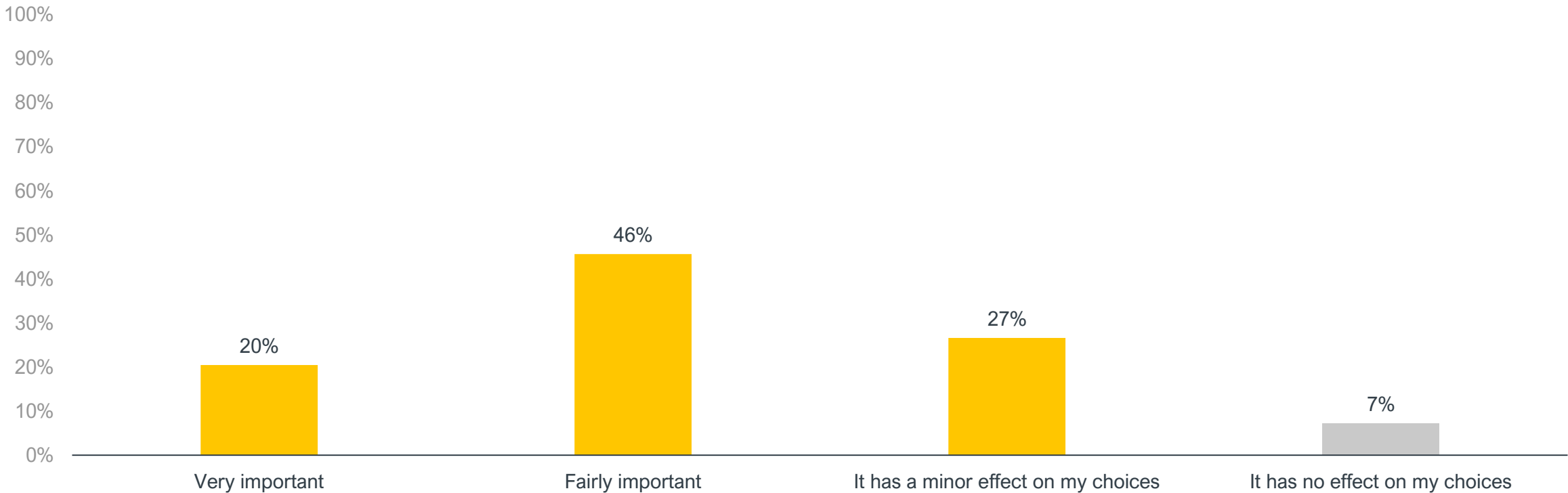

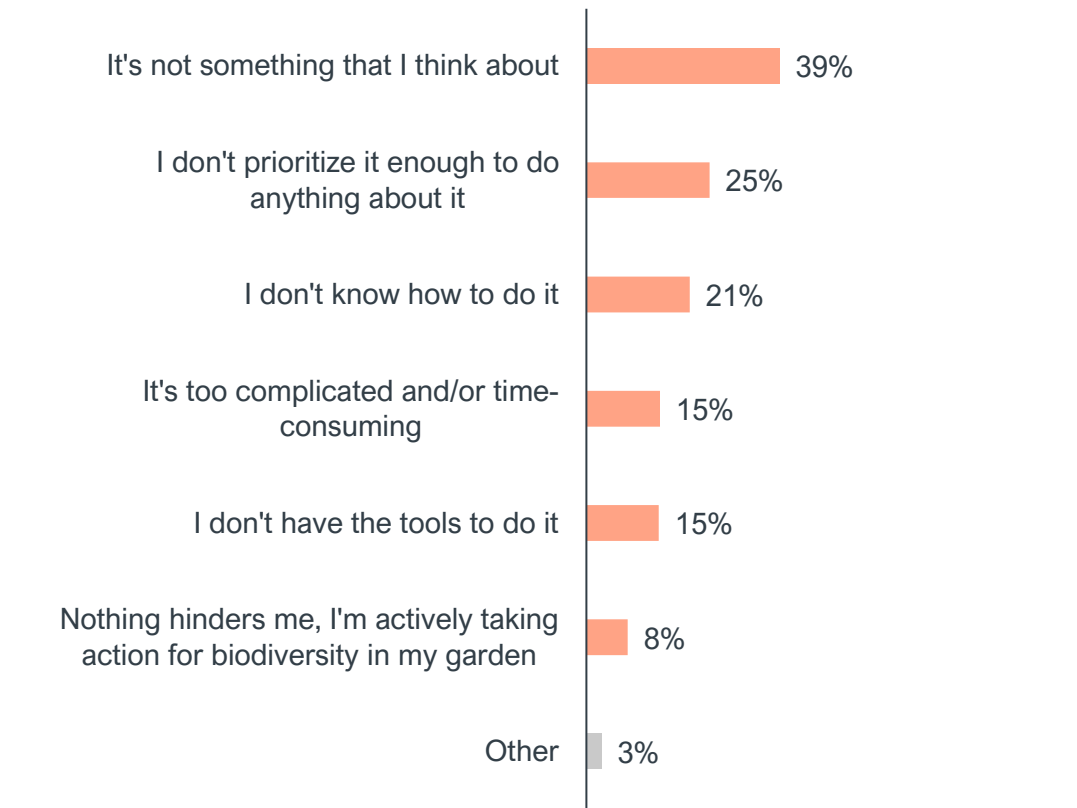

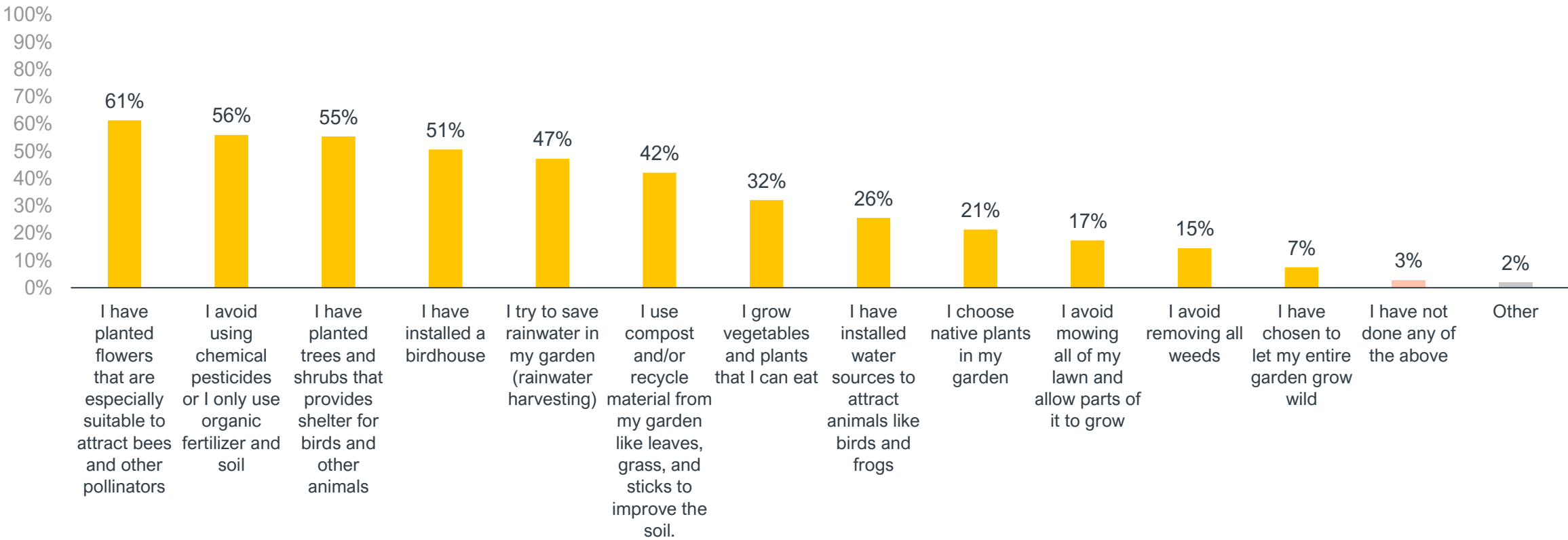

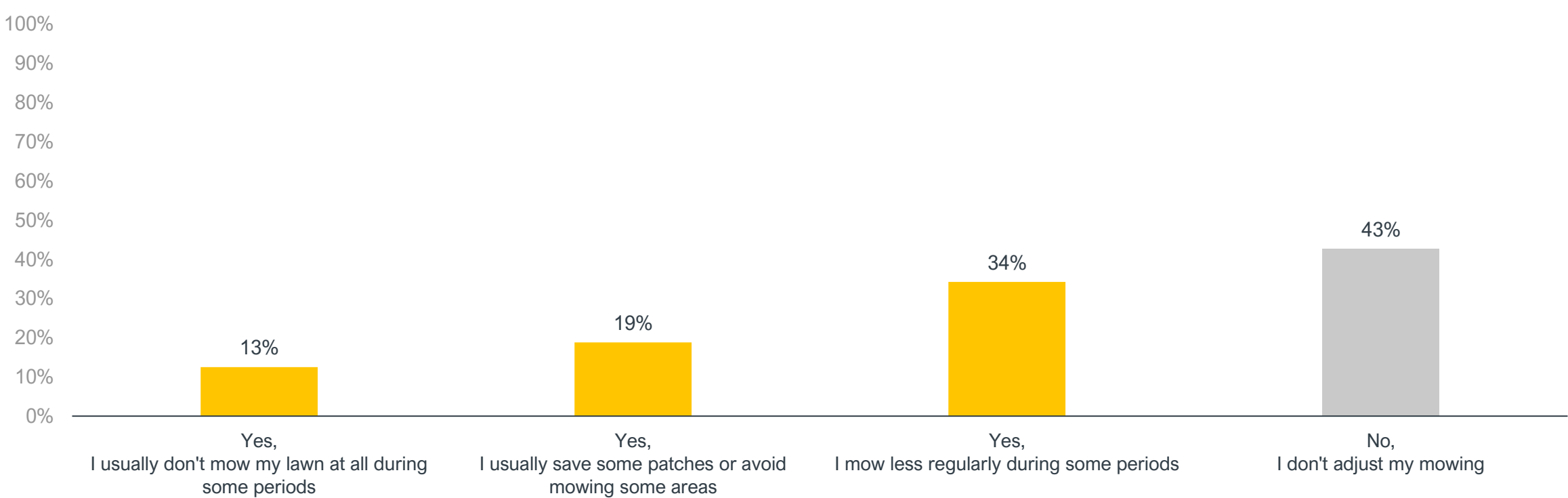

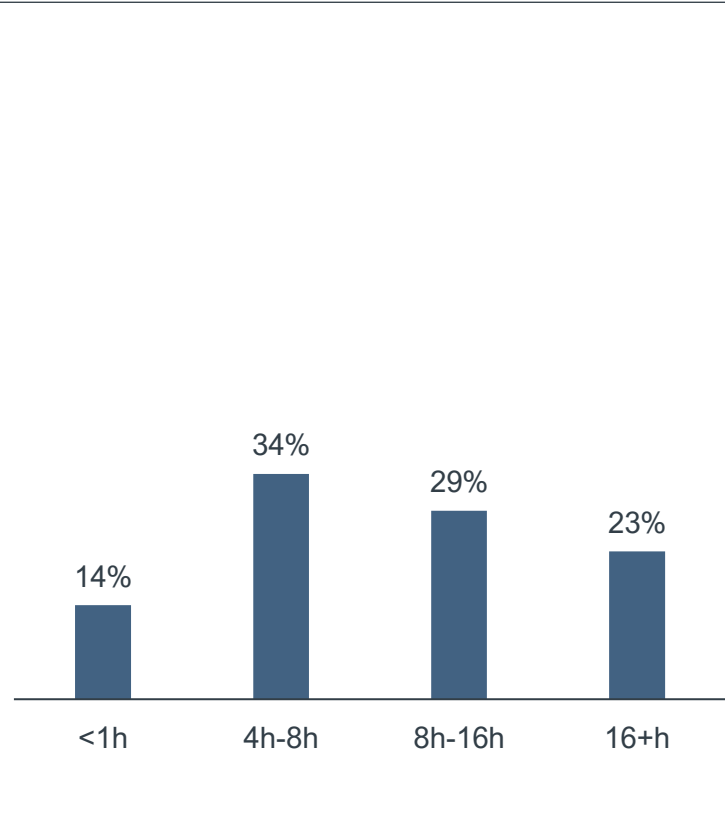

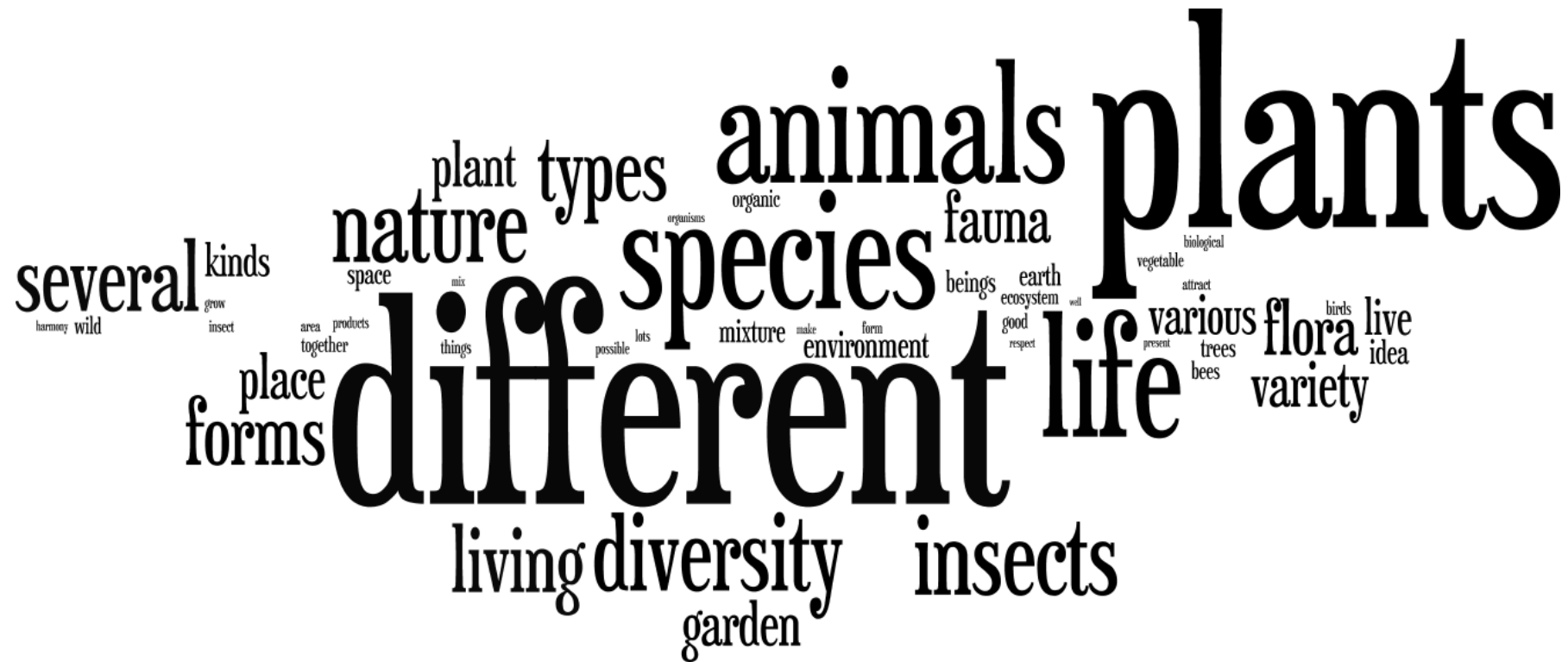

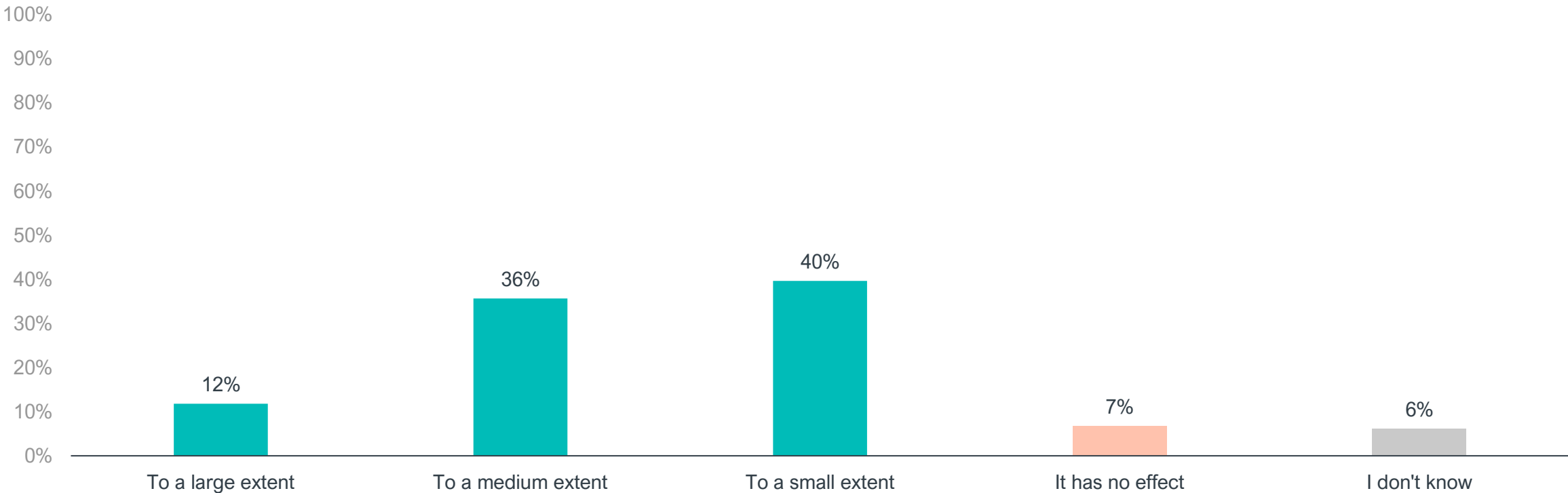

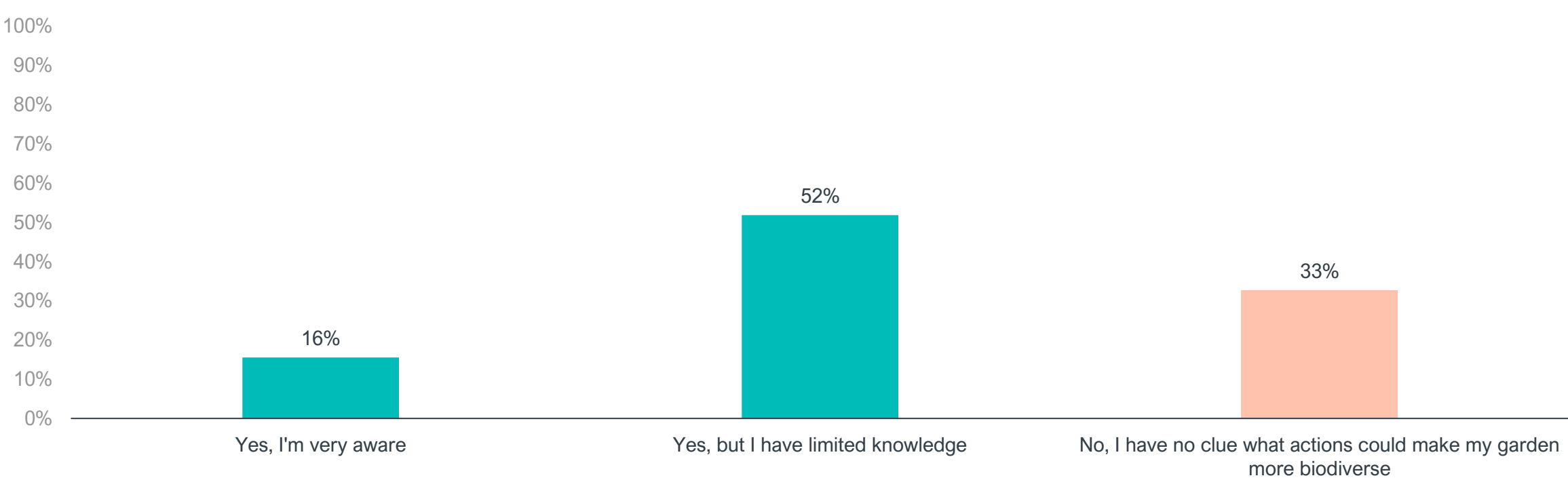

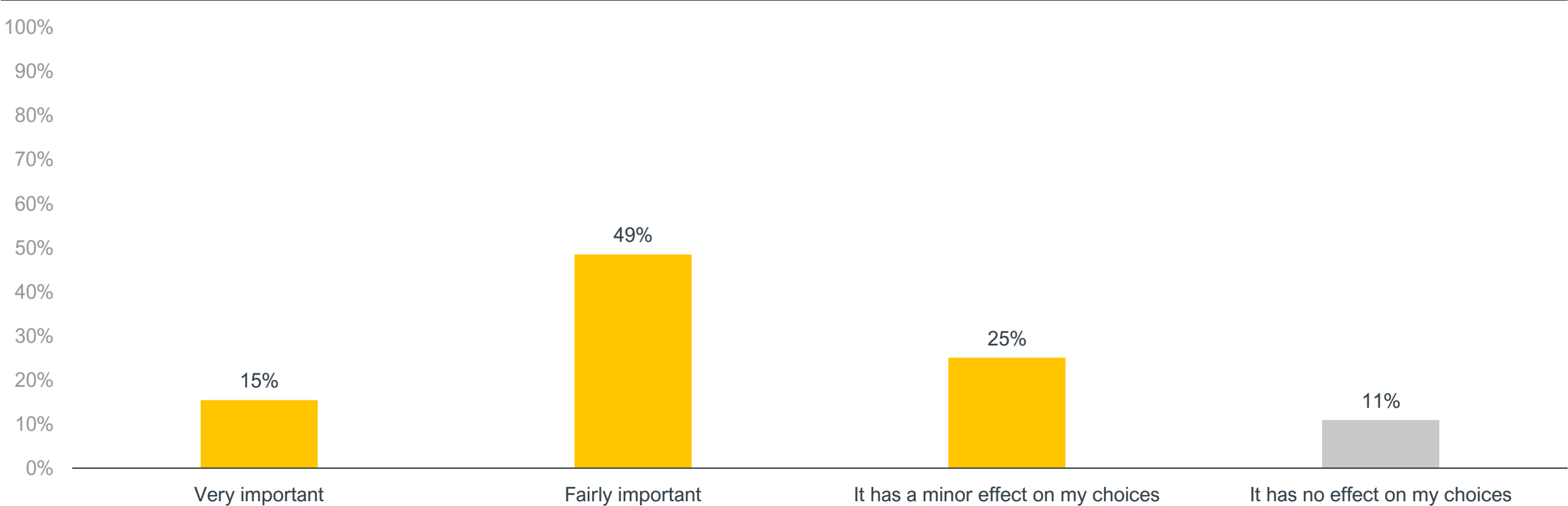

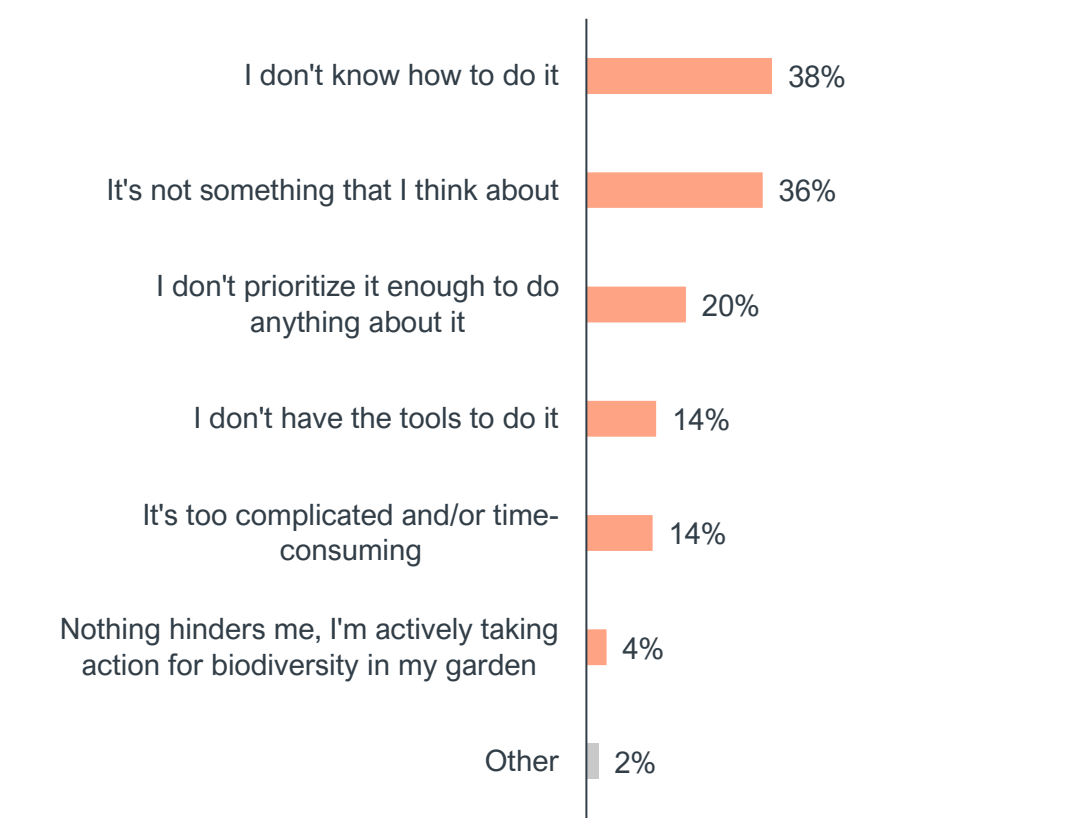

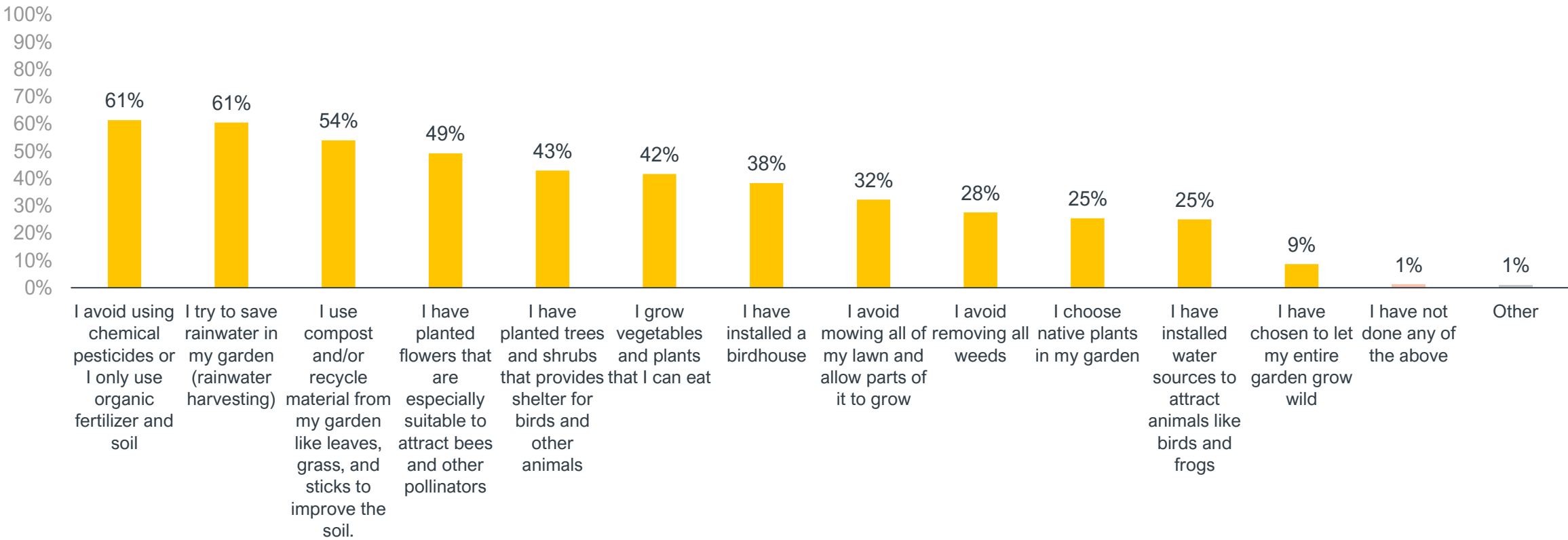

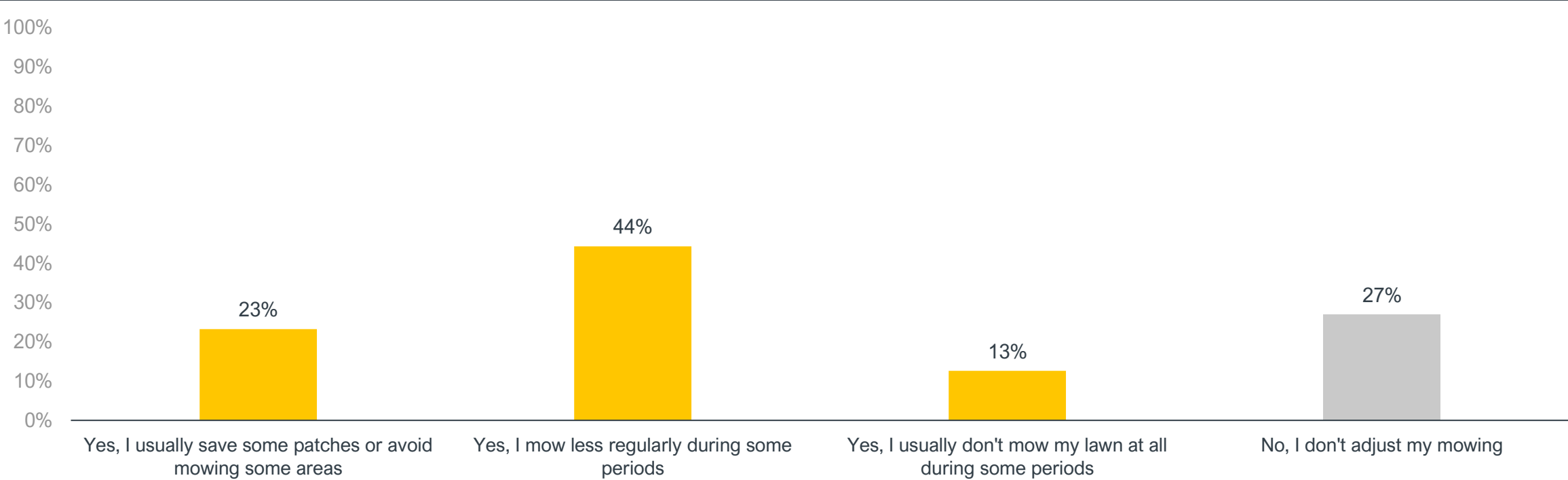

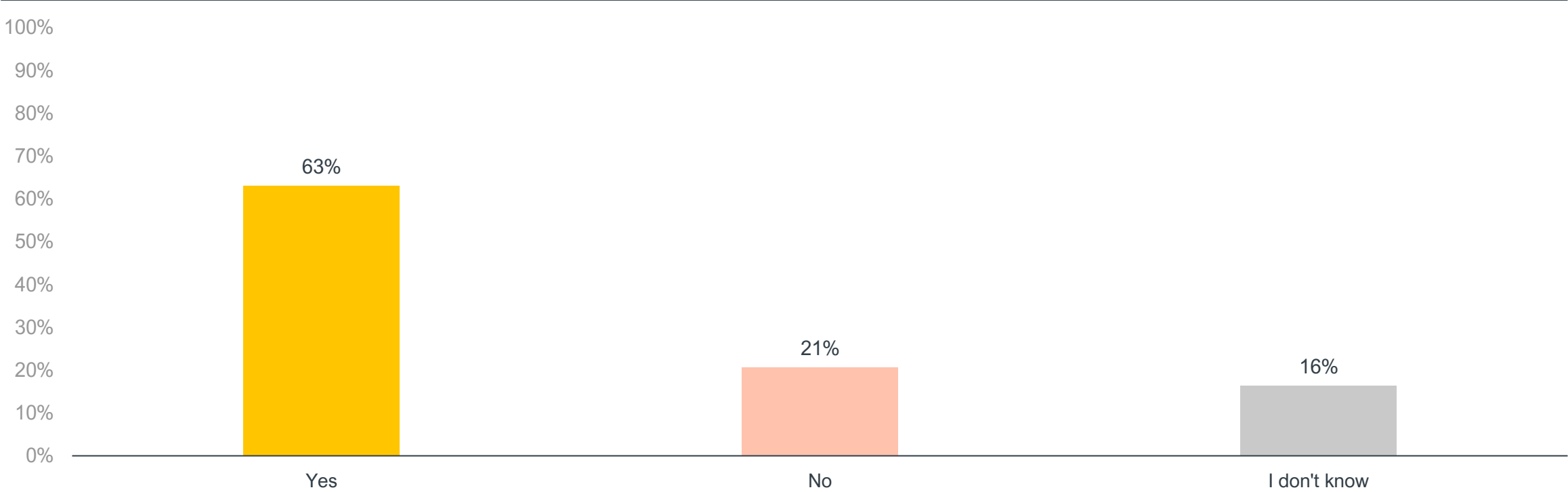

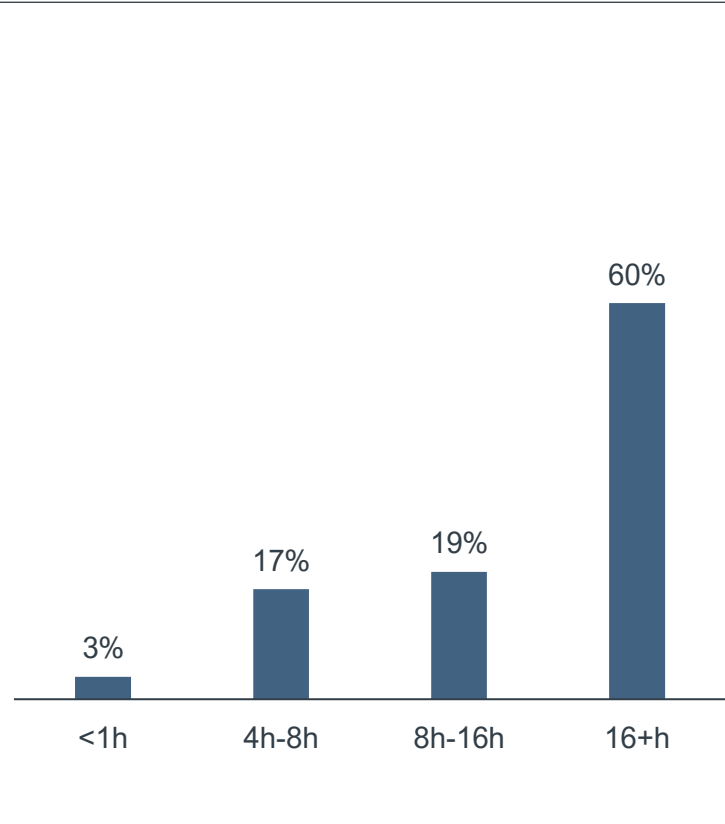

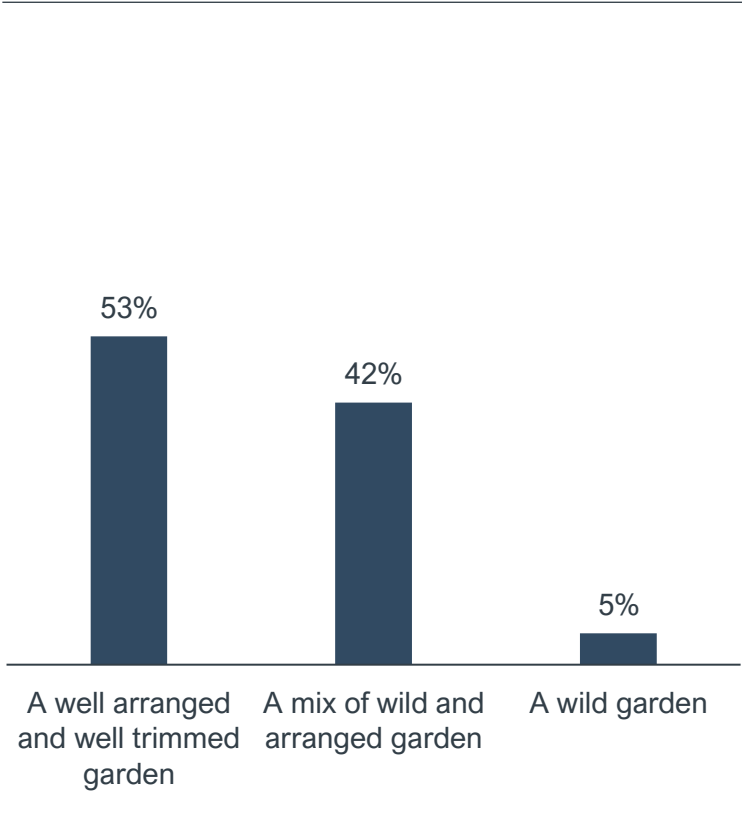

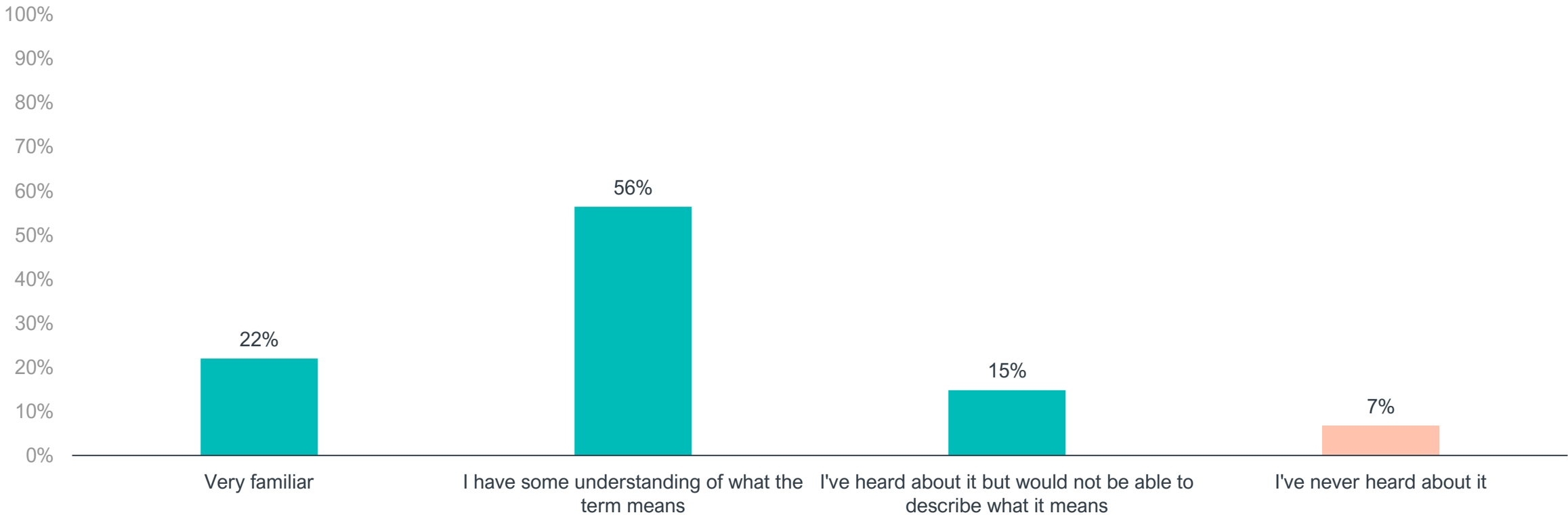

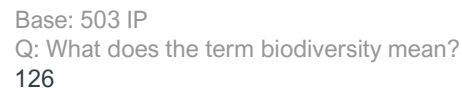

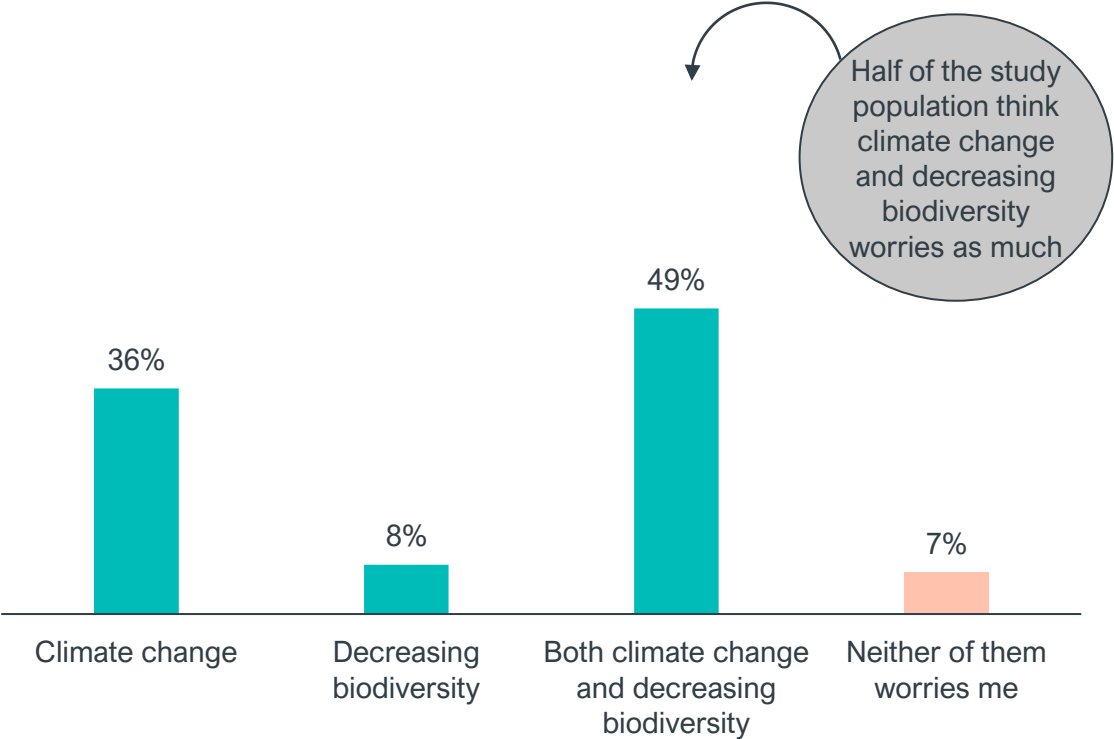

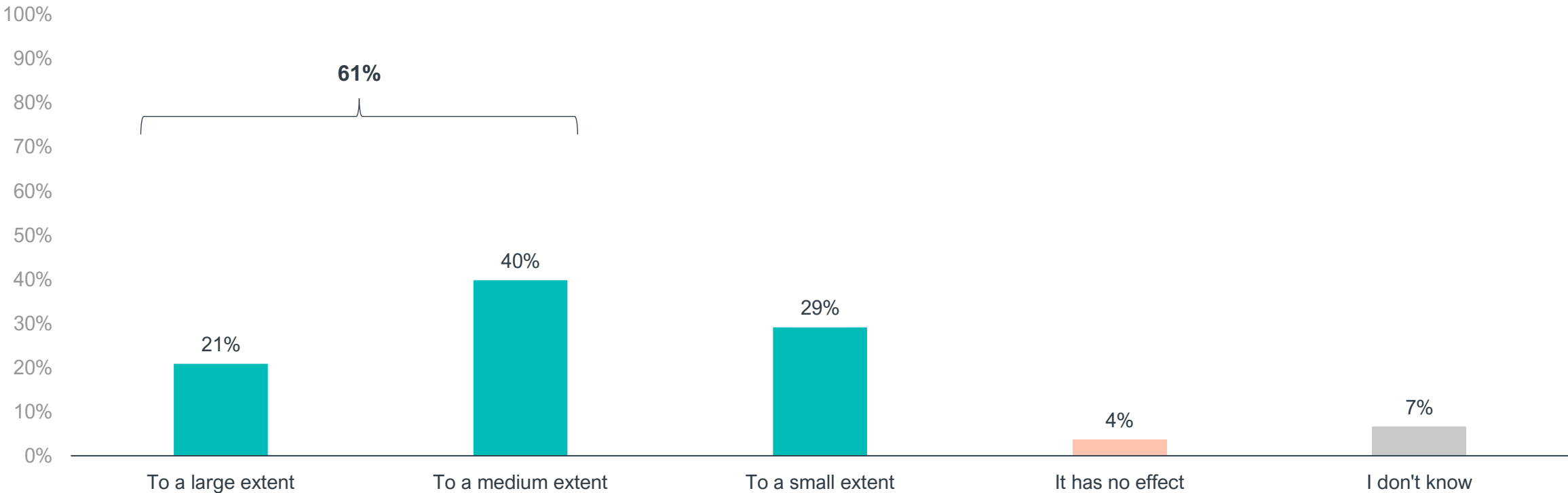

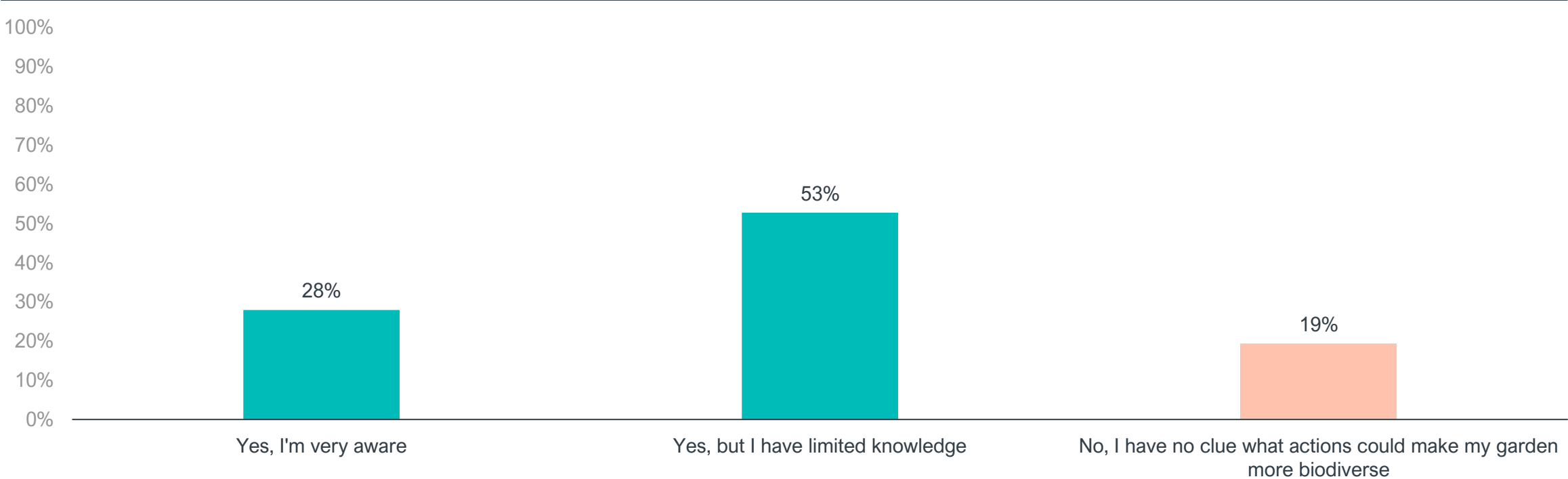

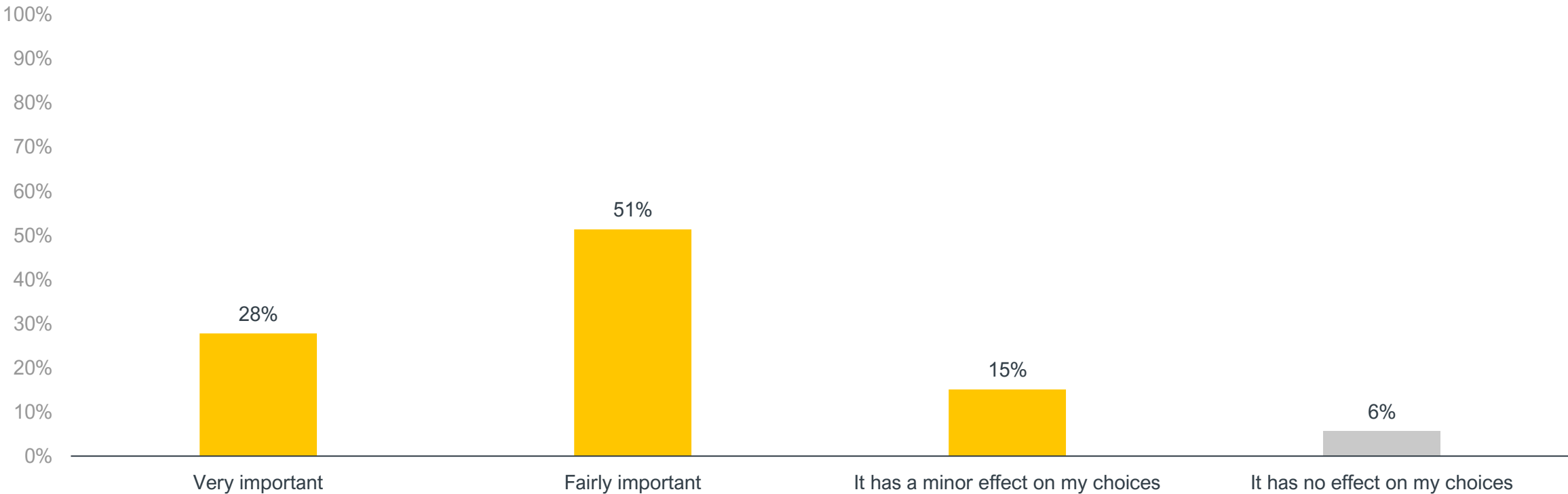

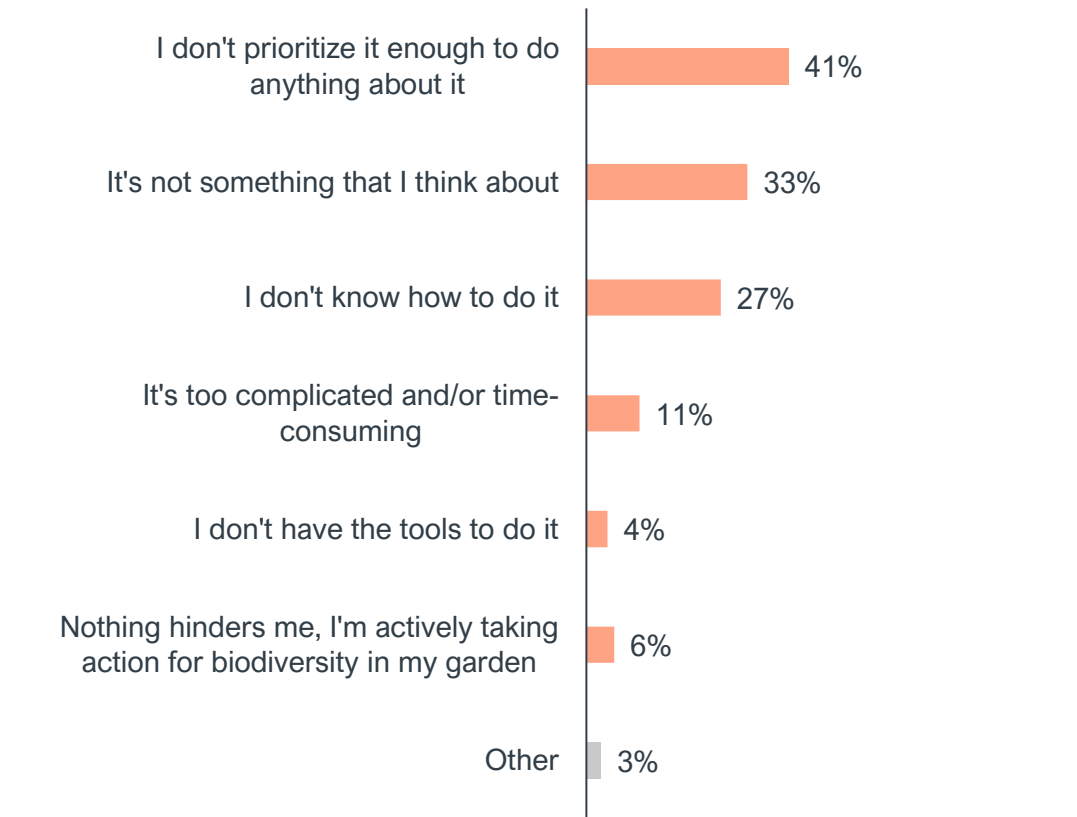

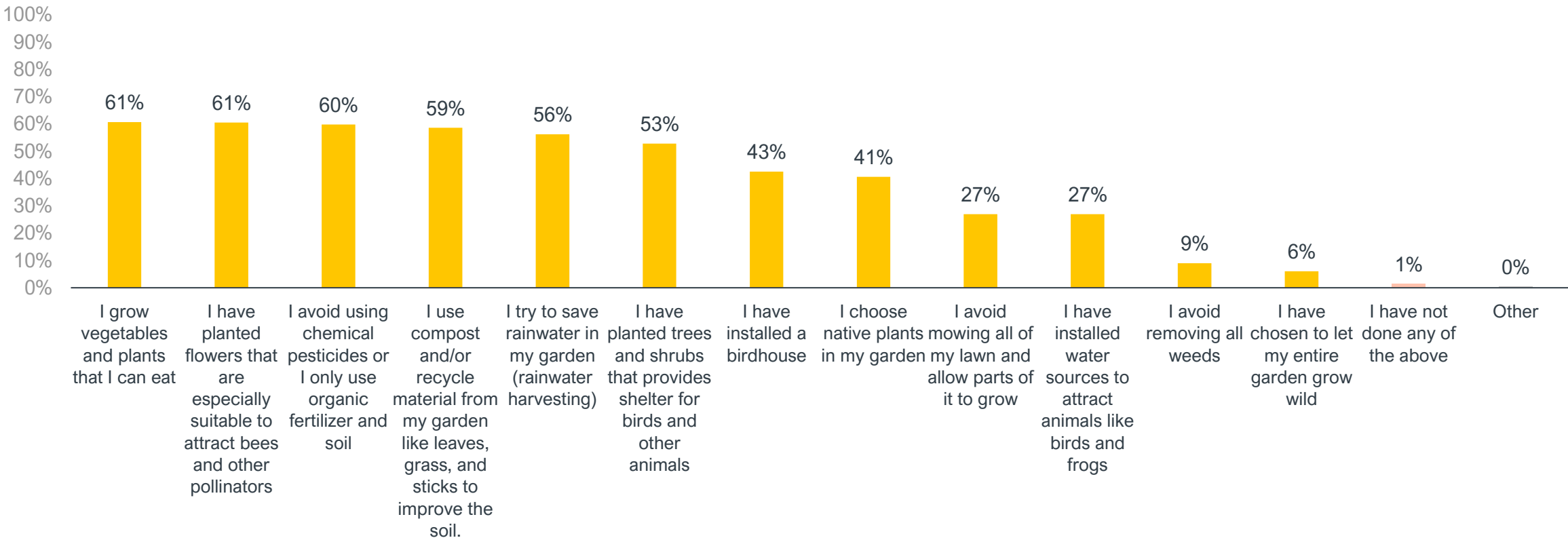

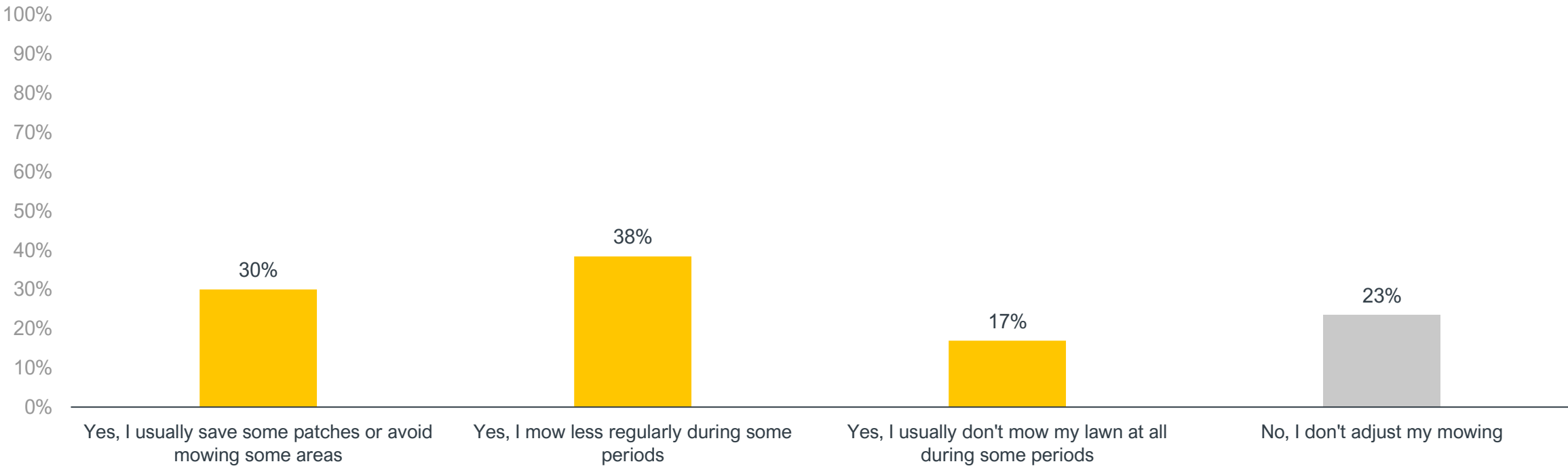

Biodiversity awareness and perception	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Awareness of biodiversity is rather high, 22% are very familiar with the term and the majority (56%) have some understanding• “Various plants and species” are the most often mentioned words when the garden owners were asked to describe the term in their own words• The majority of the garden owners believe that maintaining biodiversity is a joint effort, many also place great responsibility on themselves (22%)• ~60% think that their own garden can help boost the biodiversity to a medium or large extent• 1/3 say they are very aware of how to make the garden more biodiverse; the rest have either limited knowledge (53%) or no clue (19%)
Biodiversity behaviour and maturity	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Poles understand the importance of biodiversity when planning garden projects, with only 21% saying it has minor or no effect• Making the garden more biodiverse is not prioritized by 41%, a better understanding would facilitate increased focus on biodiversity• Growing vegetables and edible plants and planting flowers that attract bees/other pollinators are the most common action made• ~80% are considering biodiversity when mowing the lawn, either by mowing less often or by avoiding some areas• The majority (71%) would like to learn more about ways to let biodiversity thrive in their garden



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
